

World Series Resumes In New York Today; Yankees Still Favored

It'll Be Stafford Vs. Pierce

New York—(UPI)—The New York Yankees came home to Ruthville Saturday hoping to bust loose with their famed power when they send fireballing Bill Stafford against wily Billy Pierce today in the third game of the World Series.

Manager Ralph Houk was cheered by the news that two

of his siege guns, Elston Howard and Bill (Moose) Skowron, were back off the injury list and ready to return to action. Because, he hinted, the Yanks were convinced that they had to roll up their sleeves against the NL champions after being shut out, 2-0, in the second game at San Francisco.

"The stiffness is gone and I'll be okay," said Howard who jammed his right wrist in the first game.

Skowron said that a wrenched back muscle "is much better and I'm ready."

The Yankees knew they'd better be, even though they were back in Yankee stadium, where they always have a big edge against the opposition because of the park's awesome proportions, and were 7-3 picks in today's third game as well as 8½ to 5 to take it all.

Stafford, who has a 14-9 mark this season, faces a stiff chore, however, against Pierce, a fugitive from the American league who knows the Yankees well.

Little Billy left the AL this season and won 16 games for the Giants against only six losses and, more important, has a long record against the Bronx bombers. Over the years he is 25-37 against them.

Rain which mired the infield kept the Yankees from working out Saturday and the Sunday forecast was for continued cloudiness with temperatures in the high 60's.

Houk, in reviewing the even split in the first two games, said he didn't see how the three-game pennant fight which the Giants won from the Los Angeles Dodgers had hurt the Yankee opponents as far as pitching was concerned.

"My biggest problem is that my pitchers haven't been getting enough work, especially in the bullpen," he lamented. "Some of the fellows haven't worked in seven or eight days."

Giants 'Solid'
He labeled the Giants a "solid" club and said that the Yankees were particularly impressed by shortstop Jose Pagan and second baseman Chuck Hiller.

Despite the rain and the fact that most of the Giants were complaining of being tired from the playoffs and the rush into the series, Giant Manager Alvin Dark held a light workout at the stadium for his club.

Dark said that he didn't particularly consider today's third contest a key game.

"I don't believe in key games," he said with a smile. "You have to win four games to win the series. We have been up and down so much this year that we don't care about key games."

If the Redskins win Sunday, their 1962 record will top their combined victory total for both 1960 and 1961. And they are picked by 4 points to beat the winless Rams.

Green Bay is the choice by 9 points to beat the Lions in the clash between the NFL's only two perfect-record teams. Both have 3-0 records. The Redskins lead the East with two wins and a tie.

There was a Saturday night NFL game pitting the Philadelphia Eagles against the Steelers at Pittsburgh.

In other Sunday games, the New York Giants are the choice by 6 points over the Cardinals at St. Louis; the Baltimore Colts are favored by 3 at home over the San Francisco Forty Niners; the Cleveland Browns are 13 at home over the Dallas Cowboys, and the Chicago Bears are 6 over the Vikings at Minnesota.

And add a snicker or two from big Willie McCovey, whom the smart-alecks once tabbed a flop.

Sanford showed a lot of stamina, among other things, when he pitched the San Francisco Giants to a brilliant three-hit, 2-0 victory over the New York Yankees Friday to even the World Series at one victory apiece before 43,910 fans at Candlestick Park.

And ganging, easy-going McCovey proved he can deliver the BIG hit by walling one of Ralph Terry's sliders for a seventh-inning home run that made matters easier for Sanford and the Giants in the last two frames.

Shoots at Fence
So the series resumes in New York Sunday when McCovey will get a whack at that invitingly short right field corner at Yankee Stadium.

The rap that Sanford didn't have staying strength stemmed from the fact that he finished only 13 of 38 starting assignments this season while compiling a 24-7 record.

Nothing appeared to bother the broad-shouldered 33-year-old New Englander Friday, neither the virus, a shortage of runs from his teammates, nor the threatening Yankee bats.

Sanford yielded a pop-bunt single to Tom Tresh in the fourth, a hard single by Cletis Boyer in the fifth and a two-out double by Mickey Mantle in the ninth, just before he induced Roger Maris

to hit into a game-ending infield out.

Tresh, who stole second following his infield hit and Mantle were the only Yankees to reach second base. Sanford struck out six, walked three and never pitched to more than four batters in any inning.

Terry, who lost his fourth World Series game and still is without a win in five series starts, gave up six hits, but two of these were extra-base blows that fired in each of the San Francisco runs.

In addition to McCovey's homer, Chuck Hiller led off the Giants' first inning with a double down the right field line which Maris nearly caught. A sacrifice bunt by Felipe Alou moved Hiller to third base, from where he scored on Matty Alou's grounder to Bobby Richardson.

Oregon Gets By San Jose St. 14-0

Eugene—(UPI)—A sluggish Oregon football team overcame its own mistakes with a tough defense Saturday for a 14-0 victory over the spirited Spartans of San Jose State.

Mel (The Marvel) Renfro passed 50 yards to halfback Larry Hill for one touchdown and scored the other himself on a one-yard plunge to climax a 79-yard drive.

Outside of those two thrusts, the Webfoots, favored to win by up to five touchdowns, failed to penetrate beyond the San Jose 19-yard line until the closing moments. A fumble stopped an Oregon drive on the 10 late in the game.

San Jose State, which lost its fourth straight game, missed two golden scoring opportunities after recovering Oregon fumbles.

In the first half, reserve Spartan center Steve Mumma fell on a fumble on the Oregon 34. San Jose drove to the 4, where Larry Hansen dropped a pass from quarterback Rand Carter in the end zone on a tackle-eligible play.

Oregon's Bob Berry fumbled on the first play of the second half and center Rod Thomas got the ball for San Jose on the Webfoot 15. Again the Spartans failed to crack Oregon's defense and were halted on the 9.

The longest San Jose drive came late in the third period after Dave Johnson intercepted a Berry pass on the San Jose 38. The Spartans moved to the Oregon 29, but Coach Len Casanova pulled his first team and rushed in his second unit. The reserves halted the visitors on the 25.

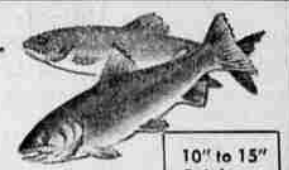
WHEELING
