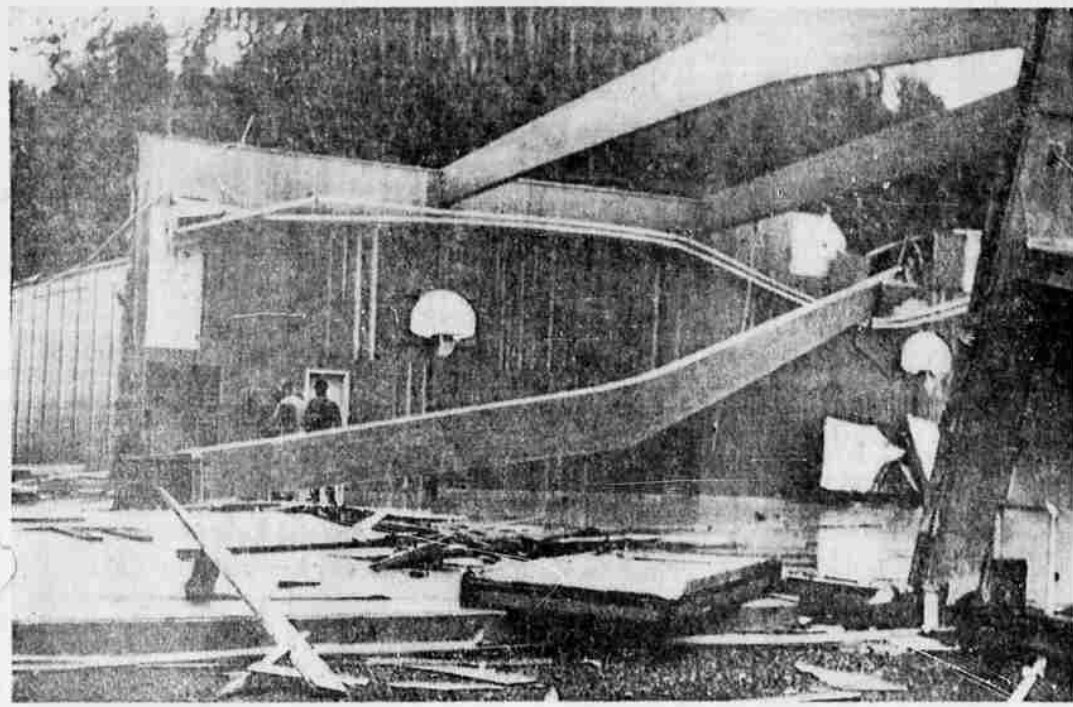


GOLD BEACH STORM TOLL HEAVY

Entire Coast Braces for New Weather Assault

Town Without Telephone Service

Port Orford, Ore. — A hard hit Oregon coast town of Gold Beach county today while the entire coast braced for a new packing gale force winds heavy rain.

The Weather Bureau in Portland hoisted a gale warning along the coast for winds to 60 knots in stronger gusts.

San Francisco — (UPI) — A fierce storm pounded the Pacific Coast from Washington to Central California today, causing at least eight deaths and widespread damage and flooding.

Rain totals for 24 hours of up to 9.43 inches were reported in Northern California this morning. Blue Canyon had the highest total. Others were Santa Rosa 4.57, San Francisco 1.85, Oakland Airport 2.53, Cloverdale 8.37 and North Burlingame 4.20.

Funds for Three Oregon Projects Gain New Life

Washington — (UPI) — Funds for three Oregon projects gained new life today.

Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore.) reported that House-Senate conferees approved \$100,000 for the Columbia river channel project, \$200,000 for Yaquina bay, and \$300,000 for the Blue river reservoir.

The funds were part of a supplemental Senate appropriations bill passed by the Senate Thursday night. It included \$1,870,000 for five Oregon projects and eight in other parts of the country.

Cut By Conferees

The U.S. projects had been chopped out of another bill last week by House-Senate conferees.

Their defeat at that time came in the midst of an out-spoken feud between Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) and Rep. Mike Kirwan (D-Ohio). Kirwan said he opposed the Oregon money because he considered Morse an "ingrate."

The supplemental Senate bill also included \$143,000 for Mason dam and \$20,000 for the Pendleton irrigation project.

Morse told the Senate "common justice and fair treatment calls for these additions." He said the President supported the Oregon projects.

The bill agreed upon in conference requires approval by both houses.

Court Signs Order For District Levy

The Jackson county court signed an order this morning setting \$17,035 as a figure in the levy for Prospect school district to pay for its bonded indebtedness and interest.

When the school district set its budget earlier it did not include enough money to pay for bonds outstanding, plus interest. County Commissioner Chester Wendt explained. County Treasurer Karl Janouch noticed this and asked the court for an order to include the needed amount.

Wendt noted that there are one or two school districts every year which fail to include sufficient sums in their budgets for retirement of bonds plus interest.

Mt. Ashland Resort Could Be Operating In 1964, Wiese Says

The proposed Mt. Ashland ski area could be in operation by fall of 1964, according to Ralph Wiese, recreation development officer for the Rogue River National Forest.

