Foreign Affairs Study Urged by BPWC Speaker

The average citizen of the United States knows too little about international affairs and the nation's foreign policy, according to Miss Fern Trull, Grants Pass High school history teacher who spoke yesterday for a luncheon meeting of Medford Business and Professional Women's club.

The luncheon was a part of the week-long observance of National Business Women's week here and honored Mrs. F. R. (Neil) Faulkner, Beep of the Week for 1962.

Using Cuba as an example, Miss Trull said it isn't enough to denounce Castro and communism. Most residents of this country are totally ignorant of the circumstances that led up to the revolution in Cuba, of the real causes of it and fail to comprehend the complexities of the situation when they demand certain action of the government.

Study Stressed

"Whenever anyone says to me they aren't interested in foreign affairs and what goes on in Europe or Asia or Africa, I tell them 'your pay check is affected by what goes on in those countries and you should know more about it.'"

Miss Trull said, "Make foreign affairs a part of your daily life." She also urged more international affairs subjects in our schools, and suggested her listeners read about taxes, foreign aid, the Peace Corps and international trade. She spoke about the Great Decisions program, which in eight weeks every year tries to focus attention on some of the world's pressing problems, and said, "We should have Great Decisions study the year around." She urged women's groups to augment their programs about foreign policy.

The speaker said that many citizens of this country "resent that we are a world power" and don't want to take the responsibilities which world

leadership brings. "We're never again going to be isolated and safe," she stressed.

Miss Trull pointed out that with the working week growing shorter and shorter in this country, everyone should give thought to what he does in his spare time. "Are we just going to hunt for more ways in which to amuse ourselves?" she asked.

The teacher said women in the European, Asian and African countries are taking an increased part in their own governments, urged her listeners to concern themselves with politics and government and said men and women should share equally in such responsibilities. She pointed out that leadership is the theme of the

1962 Business Women's week. Mrs. C. H. Redmond, club president, welcomed the guests and Mrs. Catherine Caldwell introduced the speaker. Representatives of about a dozen women's service, civic and fraternal groups of the valley were present.

Mrs. Walter Entriiken and Mrs. Paul Shelton, members of the Grants Pass Business and Professional Women's club accompanied Miss Trull and were luncheon guests.

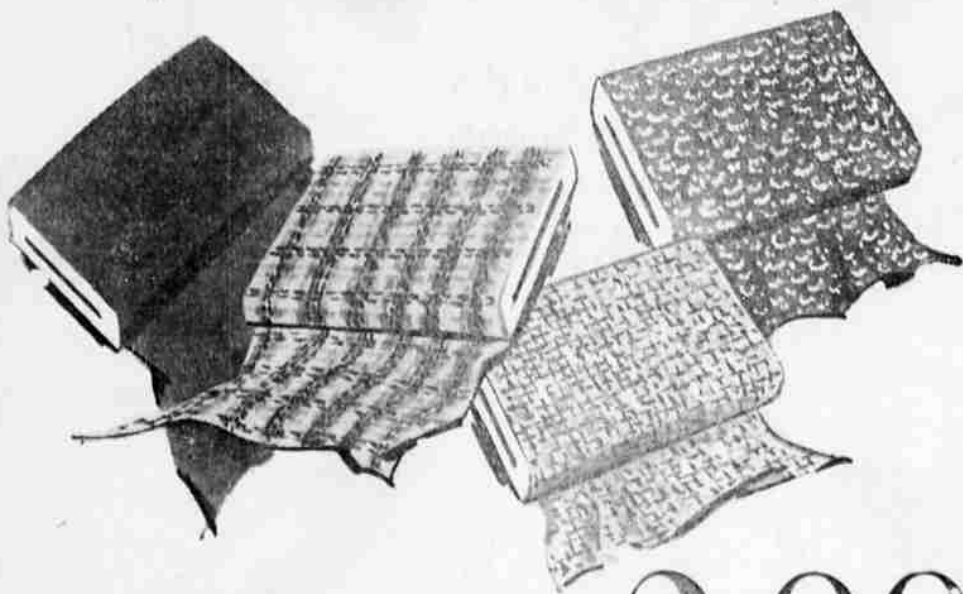
