Collins Returns From Meetings Of Park Officials

Charles Collins, executive vice president of Cal-Ore Recreation Development Association, Medford, returned this week from two national meetings on outdoor recreation, the American Institute of Park Executives at Kansas City, Mo., and the American Institute of Park Executives at Zion, Ill.

Dr. Edward C. Crafts, Washington, D.C., director of the new federal bureau of outdoor recreation in the department of interior, was the key speaker at both sessions.

State governments should play pivotal roles in keeping abreast of the increasing public pressure for outdoor recreation opportunities, the bureau director said.

It is too late for decisions as to whether government wishes to be in the recreation business. Government at all levels is now in that business, like it or not, he added.

Consider Revenue Bonds

He suggested that states and local governments might consider revenue bonds as means of financing capital investments in outdoor recreation, Collins reported.

Role of the new bureau of outdoor recreation is to provide a focal point within the federal government for outdoor recreation activities.

The bureau is charged with coordination of federal agency outdoor recreation programs, stimulation and provision of technical, cooperative and planning assistance to states, sponsorship and conduct of outdoor recreation research, encouragement of interstate and regional cooperation on outdoor recreation projects, conduct recreation resource surveys and administration of such state grant-in-aid programs as may be established by Congress.

Series of Earthquakes Shake Area in Italy

Siena, Italy (UPI)—A series of earthquakes, one of them violent enough to send people running into the streets, rumbled through this area Tuesday but there were no reports of damage or injuries.

The quakes were centered in an area about five miles northwest of Siena.

Miller Burial To Take Place in Seashore Area

San Rafael, Calif. (UPI)—Rep. Clem Miller, 45, will be buried Saturday in or near the Point Reyes National Seashore, for which he fought so hard in Congress.

The Democrat was killed Sunday when the light plane in which he was riding crashed in heavy weather east of Eureka, Calif. Two others were also killed in the crash.

Memorial services were to be held for him in Washington and a graveside funeral has been scheduled for Saturday. The exact site has not been selected but several in the Point Reyes area are under consideration. Most of the pallbearers will be California congressmen.

In lieu of flowers, it was requested that contributions to acquire land for Point Reyes National Seashore be sent to Nature Conservancy, 2039 K St., Northwest, Washington 6, D.C., or to 1711 Grove St., Berkeley, Calif.

His widow and five daughters sat in a gallery box Tuesday as the House of Representatives eulogized Miller, who had represented the 1st District since 1955.

Speaker John McCormack, Democrat of Massachusetts, called Miller "one of the most pleasant and able men ever to sit in this hall."

"Clem Miller was deeply concerned with the general welfare of the American people."

"He was not concerned with political pettiness," Effective Ideology.

William S. Moorehead (D-Pa.) said that Miller was "an effective idealist, the rarest jewel in the political scene."

Rep. John F. Baldwin Jr. (R-Calif.) said of his former associate:

"His fight for the National Seashore at Point Reyes was a model of service to the people of his district."

"He worked out every detail so no one could be unfairly treated."

Another California Republican, Charles C. Gubser, said "We have lost a man who got things done the right way, the fair way, the honest way."

Candidate Speaks At Toastmasters

"We must work to encourage greater economic development of the state," Al Bradford, Democratic candidate for state representative, told members of the Medford Toastmasters this week.

Bradford favored continued work through the department of planning and development to attract new industry to Oregon, research programs in the universities to find new products and markets for Oregon factories, farms and businesses and more emphasis on foreign trade program.

Other speakers during the evening were Dr. Tom Rutter, who spoke on "Segregation" and Walter Nunley, whose topic was "Irresponsibility."

Geological Specimens Said Lost in Britain

London (UPI)—Sir Vivian Fuchs, head of Britain's Antarctic survey, disclosed today that three crates of valuable geological specimens have been lost somewhere in Britain.

He said the specimens were brought back to Britain safely 9,000 miles from the Antarctic and then lost by a truck driver in the 135 miles between Southampton and Birmingham.

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23 Fires Reported In Forest in Year

In an average year, there are 66 fires in the Rogue River National forest, and they burn an average of 209 acres.

But so far this year, there have been only 23 fires in the forest, and the total acreage burned amounts to one acre.

The total acreage burned figure of one will set a new record if it does not increase substantially before Dec. 31. The previous record low number of acres burned is 27, set last year.

There have been years when fewer than 23 fires were reported, however.

Of the 23 fires this year, 22 were of the "spot" variety, burning small areas. The other fire burned almost one acre.

Fourteen of the fires were caused by lightning. Nine were man caused, forest officials said.

Missing Motorist Search Continues

Roseburg (UPI)—A missing motorist was traced to within two miles of the North Umpqua Highway Tuesday night and police said they would continue searching.

Subject of the search was Herbert Warden, 66, Santa Barbara, Calif. He was last seen Sept. 29 when he checked into a Roseburg hotel, leaving his baggage. His car was found two days later stuck on a logging road east of here.

Police said four hunting parties have reported they saw Warden on Panther Creek rd. Sept. 30.

Two days of rain hampered search efforts. Bloodhounds were unsuccessful Tuesday in trying to pick up a scent.

Warden suffered from a heart ailment.
