New Mexico Rallies To Win

Albuquerque, N. M. — (UPI) — New Mexico staged a 96-yard drive in the closing minutes and clinched it with a razzle-dazzle pass play to score a 14-13 intersectional football victory Saturday over Utah State.

New Mexico, lethargic and bumbling for the first half, came to life before the urging of a homecoming crowd to pull victory from a game that seemed hopelessly lost.

Bobby Santiago, New Mexico's little halfback, and end Larry Jasper clicked for a 22-yard pass play and the deciding touchdown with 1:50 remaining in the game. Santiago passed to Jasper after taking a pitchout from quarterback Kim Cromartie.

Ed Meadows kicked his second conversion of the afternoon for the one-point margin that gave New Mexico leadership among Rocky Mountain football powers.

Back Injury May Keep Rodger Ward Out For Sixty Days

Riverside, Calif. — (UPI) — A serious back injury received in a qualifying accident at 100 miles an hour threatened Saturday to keep Indianapolis 500 mile champ Rodger Ward sidelined 60 days to four months, but witnesses agreed it could have been worse.

"It was a case of experience saving a man's life," said chief steward Ljilje Lesovsky, describing Ward's ability to keep the car from rolling immediately after a steering failure developed.

Ward was among more than 50 sports car drivers who competed Friday for 27 qualifying places in today's \$32,225 Grand Prix over the 2.6-mile Riverside raceway course. Ward, 41, was able to joke with crew members after he staggered from his wrecked car. He collapsed but never lost consciousness before being taken to Riverside Community hospital.

Texas, Alabama Stay On Top; Penn State Falls To Army, 9-6

Texas and Alabama, ranked one-two in the college football ratings, were hard-pressed to eke out victories Saturday while the No. 3 team, Penn State, fell before a stubborn Army defense.

The Longhorns of Texas, 9-6, on the strength of shoeless Tony Crosby's 26-yard field goal in the second quarter.

Alabama had to rally for its 14-3 triumph over Houston that represented the Crimson Tide's 15th consecutive win. Army, after matching first period goals with Penn State, defeated the Nittany Lions, 9-6.

Washington, ranked sixth, defeated Oregon State, 14-13. Seventh-ranked Arkansas beat Baylor, 28-21; ninth rated Purdue lost to Miami of Ohio, 10-7, and 10th-ranked Northwestern trounced Minnesota, 34-22.

Southern California and Mississippi, ranked fourth and fifth, respectively, were idle. The No. 8 U.C.L.A. Bruins whipped Colorado State University, 35-7, Friday night.

Texas topped Oklahoma for the fifth straight time in a game that ended with players from both benches joining in a free-swinging game fight. The Longhorns scored the winning touchdown when Center Perry McWilliams recovered an Oklahoma fumble in the Sooner's end zone.

In spite of the rain and mud, there were only three fumbles in the game, two by the Sooners, and one by the home team.

Springfield didn't have the ball beyond its 30-yard line in the first half. The Millers reached the Ashland 42 in the third quarter. It was Springfield's first win in five games and Ashland's fifth loss.

Bob Jencks, a Miami of Ohio end, accounted for all 10 points in the Purdue upset. Jencks kicked a 31-yard field goal, scored on an 88-yard pass engineered by quarterback Kellerman and booted the extra point.

Tom Myers, who completed 20 of 24 passes in his first

college game three weeks ago, threw two touchdown passes in the final four minutes as Northwestern mauled Minnesota. Steve Murphy scored twice for the winning Wildcats, as did Jerry Jones for the losing Gophers.

Navy had its best day of the season as sophomore quarterback Roger Staubach scored twice and passed for another touchdown in the Midway 41-0 rout of Cornell.

Syracuse tallied its first two touchdowns of the season, both by first-time starter Wally Mahle, in a 12-0 victory over previously unbeaten Boston College.

Princeton scored all its points in the first period as the Tigers beat Pennsylvania, 21-8. Columbia rallied to hand Yale its first setback, 14-10, and West Virginia drove 61 yards in the last period to upset Pittsburgh, 15-8, among top games in the East.

Ohio State, toppled from the No. 1 ranking last week, rebounded with a 51-13 victory against Illinois. The Buckeyes set a new Big Ten conference rushing record of 517 yards as they climaxed a second half barrage with four touchdowns.

Halfback Sherman Lewis scored three times from inside the 10-yard line to give Michigan State a 28-0 victory over Michigan in another big 10 battle.

In the South, Auburn's Jimmy Sidle penetrated Chattanooga defenses for three touchdowns in a 54-6 rout; Georgia stopped Clemson, 24-16, on two touchdown losses by Larry Rakestraw; and Billy Lottridge scored 11 points and passed for a touchdown in Georgia Tech's 17-0 win over Tennessee.

Oklahoma State buried Colorado, 36-16, and New Mexico edged Utah State, 14-13, on a 22-yard pass play from Bobby Santiago to Larry Jasper.

Intersectionally Florida rolled over Texas A&M, 42-8; Nebraska staged a late 68-yard march to beat North Carolina State, 19-14; George Washington defeated winless Boston University, 14-6; and Duke downed California, 21-7.

Also, Florida A&M, top-ranked in the UPI small college ratings, trampled Morris Brown, 38-12; Kansas upended Iowa State, 29-8; Wisconsin beat Notre Dame, 17-8; Holy Cross trounced Harvard, 34-20; Iowa edged Indiana, 14-10; and Washington State took the measure of Stanford, 21-6.

U.S. Retains Amateur Golf Team Championship

Kawana, Japan — (UPI) — The United States retained its world amateur golf team championship Saturday with a final round splurge that put it eight strokes ahead of a surprisingly tough Canadian team.

The U. S. team ended the third world amateur golf team tournament at this seaside course south of Tokyo with 854 strokes, Canada had 862.

The U. S. players, who had a two-stroke lead before Saturday's final round, were in the finest form.

Veteran amateur Billy Joe Patton of Morganton, N. C., was the first American to finish Saturday with a 38-43-81. But his three teammates came in with a total 295 for the day to set back the Canadian challenge.

Ronald Shade of Great Britain and Ireland was the first player to turn the trick on the second day of the tournament while Mexico's best player, Juan Estrada, did it earlier Saturday.

Mexican made his valuable contribution to the U. S. cause as he outshot Canada's top player, Gary Cowan, who turned in a one under par 69 in the same threesome. Britain's M. F. Bonallack, the other member of the threesome, got a 70.
