Marshal Could Have Fired Fatal Shot in Mississippi, Sheriff Says

Oxford, Miss. (UPI) - Sheriff Joe Ford said Monday that one of the two men killed during the recent rioting at the University of Mississippi could have been shot by a U. S. marshal.

Ford said he would ask the Department of Justice to check both the personal guns and the weapons issued to marshals who surrounded the Lyceum Building the night of the Sept. 30 rioting which followed the admission of Negro James H. Meredith to the university.

The department said only a few shots were fired by the marshals and those were directed at a fire hose used by the rioters. Ford said one of these bullets could have killed Ray Lee Gunter, a 23-year-old juke box repairman, whose body was found on the campus.

"It would seem to me the government would insist on checking the guns as long as there is any suspicion the marshals fired," he said.

The sheriff said Gunter and Paul Guillard, a 31-year-old reporter for Agence France Presse, both were killed by .38-caliber bullets. But the bullet which struck Gunter was copper-coated while the other fatal bullet was of ordinary lead. Both bullets have been sent to the FBI laboratories in Washington for analysis, Ford said.

Ford said there was little doubt that Guillard was murdered. The reporter, shot in the back, was found near a dormitory.

"Whoever pulled that trigger wanted to kill him," Ford said. "I am quite sure anyone shot in the back would fall face forward. He was found lying face up with his glasses on."

There appeared to be a further easing of tension on the campus Monday as Meredith began his third week of classes. The 29-year-old Negro veteran walked alone from the cafeteria to the graduate building, but his marshal and soldier guards hovered in the background.

Kennedy To Meet Gromyko Thursday

Washington (UPI) - President Kennedy will confer at the White House Thursday with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, it was announced today.

The White House said that the Russian government had "indicated a desire for Mr. Gromyko to see the President" but had given no indication why the conference was sought.

However, the meeting will come at a time when the administration is making clear that it is concerned about a new Berlin crisis.

Gromyko, who is in New York attending the UN General Assembly, last met with the President Oct. 6, 1961.

Final Decision Seen Near On Best Way to Reach Moon

Washington (UPI) - A space administration official said today a final government decision is expected "in a few days or weeks" on the best way to get the first American to the moon.

He predicted acceptance of the lunar orbit rendezvous technique which the National Aeronautics and Space Administration adopted last July, only to find itself currently in a controversy with influential White House advisers.

George M. Low, NASA director of spacecraft and flight missions, said in a Voice of America interview that shifting from the NASA-favored technique for a lunar voyage to another method would cause a one-to-two-year delay in reaching the moon. The interview was recorded for overseas broadcast.

President Kennedy has announced the goal of reaching the moon by 1970. NASA Director James E. Webb believes it can be done by 1968.

The Lunar orbit rendezvous method, which Low called "cheapest, quickest and most reliable," involves dispatching the expedition in an Apollo spacecraft boosted by a Saturn rocket with 7.5 million pounds of thrust. This compares with 360,000 pounds of thrust in the Atlas rocket, which puts Mercury capsules in orbit.

The Apollo craft would go into orbit around the moon. It would detach a "lunar excursion module," sometimes called a "bug," which would take the expedition down to the moon's surface. When the exploring was done, the "bug" would leave the moon and rendezvous with the still-orbiting Apollo for the return to earth.

Opponents of this technique have challenged the technical analysis on which NASA's confidence is based. They include Dr. Jerome Wiesner, Kennedy's assistant for science and technology, and some of his staff.

Back Other Methods

They want consideration for two other techniques - "direct ascent" and earth orbit. In the direct ascent method, the manned capsule would be launched directly from earth to the moon's surface. Earth orbit techniques would require the Apollo to be put in orbit close to the earth and rendezvous with another craft which would boost it on to the moon.

Low said NASA was "firmly" convinced its method was best. Not only that, he went on, but the technique of going into orbit around the moon before descending to the surface may well prove the best way to visit planets such as Mars.

He thus rejected the argument that the NASA plan has a dead end. He said NASA had invested one million man-hours in deciding on the best way to go to the moon.

Mansfield's Post Up To Democrats

Washington (UPI) - Sen. Mike Mansfield (D-Mont.), declined to say today whether he would seek or accept reelection as Senate Democratic leader when Congress meets in January.

"That's up to the Democrats," he said, Mansfield refused to elaborate.

The scholarly, mild-mannered Democratic leader was visibly tired after going through the longest congressional session since 1951. He was looking forward to a rest at an unannounced vacation spot.

Democratic senators meet in January to elect their leadership slate for the new Congress. There have been rumors from time to time that Mansfield might retire from the leadership.

Mansfield is regarded as a shoo-in if he wants the post again. No outright challenge to his reelection is expected.

Tropical Storm Expected To Grow

Miami (UPI) - Tropical storm Ella dawdled in the Atlantic early today but the Weather Bureau said the squally area was expected to intensify and move toward the southeastern Seaboard during the day.

The latest advisory at midnight (EDT) placed Ella near latitude 25.3 north and longitude 72.0 west, or about 170 miles northeast of the island of San Salvador in the Bahamas and 495 miles east of Miami.

