The Girls Community club is observing its fifth year of operation in the new club building at 229 North Bartlett street. The building was a gift from the late John R. Tomlin, and the late Mrs. Helen Carpenter donated a large share of the furnishings.

No fund raising drives have been necessary as many gifts are received annually from interested persons and a large part of the services are by voluntary workers.

The club furnishes supervised housing at a low rental for young girls who are employed or going to business schools. The rooms accommodate 22 girls and a large lounge for their recreation is provided. Mrs. Mabel Houck, the housemother, has been with the Girls Community club for 17 years. Her living quarters are upstairs with the girls' rooms and she devotes her entire time to counseling and assisting with their many problems.

The girls in residence at present are from Talent, Ashland, Eagle Point, Rogue River, Grants Pass, Trail, Prospect, Cave Junction, Tiller, Redmond, and Glendale, Oregon, and Hornbrook, Calif. and Hawaii.

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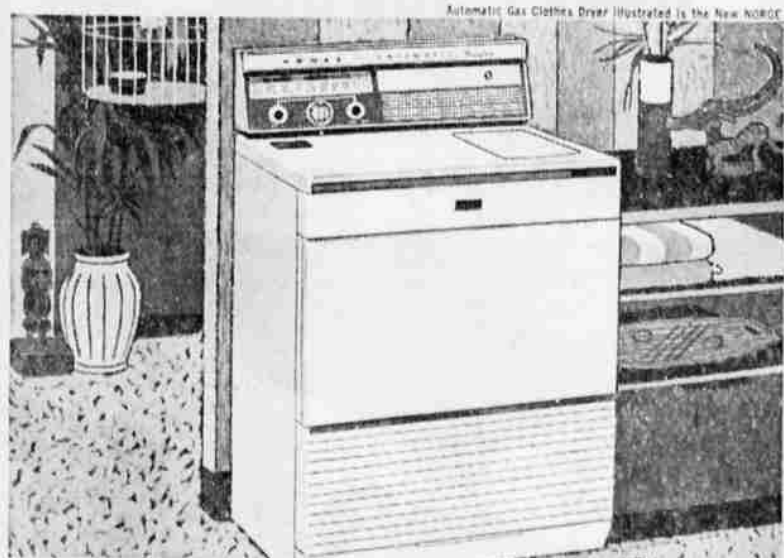
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
