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School Census To Start in County Late This Month

The school census will be taken in all school districts in Oregon during the last week in October by school district clerks or other persons designated by the clerks, according to Jackson County School Superintendent Alf B. Mekvold.

The names and ages of all persons in each district over four years old and less than 20 years, plus the names and post office addresses of all parents and guardians in the district will be recorded.

The state law states: "No parent or guardian of a child of school age shall fail to answer truly all questions asked them regarding the number, age and sex of all children."

An accurate and complete census is needed for apportionment of school funds such as the state basic school fund appropriated by the legislature on the basis of total school census, Mekvold said.

Current allocation is \$120 per census child. The county school fund and the state common school fund are apportioned on the actual census of each school district, Mekvold explained.

Census records also are used for verification of birthdate and age for social security, retirement benefits and in securing birth certificates.

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Children are counted if they lived in the district as of Oct. 25. They should be on the roll of their resident district although living elsewhere, visiting, attending school or college or special schools or in the armed services, Mekvold said.
