After the talent show we had a party at which I met some very interesting people.

Sept. 25—Without studies, I turned my attention to some of those very interesting people. Her name's Paulette.

Sept. 26—We were preparing for tomorrow's landing in Yokohama today. I found packing in cramped quarters pure purgatory. Actually, we've all had fun, but we'll be glad to get off this old tub. I say "old tub" lovingly. The voyage has been enriching in many ways.

The short film with the comedy will be "A Time Out of War," which is an Academy award winner about an incident of the Civil war. The movies are free to association members and a charge of 50 cents is made to non-members.

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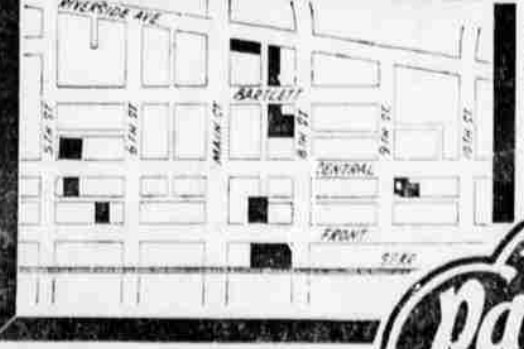
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Woman Holds Bridge Party
