Met Opens, Corelli Earns Big Ovation

New York — (AP) — Franco Corelli, an Italian tenor, stole the show from American soprano Eileen Farrell Monday night at the opening of the Metropolitan Opera's 78th season, an occasion marked by theatrical glomour rather than social prestige.

Corelli scored tremendously in the title role of "Andrea Chenier," Umberto Giordano's 66-year-old opera about love and death in the French revolution. The tall, handsome opera star jettisoned his usual ballast of bolognese ham and ascended to true operatic greatness as the liberal poet whose love for an aristocratic beauty brings them both to the guillotine.

Time after time the splendor of Corelli's voice and the conviction of his acting made Miss Farrell's vocal and dramatic interpretation of the noblewoman, Maddalena di Coligny, seem shallow by comparison. The audience, which was tepid in almost all its reactions to the beautifully produced opera, seemed to respond only to Corelli.

His curtain calls brought a stormy ovation from a pot-pourri audience of celebrities including Mrs. Joseph P. Kennedy, the President's mother; Vice President Emmanuel P. Lae of the Philippines, actor Cyril Ritchard, social leader Mrs. Winston Guest, actress Zsa Zsa Gabor, theatrical producer Billy Rose, philanthropist Mary Lasker, former Ambassador Lewis D. Douglas, dress designer Luiz Estevez, film star Rita Gam, and business machine operator Helen Quinn, who waited in line since last Friday for standing room.

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Proposal To Divide PTA To Be Presented for Vote

Central Point — A proposal to divide the Central Point Elementary Parent Teacher association will be presented to the members for a vote at the next meeting to be held Thursday, October 18, at 7:30 p.m., at the Junior High school. The purpose of this division is to establish a separate unit for the H. P. Jewett Elementary school.

This school has an enrollment of 563 and it is believed that an individual PTA will enable more satisfactory programming. This would not mean that there would be two meetings a month. There has been some opposition to the separation because of this misconception. The meetings would alternate between the Jewett and Central Point PTAs. Those who have children in both schools would go to one meeting a month those with a child in one school would go to a meeting every other month. This is believed to be a more practical method for meeting the problems facing the organization.

The Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers favors this method and it is used throughout the state. With the division it is hoped that more people will be involved in its operation and therefore active in the association.