Approximately 75 persons interested in the development of the ski area met in the Mark Anthony hotel in Ashland last night to hear the development plans discussed and hear comparisons with such ski areas as Bachelor Butte, near Bend, and Mt. Hood.

William Patton, Ashland Chamber of Commerce president and chairman of last night's meeting, said a steering committee is working out an overall plan of action for development of the ski resort. A second general meeting will be called in the near future.

\$8.5 Million To Be Collected in County

Jackson county's 1962-63 tax roll shows a total of \$8,526,325.94 to be collected this year by the county sheriff's office. This is an increase of more than \$949,000 over last year's total.

The county assessor's office sent the tax roll to the sheriff's office today, according to Assessor Thad Hatten. The amount is based on a total assessed valuation of \$103,448,929, an increase of \$4,957,211 over last year.

More than 25,000 tax statements will be mailed by the department early next week. Persons paying their tax in full prior to Nov. 15 will again receive a 3 per cent discount.

Hatten stressed that there will not be a levy for county expenses. The increases in tax are all due to increases in the budget requirements of schools, cities, and special districts.

The percentages of tax for the various services this year as 79.8 per cent to schools, 18.3 per cent cities, 1.3 per cent rural fire protection districts, 4 per cent water districts and 2 per cent for sanitary districts.

Russia Expels U.S. Embassy Political Officer

Moscow — (UPI) — The Soviet Union today ordered the expulsion of U.S. Embassy political officer Kermit Midthun, 41. He was the second American diplomat ordered out of the Soviet Union in a week.

The order for Midthun's ouster came in a note handed to Embassy Minister-Counselor John McSweeney, who was summoned to the Foreign Ministry to receive it.

A week ago today McSweeney received a similar summons for the expulsion of Lt. Cmdr. Raymond Smith, U.S. assistant naval attaché who was accused of spying while on a visit to Leningrad. The United States denied the charge.

Today's Soviet statement charged that Midthun, a native of Montana but a resident of San Francisco, "tried to induce a Soviet citizen, employee of a Soviet institution, to transmit to him information of a secret character."

"Incompatible Activities" — According to an embassy spokesman, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs said Midthun's activities were "incompatible with the status of an accredited diplomat" and that "his continued presence was undesirable" in the Soviet Union.

The spokesman said he had been told the details would be published.

The embassy spokesman said the action against Midthun was "another case of reprisal for the expulsion of the two Soviet UN diplomats from the United States last month."

The two Soviet employees of the United Nations in New York were ousted after they were caught buying U.S. defense secrets from an American sailor.

Body of Missing Motorist Located

Roseburg — (UPI) — The body of a missing California motorist was found by volunteer searchers in a rugged timbered area about 60 miles east of here Thursday.

Herbert Warden, 66, Santa Barbara, was missing since Sept. 29 after checking into a hotel at Roseburg.

State police said he apparently died of a heart attack.

Police theorized that Warden went for a drive after leaving the hotel, his car became stuck on a logging road and he was stricken when he attempted to walk out for help.

Hatfield Rejects Ullman's Statement

Planners Suggest Off-Street Parking At New Post Office

A resolution urging the Medford city council to attempt to induce the post office department to provide off-street parking at the proposed post office and federal building at Eighth and Ivy sts. was unanimously adopted by the Medford planning commission last night.

The group also voted to recommend to the city council that Ninth st. be vacated by the city in order to facilitate construction of the proposed building.

The city council has already called for a public hearing on the proposed vacation, but had asked the planning commission for its recommendation in the matter.

Will Acquire Property — The federal government now owns or proposes to acquire the property on both sides of Ninth st. between Ivy and Holly sts. as the site for the building and its attendant facilities.

The commission resolution said it recognized that the General Services Administration has a "policy" to provide no off-street parking to serve such facilities.

Valley of Rogue State Park Closed

State Highway Engineer Forrest Cooper said in Salem today that most of the facilities in Valley of the Rogue state park have been closed due to high water in the Rogue river.

Rising water disrupted the park's water supply Wednesday, Cooper said, affecting both the fresh water supply and the sanitary facilities.

He said the overnight campground has been closed off, and picnickers are being warned of the lack of drinking water at the site.

Cooper said a permanent water supply setup that will not be affected by river levels will be constructed this winter, along with additional overnight camp sites planned earlier.

County Receives Check From State

The county has received a check for \$157,238.02 from the state highway fund to be applied to the county roads fund, County Treasurer Karl Janouch said this morning.

The total is \$10,000 more than received for the same quarter last year, when it totaled \$147,880. It applies to the quarter covering July 1 to Sept. 30.

The allocation is based on the number of cars in Jackson county, Janouch said. The money comes from such motor vehicle funds as the gas tax, licenses and traffic fines.

FRANCE TIGHTENS GRIP ON MONACO

Paris — (UPI) — The government of France (pop. 46 million) plans to seal off neighboring Monaco (pop. 30,000) with customs barriers at midnight tonight, authoritative reports said today.

The French plan for a crackdown on the tiny domain of Prince Rainier II and Princess Grace was reported shortly after the two countries broke off negotiations in their long tax dispute. France and Monaco have been trying for months to negotiate a new treaty that France insists is needed to halt the flight of French companies to the tax-free gambling haven.
