First Lady Returns To Washington

Washington — Mrs. John F. Kennedy returns to the White House today to end a vacation of more than three months from the capital.

The first lady was scheduled to arrive at National Airport aboard the Kennedy family plane, the Caroline, at about 3 p.m. (edt) with her daughter Caroline and John Jr., 22 months.

Mrs. Kennedy had planned to return to Washington tomorrow but apparently cut short her vacation today so that President Kennedy could see his children before he takes off on another week end political trip.

On Thursday, Mrs. Kennedy will attend a "Commonwealth Cavalcade," a benefit fashion show of native costumes and fashions of British Commonwealth countries.

A full schedule of future events also is in store for Mrs. Kennedy.

She will attend a reception by the Fine Arts Institute in New York October 17 and October 23 she will greet at the White House a poet laureate who will be reading at the Library of Congress.

On October 26, she will make the presentation of the President's Cup at the International Horse Show. The following day, she will attend the opening of a collection of Old Masters' drawings at the National Gallery of Art.

Also in the art field, the First Lady will greet the International Council of the Museum of Modern Art on October 29.

She will go to the airport with the President October 30 to greet the Grand Duchess of Luxembourg. A state dinner will be held for the Grand Duchess that evening and the Kennedys will attend a return luncheon given by the Grand Duchess on October 31.

Caroline Kennedy's return to the White House means that she can get started in her newly integrated kindergarten class on the third floor. The classes started without her while she was vacationing with her mother.

Peanut Pie Adds Proteins To Meals

Peanuts, like meats, poultry, fish and dry peas and beans help supply the protein needed for growth and body repair. They also are rich in the important B-vitamins. So, if a day's meal is light and low in body-building protein, top it off with a peanut pie.

Dixie Dandy Peanut Pie
Three-fourth cup sugar; one cup dark corn syrup; one-half teaspoon salt; three eggs; two tablespoons butter; three-fourth cup peanuts, chopped; one teaspoon vanilla; one-fourth cup peanut halves; one-half recipe pastry.

Blend sugar, corn syrup and salt in a saucepan. Boil hard for two minutes, stirring constantly. Beat eggs slightly in a bowl. Slowly pour syrup mixture over eggs, stirring vigorously. Add butter, chopped peanuts and vanilla. Mix thoroughly.

Pour into an unbaked nine-inch pie shell and sprinkle with peanut halves. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees F) 45 to 55 minutes or until firm. To test, insert tip of silver knife in center. It should come out clean. Serve warm. Or cool and top with sweetened whipped cream.

OSU President Praises U.S. Education System

The education system of the United States is an oddity among the rest of the nations of the world, but it is the "secret ingredient" of our success as a democracy according to Dr. James L. Jensen, president of Oregon State university.

Dr. Jensen talked about education and communications at the annual fall conference of Oregon Press Women held over the week end in Corvallis. His talk was made Saturday night during a dinner at the Memorial Union building.

Among those at the conference were Mrs. Olive Starcher, women's editor of The Medford Mail Tribune and Mrs. Faith McCullough, Ashland, who served The Tribune as Ashland correspondent.

Dr. Jensen said the educational system of the United States is the only one in the world which attempts to help every individual fulfill his destiny. "Education has more to do with the welfare of a nation than any other factor," Dr. Jensen stressed.

In spite of the criticism leveled at the American education system from all sides, it is the envy of the rest of the world, the president declared. "If we change our system and the philosophy under which it operates, we will be turning our back on something unique and good," he added.

School Overloaded
Speaking of the problems of the public systems of higher education, Dr. Jensen said that Oregon State university has about 10,000 students this fall and added that the school has resources and facilities to handle only about half that number and do a really fine job. He said that the teaching staff is so over-loaded that the men and women have no time to do the reading and research they should do to keep abreast of events and their respective fields, and that they have too little time to prepare for their class teaching schedules.

He said that this somber picture must be borne in on the citizens of the state and that "our efforts for higher education must be more substantial and more pointed than they have been in the past." He stressed that since the world's areas of knowledge are constantly expanding, education systems must be expanded to keep pace. Dr. Jensen declared that high school students are arriving at college better prepared and with more knowledge of their subjects than they formerly did.

"Our problems are not hopeless," he said in closing, "but we must apply all our ingenuity to solve them. This is a big opportunity for everyone."

OPW women also heard a report from the Corvallis Gazette-Times and teachers in the Corvallis junior and senior high school on how the daily newspaper can be used to supplement many classroom subjects. The teachers, who had been trained in special workshops held at the University of California in recent years, said the daily newspaper can be made into an extremely effective teaching

tool for such subjects as English, geography, history, social studies and others.

One teacher said that pupils in the fourth grade who practically never read anything, including their text books, had been "led into" reading the daily newspaper and from that effort into a more normal approach to all their school subjects.
