New Officers Elected By Jackson County Federal

Harvey J. Field has been elected president of the board of directors of Jackson County Federal Savings and Loan association, according to association officials.
W. J. Warner announced his retirement as board president because of health. He has been president since 1952.
Field has been a director since 1938 and was elected first vice president in 1952. He has been in the retail shoe business since coming to the Rogue valley in 1911 and was employed by the late C. M. Kidd. In 1936 he purchased controlling interest in the shoe store which is now known as Norfield Shoe company.
Paul O. Maier, who recently joined the staff, was elected secretary-treasurer. Maier lived in Kansas City, Mo., before coming to the west coast in 1960. He was graduated from the University of Kansas in 1949 with a degree in business administration and was employed by the R. H. Macy company.
In 1951, Maier was vice president of the South Side Federal Savings and Loan in Kansas City. He moved to Southern California in 1963 and was vice president at the Santa Ana Savings and Loan association.

Range Management Official Named

Klamath Falls — Donald E. Niven, former district ranger on the Gallatin National forest in Montana, has joined the staff of the Winema forest, it was announced today by Forest Supervisor Alex Smith. Niven will serve as a staff specialist in the field of range and wildlife management. He replaces Charles Waldron who recently transferred to the regional office of the Forest Service in Portland.
Niven began his Forest service career on the Gallatin National forest in 1946, where he was employed while attending Montana State university. He received his degree in forestry in 1950 and received his appointment with the Forest Service in 1951.

Since that time he has served in numerous assignments, including district ranger at Gardner and Big Timber, Mont. His Forest service experience combined with ranching and the livestock industry qualifies him for his new assignment. He will be involved in planning and management of the range and wildlife activities on the Winema forest and particularly in developing a range program for the former Klamath Indian reservation lands which were added to the forest in 1961.

Niven served with the United States Army during World War II.
The first community forest in the United States was established in 1710 at Newington, N. H.

Fagatt was killed when his car plunged off Highway 30 near Clatskanie. The car went over a 58-foot embankment.
Tod died at a Medford hospital from injuries suffered in a motorcycle-truck accident Oct. 5.

Veterans Officials At Conference

Two veterans officials from Jackson county will attend the semi-annual conference of the Oregon County Service Officers Association at Seaside Wednesday through Friday.
They are Elmer W. Donahoe, Jackson County veterans' service officer and the association's vice president, and Edward Branchfield, Medford lawyer and chairman of the advisory committee to the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Other dignitaries expected at the conference include H. C. Saalfeld, Salem, director of the state veterans' department; Raymond J. Novotny, Portland, manager of the Oregon regional office of the Veterans administration; and George Blomgren, Roseburg president of the county service officers' association.
State Representative William H. Holmstrom, Gearhart, will be guest speaker during opening ceremonies Wednesday afternoon. All sessions will be in the Seaside American Legion hall.

Inter-Agency Group Benefits From Funds Contributed to UC

Among organizations which benefit from funds pledged to the United Crusade of Jackson county is the Jackson County Inter-Agency Council.
Although the council does not receive benefit directly, it does through the member agencies which are supported by the United Crusade.
One purpose of the Jackson County Inter-Agency Council is to study the problems and needs of the county and work toward their solution, according to Dr. Alvin Feller, of Southern Oregon college and 1962 council chairman.
By bringing together the social service agencies which are supported by the United Crusade, the public health, welfare and law enforcement agencies, and interested people from schools and churches, the groups can better work to serve the community.
Acquainting each other with the limitations, policies and services of the various agencies has promoted more intelligent referral and counseling of people needing assistance and guidance.

Since its organization in 1958, the council has printed a directory of social services, sponsored coordinated Christmas giving and aid in cases of one family disasters, through the cooperation of the Salvation Army, Red Cross and the Public Welfare Commission. It has initiated the formation of the Rogue Valley Council on Aging with its Senior Activity Center, and has worked to secure family counselling services now available through the Family and Child Guidance Clinic.
Some of the topics to be studied by the Inter-Agency Council this year are juvenile vandalism, the Mental Health clinic, the Oregon Commission for the Blind, and orthopedic care on an out patient basis. Mrs. Vivian Ness is program chairman for the coming year.
The next meeting of the council will be held Oct. 23 at the Red Cross building at noon. A panel discussion on rehabilitation of families when the father is permanently disabled will be given. All interested people are encouraged to attend since a purpose of the council is to inform the community and to help promote plans for its betterment, Dr. Fellers said.

Ike Welcomed In Connecticut

Hartford, Conn. — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, lending his name and prestige to Republican candidates in their bid to defeat the state's Democratic ticket headed by former Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Abraham Ribicoff, got a rousing welcome upon his arrival here today.
An estimated 300 persons who cheered him on arrival at Rentschler airport were joined by hundreds of others along his route to the capitol where he spoke to an estimated crowd of 20,000 persons.
At Bushnell Park in front of the capitol, he charged that President Kennedy was surrounded by a group of theorists who have "a monopoly on sophisticated nonsense which creates inflation, confusion and timidity."

Russia To Test Series of Rockets

Moscow — The Soviet Union will test a new series of "multistage carrier rockets" in two regions of the central Pacific Tuesday and extending through Nov. 30, the official Soviet Tass news agency said today.
Tass said the rockets will be types designed for "cosmic objectives."
The test series would be the second the Soviets have carried out in the Pacific with long-range rockets.
In a previous test series last year, the Russians fired a number of long-range rockets from Russia into a target area in the Pacific southwest of Hawaii.
