New York (UPI)—Texas and Alabama, the country's top college football powerhouses, were established heavy favorites today to remain unbeaten in Saturday games.

## Ohio State Can Accept Bowl Offer

Columbus, Ohio (UPI)—The Ohio State university football team, stopped at the goal line last year by the faculty council in a bid for a trip to the Rose Bowl, has the council's approval to play in the post-season classic.

By a stand-up vote of 36-20, the faculty council late Tuesday approved the athletic council's unanimous recommendation that the team be allowed to make the trip to Pasadena if invited. The stand-up vote came after efforts to have a secret ballot failed.

The 1962 football team now has to win the Big Ten championship for the second consecutive year in order to be invited to the New Year's Day classic.

Debate at the council meeting was long, but not so heated as last year when the group voted, 28-25, in opposition to the 1961 Big Ten champion Buckeyes accepting an informal invitation to the game.

The earlier decision set off a noisy demonstration on the campus and a march by students on the downtown area. The campus seethed with resentment for several days before demonstrations ended.

Since then, the university's alumni association has been racked by an internal battle between those in favor of the Rose Bowl trip and those opposed, headed by alumni secretary John B. Fylen.

When last year's decision was made, there was no bowl contract between the Big Ten and the Athletic Association of Western Universities. Minnesota made the trip on its own, however. Since then, the Big Ten and the Big Five signed an agreement to send teams to the Rose Bowl for an indefinite period.

er Ohio State and Alabama to pace the voting in the United Press International Board of Coaches balloting this week, were picked by 13½ points over Oklahoma while the Crimson Tide were an even more prohibitive choice to down Houston, the point spread being 21.

Only Penn State, Washington and Northwestern among the top-ranked teams figured to be involved in tough scraps, but all were picked to win. Penn State was a seven-point pick over Army, Washington was 6½ over Oregon State and Northwestern, a newcomer to the top 10, was a slim half-point choice over Minnesota.

### Arkansas Choice

In other games involving top-ranked teams, Arkansas was selected by 19½ points over Baylor and Purdue by 20 over Miami of Ohio.

Ohio State, which dropped to 12th place following its loss to UCLA was a 2½-point favorite to bounce back against Illinois.

Attendants said Lavorante was in a light coma, his condition serious.

Paul (Pinkie) George, Lavorante's manager, said the fighter was able to move his arms on command and said his general condition appeared good, but the coma persisted.

## Flyweight Title Won By Harada

Tokyo (UPI)—Fighting Harada, 19, of Japan, won the world flyweight championship today when he dethroned Pone Kingpetch of Thailand with an 11th-round knockout.

Kingpetch, blinded by blood running from his left eye and nose, just missed the saving grace of the bell when he was counted out in two minutes and 50 seconds of the round.

Harada, who has lost only one fight in 28 professional bouts, was a 3-2 underdog when he entered the ring for the scheduled 15-round event. But he was the aggressor all the way as Kingpetch was finally beaten down in his own corner.

## Cougars Lead Big Six Stats

San Francisco (UPI)—Newcomer Washington State dominates latest individual Big Six statistics with winners in four categories.

Dave Mathieson, senior Cougar quarterback, is the top passer with 32 out of 53 for 471 yards and four touchdowns. He also leads the total offense department with 448 yards. Cal's Larry Balliet is the loop's number two passer with 24 completions for 233 yards and USC's Bill Nelson is second in total offense at 270 yards.

Hugh Campbell of Washington State, who sets a career record with every pass reception, leads the league with 17 grabs for 236 yards.

The Cougar's George Reed has hit three touchdowns and a pair of two-point conversions to lead Campbell in the scoring race 22-20.

Cal soph Jerry Walter kicked for the first time in his career last week and promptly took over the league leadership after booting four times at 43 yards a kick.

Al Nelson of Cal is the leading rusher with 195 yards on 37 carries. Reed is second with 133 yards, followed by Bob Monroe of Washington at 132.
