

Business Women's Week Opens Today; Club Member Honored

National Business Women's week will be observed in the Rogue valley starting today by the Medford Business and Professional Women's club. Activities will continue throughout the week, ending October 14.

Theme for the week is "Leadership - A Dimension in Democracy." Mrs. E. H. Loveness is general chairman. The federation is the largest organized group in the world devoted entirely to the affairs and welfare of business and professional women.

The Medford club is the only women's club in the area which is a member of the Medford Chamber of Commerce.

Each year the Medford club selects an outstanding member who has also been identified with other activities to be honored as "Beep of the Week."

Own Nursery

Chosen as "Beep" this year is Mrs. Nell (F. R.) Faulkner. She and her husband are owners of Nurseryland in Central Point, formerly the Ornamental Nursery.

Mrs. Faulkner has been a member of BPW for the past six years having served as chairman of various committees, first vice president and two years as president.

She is presently first vice president of the Cascade chapter, Oregon Association of Nurserymen, and her hobbies, in addition to golf, center around nursery activities working with driftwood, cast stone, and similar articles.

Designing Park

At the present she is designing a four-acre recreational park for the City of Central Point, and during the past two years has worked with the Crater Lion's Home show. She also talks to small groups on landscape design.

The Faulkner have three sons - Hal, a captain in the Air Force who is an instructor pilot in Lubbock, Texas; Dennis, a senior at Oregon State university majoring in landscape architecture; and Gregg, a sophomore at Crater High school.

Prior to seven years ago, Mrs. Faulkner spent the majority of her time with her family and in Parent-Teacher association work. In 1955 she entered the business world by attending Robertson School of Business and has studied extensively during the past two years at Oregon State university attending short courses under the direction of Dr. Donald J. Martel, head of the landscape architecture department.

She has also studied under the landscape architects of Oregon's larger cities, the U.S. Forest service, state highway department, and in Portland.

She assisted in designing the octagon-shaped garden store being built at their nursery on Head road.

Mrs. Faulkner will be honored at special events throughout the week. This afternoon from 3 to 5 o'clock she will be honored at a tea at the home of Mrs. E. J. Brennan, 2409 Obispo drive.

Tuesday she will be interviewed over radio station KYJC at 10 a.m. and over KBOY at 1 p.m.

Miss Fern Trull, Grants Pass, will speak on "Leadership of Women in Foreign Fields" at a noon luncheon Wednesday, October 10, at Kim's restaurant. Special invitations have been extended to women's organizations of the community and all interested women are welcome.

Unless Medford Broadway Theater league workers can sell another 230 membership tickets, the proposed 1962-63 play series may have to be canceled. At an emergency meeting of workers last week, the sales were reviewed and Manville Heisel, chairman of the league board, pointed out that it will be impossible to sign a contract with the national booking firm unless the additional memberships are sold.

The sales period has been extended one more week, under the direction of Mrs. Arlon Skinner, telephone 772-8913. It was stressed that good seats are still available, and that a membership entitles the holder to the same seats for each performance.

It was suggested that memberships make acceptable Christmas gifts and also that two or more persons might buy one membership, with each owner attending one or more plays.

Proceeds from the series will help support the Junior Service league kindergarten for hard of hearing children.

If the series sales are successful this week, the first play will be "A Shot in the Dark" on November 19. This stars the actress, Annie Farge, who has been featured on a national television series in recent years. Miss Farge, a

graduate of the celebrated Comedie Francaise in Paris, is starred in this Leland Hayward production in the role of a chic French parlormaid in an aristocratic family. The play opens on the scene of a possible murder, with Miss Farge as the suspected killer. The interrogation of the

lovely and morally lax young lady is said to provide the "season's" most entertaining evening in the theater. The play is still running on Broadway, with Julie Harris starring. "Mary, Mary" which has been a Broadway sellout this year, is scheduled for January

and also booked for that month is "Carnival." A fourth play will be announced. Membership tickets will be mailed shortly before the first play. At least one after-theater party will be given during the season at which membership holders will be able to meet cast members.
