Stocks Narrowly Mixed in Course Of Quiet Day

New York — (AP) — Stocks held to a narrow and mixed course in quiet trading today. With many traders enjoying a long Columbus day week end, most brokers believed there would be little action on the street. Wheeling Steel tacked on nearly a point in an otherwise narrowly mixed steel sector and Chrysler rose close to 1/4 in a similar motor group. Chemicals followed the general pattern, while America's rose almost 1 and Barber shed approximately a point in a scrambled oil section.

New York — (AP) — Dow Jones final stock averages: 30 industrials 586.47, off 1.67; 20 railroads 117.90, off 1.10; 15 utilities 120.97, off 0.36, and 65 stocks 205.92, off 0.51. Sales Thursday were about 2.46 million shares compared with 3.04 million shares Wednesday.

Cranberry Payment Program Cleared

Washington — (AP) — Government auditors today gave a clean bill of health to the way the Agriculture Department handled the program to pay cranberry growers who suffered losses in 1958 because of the cranberry cancer scare.

The General Accounting Office sent a report to President Kennedy and Congress saying it had found only one deficiency under the program in which \$8.5 million was paid to growers.

The government agreed to pay the growers after a sharp drop in the market following a Nov. 9, 1959, announcement by former secretary of health, education and welfare Arthur Flemming.

Flemming startled the nation by announcing that the Food and Drug Administration had urged growers to stop selling cranberries because it was found that a chemical weed killer, aminofluoride, had been misused by some growers. The chemical reportedly had caused cancer in rats.

FURNES 35-HOUR WEEK

Washington — (AP) — The AFL-CIO Thursday announced it has set up a task force to push the drive for a 35-hour week. President George Meany said the group would base its work on the nation's unemployment problem. The unemployment rate was 5.8 per cent last month and Meany said "even the most optimistic economic prophets no longer predict any substantial improvement."

Grenfell Charged With Making False Report To Police

Portland — (AP) — State Sen. William Grenfell (D-Portland) Thursday was charged with making a false report to police. The complaint was filed by the city attorney's office.

Grenfell, 37, was charged with falsifying a report that he was kidnapped and pushed from a car in Portland early Tuesday.

He admitted Wednesday that he was involved in a fatal traffic accident instead.

The complaint was signed by Portland Police Officer Howard Mayhew. The maximum punishment for such a charge is a \$500 fine and six months in jail.

Grenfell, a Democratic candidate for the Multnomah County Commission, said he was one of the drivers in a two-car crash in Portland Monday night. Harold Jones, 61, the other driver, was killed in the accident.

Grenfell, in a statement released by his attorney Wednesday, said he was in the company of Mrs. Natalie Crenshaw and driving her car on Union ave. at the time of the fatal accident.

Grenfell said he was in a state of shock when he gave police the abduction story.

He underwent surgery Thursday at Beas Kalsner hospital. He suffered fractures of the pelvis, right hip joint and left clavicle plus severe lacerations in the accident.

The Multnomah county grand jury was reported to be looking into the case.

Suit Seeks Damages From Roofing Firm

A suit seeking damages from a roofing company has been filed in Jackson county circuit court by the owners of the Mark Antony hotel in Ashland.

The complaint, filed against the Ace Roofing company, Medford, seeks \$3,381.59 damages done to the hotel last year by water.

The plaintiffs, William A. Sutton and Jack D. Pumphrey, charge that they hired the roofing company May 11, 1960, to install a new roof on the hotel. The complaint charges that due to negligence in the roof's installation, drains filled with roofing material, causing water damage to the interior of the hotel in November, 1961.

Unemployment insurance claims in Oregon last week totaled just over 9,300, compared to 11,380 claims a year ago at the same time.

VANDERBILT IN HOSPITAL
New York — (AP) — Cornelius Vanderbilt Jr., great-great-grandson of Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt, was reported resting comfortably today in a Manhattan hospital.

Vanderbilt, 64, was taken to the hospital for special surgery Tuesday night with an undiagnosed ailment. The noted author and lecturer is being kept at the hospital for observation, a spokesman said.

MURROW ARRIVES HOME
New York — (AP) — Edward R. Murrow, director of the U.S. Information Agency, arrived here from Tehran Thursday and went immediately to his farm near Pawling, N.Y., for a week's rest. Murrow, who was stricken with pneumonia while on an official mission and hospitalized eight days in Iran, said he still was feeling "a little shaky."

Jury Finds \$900 Fair for Property
A Jackson county circuit court jury yesterday afternoon brought in a verdict of \$900 as a fair sum for property condemned by the state highway commission on the Rush-Jacksonville highway.

The highway commission condemned a 20-foot strip of land owned by William and Jennie Easter along the highway.

Appraisers for the Eastern estimated the property should bring a settlement of \$1,140 to \$1,300. Value of the taking was estimated at \$800 to \$900, and damages to the remaining property by the taking at \$150 to \$400.

An appraiser for the state highway commission testified that his appraisal was \$100. He said the property was not damaged by the taking.

ASKS STRONGER LAWS
At Salem, Gov. Mark Hatfield called for further strengthening of Oregon's anti-pollution laws.

The Republican candidate for reelection also hammered away at the theme that his administration has increased job opportunities for Oregon. Hatfield said the state has entered a new era of the science-based industry.

Multnomah County Democratic Chairman Frank Roberts criticized a ballot measure to consider land area in apportioning the legislature in a talk in Portland.

