District 9 Enrollment Shows Bigger Boost Than Expected

Eagle Point—A total of 1,410 students was enrolled in Eagle Point School District No. 9 as of October 8. This shows a 9 per cent increase over last year or a 2 per cent higher increase than the predicted 7 per cent expected.

Assistant Superintendent Robert Work pointed out to members of the school board Thursday evening that more than one half of this increase

was noted in the high school age level.

A letter directed to the school board from the Shady Cove Rotary club notified the district of the efforts put out by the Rotary club and other local clubs and civic organizations to form a teen-age club this past year in Shady Cove for its youth.

In the letter club members described their efforts as very successful but they felt the

keen need for qualified professional help and asked the support of the school board in the future. Definite action was not taken by the board but the problem was seriously discussed and considered.

Opinions expressed by board members and administrators showed them to be in favor of meeting with all local organizations, clubs and civic representatives of the entire district in the near future to determine the extent of community interest and work out further detailed plans for such activities.

"Special Education" was selected by members of the school board for the topic to be discussed and demonstrated to them at a meeting Nov. 15 at 7:30 p.m. prior to their regular board meeting. Several possible topics for future meetings were presented to the board by director Robert Work.

Superintendent Glenn Hale announced that all school buses are now running at capacity load. "If all of the students entitled to ride the buses in a couple of areas should decide to use them, it could create a problem," he added.

A statistical report on other schools in the valley and their policy on using the school buses as spectator buses was presented by the Eagle Point High School Principal Rick Traylor, who then made a recommendation that the board again endorse the same policy it has been following in the past.

The policy so endorsed by the board limits the spectator bus use to two buses at any one time to be used in the valley, with no travelling over the mountains, and restricts the use of school buses for spectator use during school hours for regular play off games.

During the discussion it was revealed that both spectator and chartered buses were well chaperoned with school policies and regulations being adhered to in both cases.

Principal Rick Traylor gave a brief report on his recent convention for a second year.

In other action the board authorized the annexation of school property not in the city limits. This property lies adjacent to city property and part of the new primary school is located within the city limits and part out. This will provide city fire protection for the entire building.

Mrs. Beryl Hickson, district clerk, served coffee and pie a la mode to members of the school board, school administrators, representatives and past board members to formally inaugurate the opening of the new administration offices.

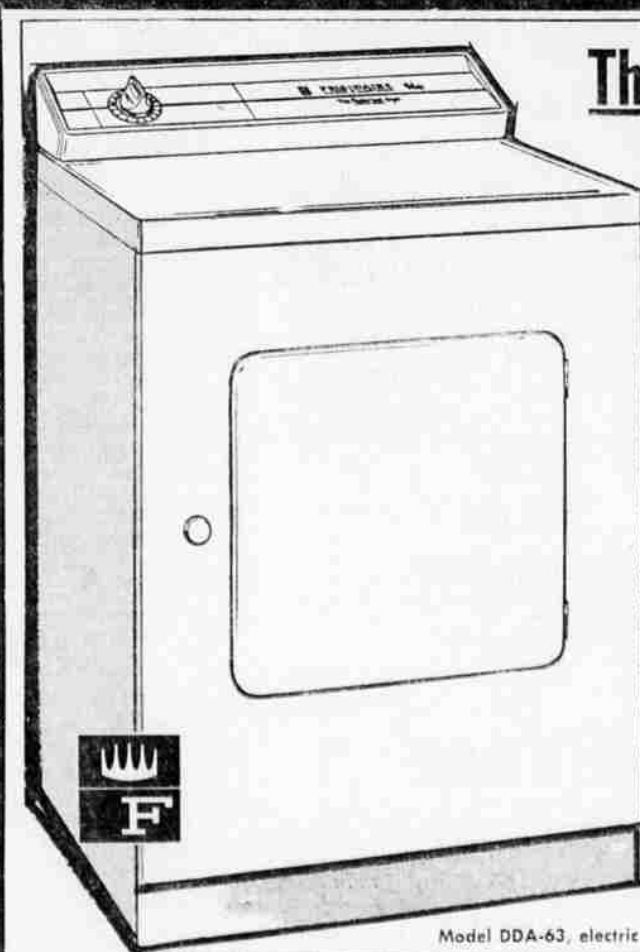
