Dunlevy Discusses Role of Mayor at Roundtable Lunch

"I want to be mayor of Medford to help the people of this area build a better city," City Councilman Jimmy Dunlevy told the Medford Chamber of Commerce Roundtable yesterday morning.

Dunlevy, the last of the three mayor candidates to speak to the group, said he could not claim to be a native son like his opponents, but rather had settled in Medford as "a matter of choice."

"I decided to live in Medford because I had faith in its future," he said, "and now, 20 years later, I still have that same faith."

Born in Ohio, the 51-year-old candidate was born and reared in Akron, Ohio, where he was educated in the public schools, and attended night classes for seven years at the University of Akron while working during the day at the Goodrich Rubber company.

During World War II, Dunlevy moved to Medford as a member of the 353rd Combat Engineers which was stationed at Camp White. Assigned to public relations work, he was appointed editor of the Camp White "Grenade," the camp's weekly newspaper, and was also chief announcer at the camp radio station.

Following his discharge in April 1946, Dunlevy went to work for radio station KMED as a staff announcer, and was promoted to station manager three months later.

"During the four years I held that position, I had the opportunity to contact nearly every merchant and businessman in Medford," Dunlevy said, "to help them with their sales promotions and advertising."

Move to Station KYJC In 1950, he moved to radio station KYJC as station manager, a position he held until 1957, when he resigned to accept the management of the Rogue Valley Country club, where he is now employed.

During his tenure with KYJC, Dunlevy became interested in civic affairs and worked with a number of organizations and groups on various projects. He was elected to the city council (he's currently serving his sixth year) and twice was elected council president. He is also county representative on the county board of health.

"I want particularly to stress that out of 140 meetings, I have only missed seven, for a 95 per cent attendance record," he said.

"Further, I have never once abstained from voting on any issue, regardless of what it was," he said. "I have called them as I saw them, even though it meant voting contrary to some particular interests at the time."

Attention to Future Turning his attention to Medford and its future, Dunlevy said blight is not just of local concern, it is a "national problem."

He admitted that parts of the city are decaying, but pointed out that the cure for the blight can be found, in part, in improved parking in the downtown core area, in renovating several old buildings in the business district, and in increased sales promotion work by the merchants.

Dental Clinic at Hospital Will Be Dedicated By Club

The Kiwanis-sponsored dental clinic at Rogue Valley hospital will be dedicated Wednesday when Medford Kiwanis club members will hold their noon luncheon at the hospital.

Speaker will be Dr. H. Harrison Clarke, research professor in the University of Oregon department of physical education. Participants in the dedication will be Chester Wendt, county commissioner and chairman of the Kiwanis dental committee; Elliott Becken, assistant Medford school superintendent, representing the school interest in the clinic; and Charles Gustafson, hospital administrator.

The clinic, which provides dental care for needy youngsters on a countywide basis, previously was located in the county courthouse. City and county schools cooperate in the program and school nurses help determine which children should receive clinic care.

Donate Portion of Time

Dentists of the county are clinic participants, donating a portion of their time each month.

Dr. Clarke will speak concerning the Medford growth study—a study of the physical development of boys, in which boys in the Medford area are tested periodically. The study has been under way for a number of years under the supervision of Dr. Clarke.

Kiwanians have been advised that the luncheon will be served starting at noon, 15 minutes earlier than the usual time.

The Kiwanis club is sponsoring the Oregon State university-football game Saturday, Oct. 27. Half of the net proceeds will go toward the dental clinic.

New Building Is Planned By Bank On North Central

A new building and location for the Rogue Valley branch of the Oregon Bank have been announced by Clarence H. Young, vice president and manager.

Eight lots near the junction of Court st. and North Central ave. have been purchased for the new building, Young said. The land is immediately adjacent to a small triangular piece of land which the city maintains as a park.

Young stated that the move was necessitated by the increased volume of business which the bank has developed since it first moved into its present location at 1109 Court st. The present building was constructed in 1934 when the bank moved from Eagle Point and changed its name to the Rogue Valley State bank.

Merge With Bank Rogue Valley State bank merged with the Oregon Bank, Portland, in January, 1961, and became the Rogue Valley branch of state-wide bank.

Robert J. Keeney, Medford architect, will design the new structure. It will provide for ample parking and a drive-in window. Because of the trees on the property and on the adjoining park, special attention will be given to designing a building which will blend in well with the park-like setting, Young stressed.

The bank hopes to be in its new quarters by May, Young said. The bank will sell its present building on Court st.
