

Minnesota, Baltimore Pondering Pitcher for Catcher Exchange Deal

New York — (UPI) — Calvin Griffith admitted today there is a "good possibility" Minnesota and Baltimore may complete a deal in which the Twins would get either Milt Pappas or Chuck Estrada for Earl Battey.

Griffith and president Lee MacPhail of the Orioles have already discussed the trade, and one of the reasons it has been held up is that the Twins aren't sure which of the two right-handed Baltimore pitchers they prefer.

Pappas, 23, won 12 games and lost 10 for the Orioles this season, while Estrada, also 23, turned in a disappointing 9-17 record.

"I want to check with the scouts in our organization and find out whom they like bet-

ter, Pappas or Estrada," Griffith explained. "I know they are both good pitchers but naturally we'd like to have the better one of the two."

Might Have Won
Griffith feels the Twins, who finished second in the American league this year, might have overtaken the Yankees if they would have had one more dependable pitcher.

Hence, his willingness to give up the 26-year-old Battey, who is still considered the No. 1 catcher in the circuit even though he failed off badly during the second half of the campaign.

Battey batted .302 in 1961 but dropped to .287 this year, driving in 37 runs. He has spent eight seasons in the AL, breaking in with the Chicago White Sox in 1955.

In addition to their talks with the Twins, the Orioles also have been discussing a possible deal with the Cincinnati Reds, who are interested in first baseman Jim Gentile.

To get Gentile, the Reds might give up first baseman Gordon Coleman along with catcher Jesse Gonder, who led the Pacific Coast league in hitting this year with San Diego and also was named the "Minor League Player of the Year."

SO Harriers To Run at Sacramento

Portland — Coach Dan Bulkley's cross country team will travel to California on Friday afternoon to compete in the Sacramento Invitational cross country meet on Saturday at 12:30 p.m.

This will be a large meet with several of the larger California college and universities competing.

Bulkley has named Norm Oyster, Terry Boatman, Jerry Arndt, Ken Coffman, Harry Cougle, and George Ives as his team for this week end. This will be the first time a Southern Oregon squad has competed in the Sacramento Invitational.

The Raider coach stated, "We don't know what we are getting into. We will give it a good try." Bulkley revealed that Stanford, the Cal Aggies and several other of the larger schools will compete.

Two weeks ago the Raider runners dropped a three-point decision to the Lewis and Clark Pioneers in Portland. Oyster netted first place in the race. Jerry Arndt nabbed third for the Redmen.

All six of the foregoing SOC runners have been constantly working out and are in much better shape than when they ran in Portland. Coffman stated it would be a "real tough meet," as most of the schools should be a lot larger than Southern Oregon.

Boutin Named To NAIA Squad

Kansas City — (UPI) — Jim Boutin, who led Lewis and Clark to a Northwest conference basketball title last season, Tuesday was named to a 12-man National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics team which will play a Russian team next month.

Boutin, a 6-5 center from Powers, averaged 19.1 points in 29 games last year and set school scoring and rebounding records.

One game with the Russians will be played Nov. 16 at Sioux Falls, S.D., and the other Nov. 14 or 19 at a site to be selected.

Bill Barnes Honored by UPI Board

Los Angeles — (UPI) — The team was playing its first game of the season, using a new system and meeting the school rated No. 1 in the nation in the first ratings of the year.

But the coach told his players before the game that they could win.

At halftime, trailing by a point but with all the statistics against them, the coach still insisted they could win.

And the UCLA Bruins justified their coach's confidence by coming from behind in the fourth quarter to defeat the mighty Ohio State Buckeyes, 9-7, in one of the great upsets of the 1962 season.

For that performance and his faith in his players, 44-year-old Bill Barnes today was named the United Press International's college football "Coach of the Week."

"My greatest concern was that the players, using the T-formation for the first time at UCLA and going up against a team of Ohio State's caliber, would be tight," Barnes said. "I wanted to counteract that by telling them they could win."

And Barnes said that he really felt the Bruins had a chance to beat the Buckeyes because last year UCLA led Ohio State for three periods of their game only to drop a 13-3 decision in the fourth quarter.

"And Ohio State didn't have the great Bob Ferguson this year," Barnes added.

Joe Cronin Looms as Czar Choice

New York — (UPI) — Bigwigs attending the World Series are touting Joe Cronin, the American league president, as the man most likely to succeed Ford Frick as the commissioner of baseball.

Frick, now 68, is nearing the retirement age.

Other candidates for the job include Judge Robert Cannon, the major league players' representative, and former Vice President Richard Nixon, if he is beaten in California's gubernatorial race.

