Guests from out of town included the bride's maternal aunt, Mrs. E. E. Sullins, Hayward, Calif.

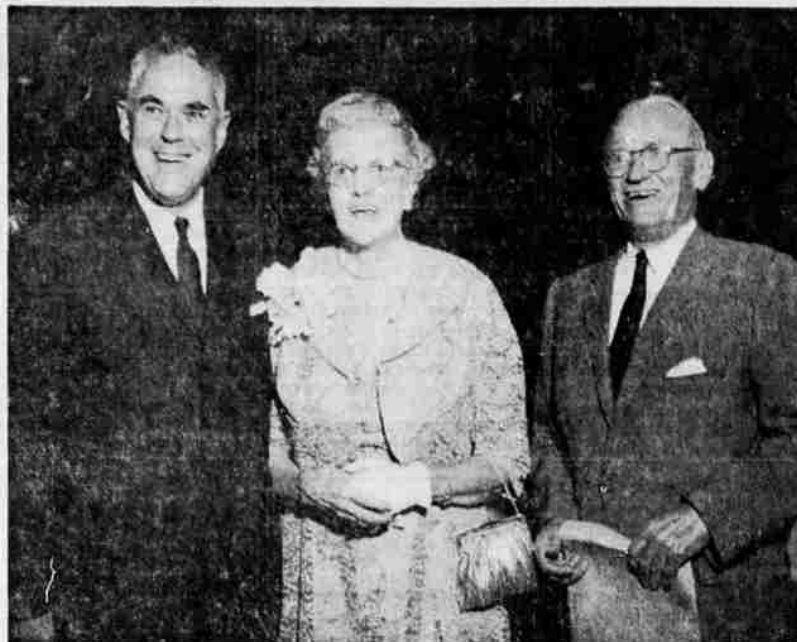
The couple made their wedding trip along the coast of southern California.
