Delta Gammas Plan Meeting At Blind Center

To stress the fraternity's national project, sight conservation and aid to the blind, Rogue Valley Alumnae chapter of Delta Gamma will meet Wednesday, October 17, at the Rehabilitation Center for the Blind, 248 East Stewart avenue.

Clyde E. Richardson, counselor for the Southwest district office of the Oregon Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, will guide the group on a tour of the center.

Following the tour, Mr. Richardson will speak of the needs and services of the center, and discuss the opportunities for volunteer work by the sighted.

Volunteer hours of work by Delta Gamma in the national project averages more than 28,000 a year, the chapter reports.

Each year scholarships are given to orthopedic technicians and to teachers or consultants of visually handicapped children. Each local alumnae and collegiate group chooses its own phase of this service in which to work, assisting nursing schools, sight saving clinics, home teachers, vision screening programs, aiding institutions, homes, societies, clinics and hospitals, camps and rehabilitation centers, and personal services to individuals.

The local alumnae group finances its efforts with funds from an annual benefit card party held each January.