Mickey Mantle, who broke a Babe Ruth Series record by gaining his 34th walk in Monday's fourth game, is approaching another Ruth record. The next homer Mickey hits will enable him to tie Ruth for most Series homers.

The Giants have split the first four games with the Yankees without the help of three of their biggest hitters. Harvey Kuenn is 0-for-8, Willie McCovey is 1-for-7, and Orlando Cepeda is 0-for-12.

The Series record for futility was posted by Gil Hodges of the Dodgers in 1952. He went 0-for-21.

San Francisco pinch hitters are batting 1.000 in the current Series. Manager Alvin Dark has used only two pinch swingers and both have reached base. The Yankees are 1-for-2 in this department.

Bill Skowron is the leading Yankee hitter with a .375 average. He was held hitless in the first three games but then went 4-for-3 in the fourth game. Rookie Tom Tresh is the Yankees' second leading hitter with a .333 mark based on 6 hits in 17 at-bats.

The Giants' leading hitter is Jose Pagan with 3 for 10 and a .300 average.

The Yankees, regarded as the sluggers going into this "war," have hit only one homer in four games (Clete Boyer in first game). The Giants have hit four in four games. But San Francisco players haven't stolen a base while the Yankees are 3-for-3 in this department.

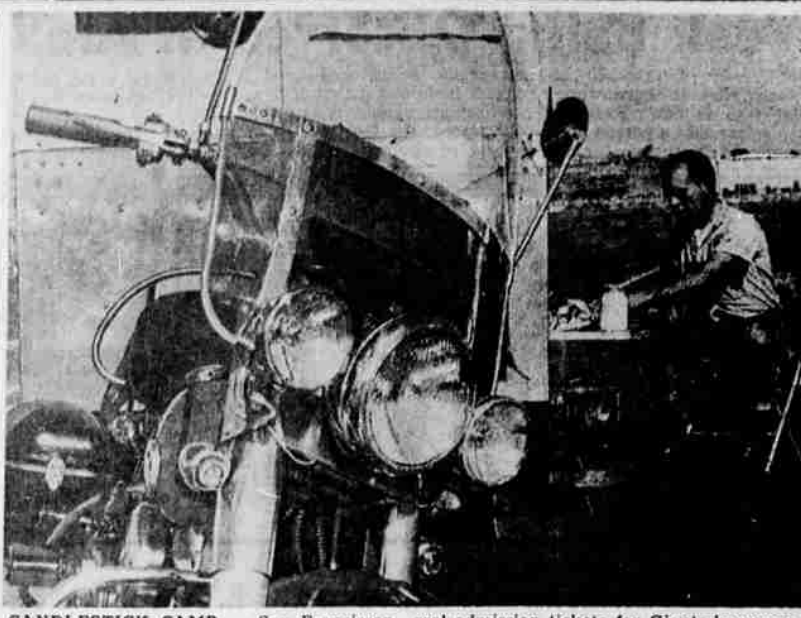
TYPHOON HITS ISLAND

Sanford Terms Postponement Of Series Game Big Letdown

New York — (UPI) — Pitcher Jack Sanford of the San Francisco Giants is a worry-wart.

He called Tuesday's World Series game postponement a "big letdown," and let him tell you why.

"It takes all I've got physically and mentally to work up for a game. It's a real struggle."

And Sanford, who worked himself up to a perfect state for the second game of the series in which he pitched a three-hit, 2-0 shutout, had attained what he regarded as another peak Tuesday — only to have Commissioner Ford Frick shatter his ambition with the inevitable announcement of a postponement.

"Now I'll have to throw it all over again," said the 33-year-old right-hander as the announcement droned through Yankee Stadium.

"Sometimes," he said, "you can lose a little bit with too much rest. I just don't know how this will affect me. I won't know until I start to warm up, and it will be a long warmup because I have not thrown since my game at San Francisco."

Dark Not Worried!
Manager Al Dark wasn't worried about his sturdy right-hander, who had a 24-7 record during the regular season, nor did Al see the postponement made any difference to either club.

Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick, who has the only say on a World Series postponement, waited until the situation was hopeless Tuesday before he finally called off the game.

"I realized all the problems concerned — transportation and tickets among them — and finally had to give up when all the advance favorable weather forecasts did not hold up," Frick said.

Managers Agree
The two rival managers, Ralph Houk of the Yankees and Alvin Dark of the Giants, agreed the game should have been postponed. They also agreed the postponement gave neither team any advantage.