The storm packed winds of 45 miles per hour and flung gale winds 350 miles to the north. Winds should freshen close to the South Atlantic coast late today, the Weather Bureau said.

As a high pressure area slips out of her way to the north, the weatherman said at midnight, Ella should slowly intensify during the next 24 hours.

Constant Nagging Results in Divorce

London (UPI) - William Schenck, 49, won a divorce Monday from his blonde wife, Elizabeth, because of the nags.

Schenck told the judge that during 24 years of marriage his wife nagged him at night, nagged him in the cafe where he ate lunch, nagged him at his office, and once rode 10 miles to a dock where he was working just to nag him.

One time, he testified, he locked himself in his room to get away from it all. She smashed down the door with a cricket bat and started nagging again.

The judge rejected Mrs. Schenck's cross-suit which had charged he was cruel to her by subjecting her to long periods of silence.

"With all this persistent and wicked nagging," the judge said, "I think that was very natural."

MRS. FDR IMPROVES

New York (UPI) - Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, 78, was reported Monday night to be feeling better. A spokesman for Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center said the former First Lady's temperature had dropped Monday morning and "continued low throughout the day."

Mrs. Roosevelt has been ailing since Sept. 26 with a lung infection.

Foreign Briefs

ALBANIA ACCUSES RUSSIAN PREMIER

Vienna (UPI) - Albania today called for open opposition to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's policy of warmer relations with Yugoslavia.

The Albanian Communist newspaper Zeri i Popullit accused Khrushchev of "taking up the banner of modern revisionism, thereby creating a great danger to the historic victories of the Proletariat."

SMALLPOX, PLAGUE, CHOLERA INCREASE

Geneva (UPI) - The world-wide incidence of smallpox, plague and cholera increased in 1961 despite stepped-up measures against them, a World Health Organization committee reported today.

The WHO's committee on international quarantine reported that 79,000 smallpox cases were recorded in 1961, compared to 58,000 cases in 1960.

AMBASSADOR'S VISIT OFF TO ROUGH START

Valletta, Malta (UPI) - The good will visit of the German Ambassador to Britain, Hasso von Etdorf, got off to an unlucky start shortly after his arrival Monday night when he slipped in a bathtub and was hospitalized.

The mishap occurred in the governor's palace.

PEIPING COMMENTS ON KENNEDY SPEECH

Tokyo (UPI) - Peiping radio said today that President Kennedy's week end speech in Buffalo, N.Y., "showed once more that the United States is bent on subverting the Socialist system of the Eastern European countries."

In a broadcast monitored here, the Red Chinese radio said "Kennedy particularly emphasized the need for the United States to intensify economic and cultural penetration into the Socialist countries."

Reapportionment Opponent Claims Proposal Could Be Unconstitutional

An opponent of Oregon's ballot measure on reapportionment says a U.S. Supreme Court ruling could make the Oregon proposal unconstitutional.

Myron Katz discussed Ballot Measure 9 on behalf of the Bi-Partisan League to Retain Equal Representation, the group that is fighting the measure.

Oregon now apportions its legislature on the basis of population. The measure would count land area as well in handing out House seats.

Oklahoma Study Cited

Katz told a Portland audience the U.S. Supreme Court now is studying an Oklahoma high court ruling that population is the only legal way to apportion a legislature. He said if the U.S. high court upholds the Oklahoma ruling, Oregon's ballot proposal would become "clearly unconstitutional."

In the first district, Democratic nominee for Congress Blaine Whipple said welfare spending has little to do with the high national debt. He said most of the present debt was caused by two World Wars, the Korean War, and the cold war.

Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore.) said in Portland Monday that efforts of Northwest congressmen to get the Jones Act amended to help the lumber situation were hampered because "the administration didn't back us up." He said both Democrats and Republi-

cans "raised the roof, but it didn't help."

Sig Unander spoke in Roseburg Monday and issued a challenge to Sen. Wayne Morse, saying "Come out, Senator Morse - come out from behind the apron strings of your Eastern spokesmen - come out and meet me on a platform where our neighbors can compare us."

Morse, back in the state to continue his campaign, said he had been assured by the White House that the federal government will do all it can within the limits of the law to help in repairing damage from last Friday's storm.

Duncan Specifics Asked

In Scio today, Republican Carl Fisher, fourth district congressional candidate, asked his opponent, Democrat Robert B. Duncan, to "come to grips with the realities of the campaign."

"Certainly we do not want mud-slinging and character assassination in this or any other campaign, but as candidates for national office we should try for something meatier..." Fisher said.

Fisher, Eugene legislator, asked Duncan to "become more specific in his views on the great issues of the day."

Fisher said Duncan, legislator from Medford, is "conducting a shadowy campaign, a campaign conducted in an atmosphere so rarified the voter cannot examine what I consider to be some very real differences in our philosophy."

"He quotes from obviously great documents such as the Constitution - which we all know is the supreme law of the land - and is angered when I speak of a policy of firmness with regard to Cuba," Fisher said.

"He tells us about the accomplishments of legislative sessions now past while we are talking of job opportunities and more payrolls for Oregon," Fisher added.
