Woman Honored at Party On Ninetieth Birthday

dents were older than she. After her marriage in 1891, she and her husband continued to make their home in Bethany, and in 1921 the family moved to Idaho, five years later coming to the Rogue Valley. Mr. Hopkins died in 1945 at the age of 87.

The honored woman is the mother of six children, five of whom are still living. They are Curtis L. Hopkins, James Henry Hopkins, Medford, and Farrell E. Hopkins, Blaine, Wash., and two daughters, Mrs. C. L. Dwight, Eastside, Ore., and Mrs. Vernoy Booth, Cainsville, Mo. She has seven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Until two years ago, Mrs. Hopkins had made her home with her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Hopkins, 113 North Ross lane. Since that time she has been in Eastside, Ore., in the home of her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Dwight.