Made of Stern Stuff
Washington — (UPI) — Members of Congress are striving mightily to tie up the loose ends of the current session and I want to help them all that I can. Cliffhanger Anticipated When Oregon State Plays Washington on Saturday

Portland — (UPI) — If there isn't another "cliffhanger" when Washington's Huskies come to town Saturday it'll be a bigger surprise than the Giants' four-run ninth inning which knocked the Dodgers out of the National League pennant.

The Huskies play football in Portland every season, alternating between Oregon State and Oregon. And you have to go back five years before you can find a game that was settled by more than two points.

This Saturday it's Oregon State's turn — and the game really has been buzzing.

Washington's Puget Sound powerhouse is unbeaten and ranked sixth in the nation in the UPI coaches' poll.

Oregon State is just off a 27-0 upset of Stanford — the team that downed Michigan State. And the Beavers have Terry Baker — the man his own coach, Tommy Prothro, referred to last Saturday as "the greatest quarterback who ever played college football."

That may have been an over-enthusiastic burst — but you can get an argument around these parts if you say he isn't.

Games Recalled
Four years ago Oregon State took a 14-12 thriller from Washington at Multnomah Stadium.

The next season the Huskies came to town with a team that eventually wound up in the Rose Bowl. They trailed Oregon 12-0 and then took a

13-12 lead. Bob Schloredt intercepted a Dave Gross pass in the end zone in the dying moments to preserve a Husky victory by that one point.

In 1960, Terry Baker was a sophomore. The Rose Bowl games were overwhelming favorites — and they finally won over Oregon State 30-29 but only after trailing 29-15 and surviving a 302-yard air and ground performance by Baker.

Last season Oregon took a 7-6 thriller from Washington here — when a Husky pass for two extra points was off its mark.

Last season, too, Oregon State upset the Huskies 3-0 in their own back yard in Seattle.

So you might say both teams will be seeking "revenge" this Saturday — Washington for its defeat last season and Oregon State for its 30-29 loss here two years ago.

If the Huskies are as good as they're ranked they could run away with it — but don't bet on it.

Russian Fishing Inspection Planned
Kodiak, Alaska — (UPI) — Federal and state officials planned to leave today aboard the Coast Guard cutter Storin on an inspection tour of a massive Russian fishing fleet off the eastern coast of Kodiak Island.

State Department fisheries assistant William C. Herrington and Ralph C. Baker of the U.S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries were to accompany Alaska Gov. William Egan on the trip.

The Russian fishing flotilla, estimated at between 115 and 135 vessels by Navy authorities, extends over an area the length of Kodiak Island.

Candlestick Expansion Considered

San Francisco — (UPI) — The World Series has created the question of possible expansion of Candlestick Park, home of the San Francisco Giants.

City Controller Harold Ross said Tuesday he expects to know within two weeks whether it will be possible to increase the size of the municipally-owned stadium. Under consideration is a proposal to increase the 42,500-seat ball park to a 65,000-seat baseball football stadium.

Sellout World Series crowds and recent wind studies have led sports fans to observe that the Candlestick Park playing field could be enclosed by additional stands to increase capacity and keep out wind.

Both right and left field stands have been designed so they can be extended into center field. The present design also allows possible changes to make room for a gridiron for San Francisco Forty Niners games.

The Forty Niners currently play in the 60,000-seat Kezar Stadium.

Red Raider Win Among Grid Upsets

Portland — There were a few upsets around the nation this past week end. UCLA handed the Ohio State Buckeyes a 9-7 setback and USC trimmed Iowa by a 7-0 count.

And then, among the small colleges, Southern Oregon college spilled Sacramento State, 21-7. The California squad came to Oregon as a two-touchdown favorite.

Raider mentor Al Akins had this to say after the encounter: "The Hornets played a good hard, tough ball game. They were a real good team but just ran into a few bad breaks."

Perhaps Akins should have said the Hornets ran into a few tough men, along with those bad breaks. Southern Oregon's defensive effort was the determining factor in the outcome of the contest. Sacramento fumbled five times, losing four of them, with three of the fumbles leading directly to Raider touchdowns.

Fumbles Recovered
No one single Raider defensive man could be singled out for his effort alone. However, Dick Reiling, Jess Mun-Baker must be given credit in their efforts. Munyon, Reiling, and Baker all recovered fumbles, as Buck came up with a key pass interception on his own five yard line.

The Hornets were a good fast well-balanced team, but they just couldn't seem to get going. Gene Reyes, fullback and leading ground gainer for the Hornets, was sidelined most of the game from a bad leg. In the second half, Reyes entered the game and literally ate up the yardage.
