

Feeding the Family

Lamb Shanks DeLuxe

Treat the family to that good lamb flavor for a change. For extra generous servings for hungry men and boys, figure on one shank per serving.

- 4 lamb shanks
- 1 cup shortening
- 1 salt and pepper
- 2 tablespoons instant minced onion
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup ripe olives
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 1 can condensed cream of tomato soup

Dust lamb shanks with flour. Brown in heated shortening in heavy skillet. Add seasoning, onion and water. Cover tightly and cook over low heat, 1 1/2 hours, adding a little water if needed. Cut olives into large pieces and combine with dairy sour cream and tomato soup. Skim any fat from meat and pour olive mixture over shanks. Continue cooking in covered skillet until tender, 20 to 30 minutes depending on size of shanks.

Pudding Meringue

Using leftover bread slices in pudding is an old and favored trick. Give it a new and intriguing twist by simply saving one egg white out of the eggs in the pudding; beat stiff and season with sugar and spice. When pudding is ready for oven, cover with this meringue and bake until puffed and light brown.

Sauced Meat Loaf

Lettor meat loaf will seem new and quite different when served a second time topped with this tasty sauce. Combine two cups applesauce, two tablespoons mustard-with-horseradish, two tablespoons Worcestershire sauce and three tablespoons tomato catsup. Serve hot or cold on slices of the reheated meat loaf.

Spiced Fresh Pears

If you're putting up peaches, you'd better be about it quickly. Bartlett pears, however, will be around for a few more weeks. Few foods are more satisfying than "a little something I spiced myself". Recipe, so easy, makes six pints.

- 15 to 18 firm fresh pears or peaches
- Boiling water to cover
- Whole cloves
- 2 cups white sugar
- 2 cups brown sugar
- 1/2 cup water or pear liquid
- 2 cups cider vinegar
- 3 sticks whole cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon whole allspice
- and 1 ginger root tied in bag

Wash fruit. Remove blossom end but leave stems attached. Leave small fruit whole, half or quarter the larger ones. Remove core if fruit is quartered or halved. Cover with water. Boil until almost tender, about five minutes. Drain, saving one-half cup liquid for syrup. Stud each pear with two or three whole cloves. Combine remaining ingredients; boil about five minutes. Drop in enough pears at one time to fill a jar. Cook until tender (test with a toothpick). Remove spice bag. Pack pears in hot sterilized jars; fill with boiling syrup within one-fourth inch of top. Place one-half stick cinnamon in each

jar. Slide a knife down side of jars to release air bubbles. Wipe off jar tops; adjust lids and seal at once.

Green Beans Amandine

For eight servings, cook two packages (10 ounce) frozen julienne beans according to package directions; add 1 1/2 teaspoons Ac'cent along with one half teaspoon salt. While beans are cooking, melt one-third cup butter in skillet. Add one-third cup sliced almonds; brown until almonds are lightly browned. Toss with hot cooked beans.

Watch for Meat Specials

Meat situation bears constant watching, and smart shoppers are picking out the specials which are likely to include fresh, smoked and canned ham. Fresh beef and fancy pork cuts are at highest prices noted in years with occasional specials however on beef cuts for braising and other long slow cooking methods.

Poultry of all kinds are enjoying increased popularity through their prices, too, are up a little because of exceptional demand. Special emphasis is on broiler-fryers and turkeys. Eggs and cheese are fine, thrifty meat substitutes that offer menu variety.

Fish and Shellfish

There's a wealth of regional fish and shellfish, both fresh and frozen waiting for those who seek variety and good as well as economical eating. Canned tuna and sardines are bargain priced.

Produce Departments

There's a new look in vegetable departments as sweet corn and cucumbers give way to sweet potatoes, cauliflower and brussels sprouts. Other plentiful so temptingly displayed include tomatoes which are especially abundant at this season and purple eggplant which is popular both sauced or simply sliced and fried. Artichokes and broccoli supplies are on the increase.

Apples are coming with Washington Delicious glowing red and handsome for out-of-hand eating. Peaches are going along with purple plums. Grapes are piled high in lush abundance with Thompson seedless at their peak of perfection. Bartlett pears are at their luscious, juicy best.

Cheese Festival

October is Cheese Festival month, which means "special" interest will be given this versatile product in all its diversified forms. The great variety of cheese enables even the novice cook to add her own touch to old-time recipes by varying the kind of cheese used or by adding this flavor-some food to a meat, casserole, sandwich or dessert.

All-Time High Is Noted in Deposits

An all-time high in total deposits at a call, plus continued substantial gains in loans and total resources of U.S. National Bank of Portland, were reflected in figures released to the comptroller of currency as of Sept. 28, 1962.

Loans were up more than \$68 million to \$481,962,937 compared to \$413,643,148 recorded Sept. 27, 1961. Deposits increased in excess of \$75 million to \$936,951,992 compared to \$861,019,494 recorded a year ago, it was pointed out.

The downtown Medford branch recorded total deposits of \$23,805,053.87, according to Allan F. Perry, manager.

Loans and discounts for the branch totaled \$11,138,439.61. U.S. National's North Medford branch showed deposits totaling \$2,252,346.84 and loans and discounts totaling \$2,029,956.10.

Manager Dwight L. Houghton reported. Total resources for the U.S. National system, with its 35 banking offices throughout the state topped \$1 billion, up nearly \$77 million from \$956,748,412 recorded Sept. 27, 1961.
