School District 6 May Send Observers On Tour of East

Central Point - William Ruck, teacher from Medford High school, was guest speaker at the Oct. 9 District 6 school board meeting.

He extended an invitation to Superintendent Charles Meyer and to the members of the board to accompany three groups of teachers from Medford who will shortly be visiting schools in the eastern part of the country.

The purpose of the visit is for representatives to observe, evaluate and decide if the methods of team teaching, now in operation in some parts of the east, will be feasible in Oregon. Representing Oregon will be participants from 23 school districts, nine colleges and universities.

Ruck stated that Medford is a participant in the Oregon program and is especially interested in team teaching and flexible scheduling at the elementary level.

Happy Camp Teacher To Lead Classes for Honor Camp Men

Happy Camp - The Happy Camp Union Elementary school board heard requests for a bus route extension and for permission for a teacher to hold classes at the Clear Creek Honor camp, at a regular meeting Wednesday.

The request for an extension of 9/10 mile above Curly Jack turnoff on Elk Creek rd. was made by Bob Burr. Burr stated that he has four elementary school children attending school here and that he and Mrs. Burr are buying the Henderson place.

In bad weather, Burr said, getting the children to school is a real problem since he is employed and has the car with him at work at the time the children should be coming to school.

The board explained that money was the real problem. Burr stated that he would be glad to pay some of the added expense if it could be worked out that way.

Another problem was brought up concerning the intersection of Curly Jack and Elk Creek rd. It was said to be impossible for the bus to turn up Elk Creek from this intersection.

Board member Waddell agreed to check with county officials and Highway Patrolman Everett Colford concerning this matter. The request was tabled until a later date, to study finances of the problem and the intersection in question.

The second request was made by Lt. Massey on behalf of the State Department of Corrections for classes to be held at Clear Creek Honor Camp No. 41 for inmates.

The State Department of Corrections would pay the teacher and most other expenses incurred in the project. The only thing the school would provide would be the diplomas for graduates.

Principal John Sugden said that one of the teachers, Robert Schaefer, was very interested in the program and has asked that he be given the contract for the six - hour per week classes will be held on Sunday and would not interfere with the elementary school program. The classes will be held at the camp.

The board approved terms of the contract for permitting a teacher to be sent to these classes for the 36-week period.

Lt. Massey explained the background of the program to the board, telling of the classes held for inmates at San Quentin and then when the men are sent to the honor camps they are handicapped by not having the classes. Out of the 60 inmates at the camp, 25 have been signed up for classes.

In other board action, Sugden reported that Lorna Laughlin has been hired for a six week probationary period to fill the vacancy of the recently resigned Connie Sorenson as office secretary.

The board instructed Sugden to send a letter of appreciation to Fish and Game.

Officer Bill Strait for his time spent in the recent hunter safety course held at the school. Out of the 75 students enrolled in the course, 32 students passed and 16 failed. All together 48 completed the course, the remainder had dropped out during the classes for one reason or another.

The board accepted the resignation of second custodian Shade Combs which was effective October 3. Hired on a six week trial basis to fill the vacancy was J. V. Rackley.

Investigate Smell
The board instructed the principal to contact health or sanitation authorities to investigate the origin of sewage smell on the highway near the cafeteria. This smell has been quite noticeable for sometime and should be controlled, according to the board, noting that the smell did not come from school sewage drain fields.

Sugden reported that the new school freezer has been installed in the kitchen and is only needing shelves and will be in use within a few days.

The board also adopted a community use agreement for responsibility of school rooms, furniture, and equipment belonging to the school when rooms are used by outside activities.

He is presently serving on the Eagle Point City Planning commission and is a member of both the Eagle Point Lions and the Shady Cove Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Meyer is presently chairman of the city council and has been very active while serving a two-year term for the city as councilman. Meyer works for the Oregon-Washington Telephone company and owns his own home on South B st.

Nave has lived in Eagle Point since 1959 with his wife and five children. He has been employed since November of 1959 in the operations department of the Rogue Valley branch of the Oregon Bank in Medford. He is a veteran of the Korean War, is a volunteer fireman, and belongs to the local Lions club.