He said the measure "is designed to give some voters more voice in the legislature than other voters."

Preliminary Version of New Constitution Published

Salem — (AP) — The Constitutional Revision Commission Thursday published a preliminary version of the new Oregon constitution it is recommending to the 1963 legislature.

If the legislature approves the document, it would go before the voters in 1964.

The preliminary report was filed with the Legislative Fiscal Committee. The formal version will be printed later.

The biggest overhauling is in the executive branch.

The governor would be the only elective state official. This would do away with secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general and labor commissioner as elective offices.

A new state post — that of controller — would be created, an independent, nonpartisan post. The controller would have state audit functions.

The governor would appoint all judges, and they would stand for election later, without opposition, on their records. If the voters turned a judge out of office, the governor would appoint a successor.

This recommendation has generated much heat in law circles.

The new constitution calls for annual sessions of the legislature, and removes the limitation on a 60 member House and 30 member Senate.

The commission removed the death penalty from the constitution, letting the legislature decide whether to retain it in the statutes.

A number of obsolete provisions were cut out of the constitution, such as a ban on dueling and a ban on holding

titles of nobility, and regulations pertaining to immigration and emigration — a field long since taken over by the federal government.

Valuable Pictures Slashed in Museum

Paris — (AP) — Nine pictures worth a total of \$400,000 were slashed last Sunday night at the Louvre Museum, reliable sources said today.

The pictures included "Portrait of a Man" by De Vries and "The Hunt Breakfast" by Van Loo.

A Louvre guard discovered the slashings last Monday morning and museum officials ordered all staff members to keep silent about it, according to the sources. Culture Minister Andre Malraux concurred in this decision, they added.

There was no immediate indication that the authorities have apprehended the person responsible for the destruction.

THE HUNTER WAS SHY
Liskeard, England — (AP) — Rabbit hunter Terence Trehan was fined \$28 Thursday for starting a fire in a field "so the rabbit couldn't see me."

Three fire brigades took three hours to douse the blaze. The rabbit got away.

Actress Found Dead in Apartment

New York — (AP) — Actress Joan Morgan McKay, 43, was found dead in her apartment Thursday an apparent suicide.

The blonde actress was known to be depressed by the break-up of her marriage to actor Scott McKay. Following their separation four years ago, they became embroiled in a bitter court battle during which she accused Scott of dating actress Ann Sheridan.

Her body, clad in flowered pajamas, was found on the bed of her West Side Manhattan apartment by another tenant of the building.

The actress, a native of Memphis, Tenn., first gained recognition in 1949 when she portrayed Billie Dawn in "Born Yesterday," the same role that brought stardom to Judy Holliday.

Foreign Briefs

CONGO POLICE BATTLE WITH NATIVES
Stanleyville, The Congo — (AP) — Police trying to arrest members of an African religious sect fought a battle Thursday with natives armed with poisoned arrows, lances and knives, the Congolese press agency said.

The members of the Kiltalawa sect died in the battle and 178 natives were eventually arrested by the Congo Gendarmerie. The sect is a political-religious movement acting in East Africa, the agency said.

Two policemen and 15 natives were injured in the battle, it added.

TSHOMBE DEPOSITS FUNDS FOR GOVERNMENT
Elisabethville, Katanga — (AP) — Katanga President Moise Tshombe today put foreign currency worth \$2 million at the disposal of the Central Congolese government.

He said funds totaling that amount have been "totally and definitely paid" to a London monetary council.

BOILER EXPLOSION IN PERU KILLS FOUR
Chimote, Peru — (AP) — A boiler explosion in the Chimote fishing cannery killed at least 4 persons and injured about 50 Thursday, it was reported today.

The dead included a man, two women and a 4-year-old child.

AILINER CRASHES IN SPAIN
Seville, Spain — (AP) — An Iberia Airlines plane crashed near here today with 28 persons aboard, an airline spokesman said. Further details were not available.

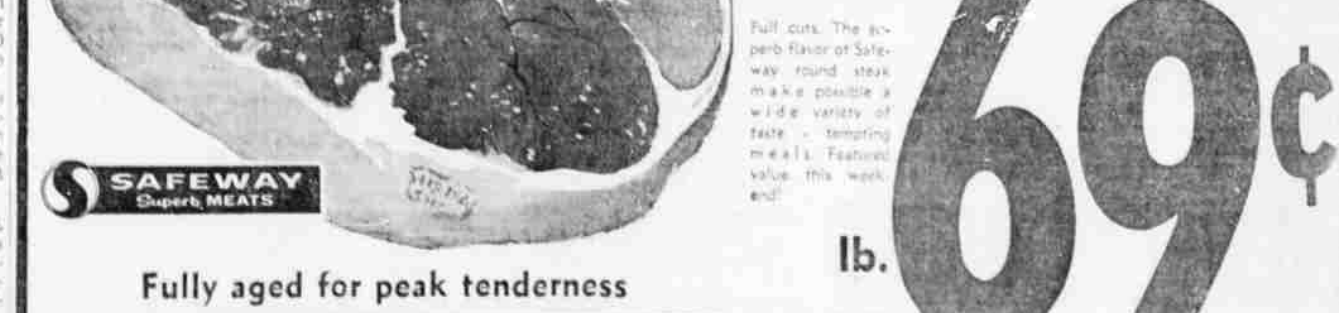
