The fate of the Broadway Theater league 1962-63 season is to be decided at a meeting today. If the four plays are to be brought here, a contract with the New York headquarters must be signed very soon. League board members were jubilant when they learned the first of the week that the great actress, Judith Anderson, had been signed, and were sure that when the news got around, the last of the membership tickets would be sold at once. However, when Potpourri checked with Mrs. Oscar Halboth late last night, she said that while a number had been sold yesterday, she was unsure whether it had been enough to guarantee the season or not.

When a group of theater devotees agreed to work together to bring Broadway plays to the Rogue valley they were hoping to accomplish two objectives. They believed that many adults enjoy a "live" performance—that they are willing to buy tickets and leave their homes to travel to a theater to see actors and actresses in person. The legitimate theater, of course, is more than just entertainment. The theater can educate, indoctrinate, be a deeply moving emotional experience and can also be a form of therapy. Who has not felt relaxed and generally in a fine frame of mind after an evening of excellent comedy? A theater season here would be a notable cultural asset.

The backers also believe that in time the Broadway play series could make money, and that this money could be used to help support the kindergarten for hard-of-hearing children which the Junior Service League operates. The kindergarten fills a great need in this area, and physicians and social workers of the state recognize that it is ably staffed and operated. Deaf children are given excellent training which is invaluable. League members—some of the women working on the project belong to both the Junior Service League and the Broadway Theater league board, argued that to run the play series to support the kindergarten would be much better than staging a follies or holding endless rummage sales, etc. We heartily agree.

If the 1962-63 season fails, it in all probability will mean that the project would be dead for some time. It would not be a matter of dropping out for a season, and picking up the series another year. It is a now or never deal.

The signing of Miss Anderson rounded out a series that sounds extremely attractive. "Carnival" is a musical comedy with a cast which is said to be very good. "A Shot in the Dark," which closed a successful Broadway run last month, is a comedy-mystery with the sparkling French actress, Annie Fargey, in the leading role. "Mary, Mary" is another popular Broadway play, and Miss Anderson in excerpts from "Macbeth" and "Medea" would mean a season with "something for everyone." Miss Anderson has long been considered one of the finest actresses on the English speaking stage—legitimate, radio and television plays have all seen her score triumphs. It will be a downright crying shame if the series is canceled for the lack of a hundred or so memberships.

Rose Salad Both Festive And Hearty

For a real conversation piece try Banana Apple Roses at your next luncheon for a club or committee meeting. Although dainty in appearance, they also satisfy hearty appetites. Serve them with cold cuts, hot rolls and tea and the luncheon is complete.

Banana Apple Rose Salad

Six red apples; lemon juice; two 6-ounce packages cream cheese (room temperature); three bananas, sliced; one-half cup nuts, chopped; mayonnaise; lettuce.

Prepare at least two hours before serving. Without peeling, core apples. Remove one slice from top; save. Scoop out apple, leaving about a one-half-inch wall. Save apple meat to mix later with filling. Score inside of apple with a paring knife.

Brush

Brush all exposed surfaces of apple and top with lemon juice to keep from darkening, and wipe outside dry.

To form petals, start at the top of the apple pressing level teaspoon of cream cheese against side of apple, then drawing spoon down with curving motion. Form 2-3 rows of petals. For extra special look, tint one package cheese, light pink; the other, a deeper pink.

Refrigerate roses for at least one hour. Just before serving, dice apple meat, which was saved from scooping out apples and combine with banana slices and chopped nuts. Add enough mayonnaise to hold together. Carefully spoon mixture into apple roses. Top with apple slice and additional banana slices. Serve on lettuce.

This is a "knife and fork" salad. The yield, six roses.
