Leonard L. Martin Seeks 2-Year Term On Gold Hill Council

Gold Hill — Leonard L. Martin, who is seeking election to a two year term on the Gold Hill city council, has been interested in local government for some time. He has attended council meetings and is a member of the budget committee.

Martin says he is seeking office as a councilman to see that city affairs are conducted in an honest, businesslike and economical manner for the best interest of the city at large. Martin is unmarried.

Martin and his wife, Edith, came to Gold Hill to reside when he retired about two and one-half years ago. He is an old time resident of the Rogue River valley and Gold Hill is the hometown of Mrs. Martin.

Twelve years prior to his retirement he was a police officer and deputy sheriff in Fresno county, California. He has had special training and experience in various phases of police, fire department, and civil defense work.

20 Years — Other activities have been in highway construction and 20 years as a mechanic of auto and construction equipment. During World War II he taught the auto shop classes at Fresno technical high school in the vocational arts and apprentice training department.

Martin has donated time the past several months to help other qualified instructors teach courses in hunter safety classes so that young people here could earn certificates, now required by the state to obtain their hunters license.

He is a member of fraternal groups in the area.

The miles and miles of largely unpopulated area in eastern Oregon appear to be a natural for land promoters. We noted with interest another advertisement for the Lake Valley "public sale" in a recent Sunday Mail Tribune.

Before we moved to Oregon from southern California last year, our interest was attracted by an ad in the Los Angeles Examiner offering "Western Ranch land." Just to see what it was all about, we answered the ad and soon received material concerning 20-acre parcels for sale just east of Malheur lake.

We also read with interest details about the Christmas valley project in eastern Oregon, including the California "desist" order of earlier this month. While in southern California on vacation last August we were informed by friends that the Christmas valley organization even maintained an office in the San Gabriel valley area down there just east of Los Angeles. We made an effort to drive past the office but were unable to find it.

We know from our experiences living in crowded metropolitan areas that there are large numbers of people in those areas willing and eager to pay good money for the privilege of owning a parcel of land off in the wilderness—or the desert.

Interesting, isn't it, that one can buy land right here in the Rogue valley for quite a bit less than what the eastern Oregon promoters are asking.

The News Continues

We're still receiving reports from correspondents of the damage sustained in various areas from last Friday's storm. Orlo Davis, husband of our Montague, Calif., correspondent, was out checking on cattle when the storm hit. He rendered aid to Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Schott of Tule Lake, who narrowly escaped when a large pine tree fell on their car, barely missing the cabin in which they were sleeping. Davis then returned home to find neighbors working at removing a large locust tree that had fallen on his own house with considerable damage to the roof and front of the house.

Genevieve Briggs, Wilderville correspondent, reported numerous incidents. The Edwin Robinsons of that area, for instance, were reported milking 25 to 30 cows by hand—no power. The local school bus driver had to cut trees out of roads, and some children didn't get home until 8 p.m. Mrs. Briggs herself had to drive from Grants Pass to her home south of Wonder at the height of the storm, watching trees blowing down and traffic signals with their eyes turned to the sky. "The traffic of pebbles blown across the windshield and the weaving between fallen trees didn't add to my sense of security," she commented.

Rogue River Council To Seek Reduction of Fire Protection Payments

Rogue River — The Rogue River city council has decided to take steps to find out if it must continue to pay for fire protection on property formerly used as the city dump.

Meeting last week, the council directed Orva Jean Cruise, recorder-treasurer, to write the State Forestry department concerning the matter, as the property no longer is used as the city dump.

In other action at last week's meeting, Councilman Harold Van Hoy made motion that city recorder draw up a resolution authorizing an agreement on behalf of the city with the State Highway commission pertaining to the Lighting system on Depot st. under Interstate 5 overpass.

The highway department will have six lights installed and city of Rogue River will maintain them and pay the operating expenses. Councilman Roy Strickland seconded the motion and action was taken by the council.

A council committee reported on the trailer house situation in Rogue River. Quite a discussion of pros and cons.

Frank Grimm Runs For One of Gold Hill 4-Year Terms

Josephine Co. Employment Situation Appears Brighter

Grants Pass — Employment opportunities in Josephine county leveled off higher than usual during the month of September, reported Don Stiffler, manager of the Grants Pass office of the State Employment service.

The unemployment rate during the same period, he said, was the lowest for any September during the past three years.

Plywood continued to be the key to employment expansions during the month, with former Grants Pass Plywood workers being called

back to restaff the new Josephine Plywood Corp., a building which is expected to continue through October and November.

There has also been some hiring in electronics. Tourism and retailing held steady. Construction employment continued high and gives promise of staying that way with building starts on two large projects, a new county hospital and a Pacific Power and Light service building.

Stiffler joined with Grants Pass School Superintendent Ralph Jones to announce that an application for a local occupational training course for electronic assembly workers has been submitted to authorities at Salem by the Josephine County Technical Committee on Occupational Training.

The course, if accepted under the Area Redevelopment program, would create a local pool of trained workers to form the nucleus for the future demands of the local electronics industry.

The course would be available for female workers only, and the section process, including aptitude tests, has already been started by the Grants Pass Oregon State Employment service personnel. Classes were requested for 25 people to be trained a total of 75 hours, 25 hours per week.

Three Roads Still Closed in Butte Falls Forest Area

Butte Falls — Randall Perkins, District Ranger at Butte Falls, in the Rogue River National Forest, has announced

that Blue Rock, Rustler Peak and Fireline roads are closed as a result of last week's storm. Work crews have cleared other areas and have roads open.

The storm blew down approximately one million feet of timber in the Parker Meadows and Blue Rock region.

Forest Service crews are attempting to clear roads as soon as possible for hunters' use.

Hunters would appreciate hunters not cutting timber unless familiar with log lengths, thus avoiding loss of value of products. Many board feet are lost every year due to inexperienced cutters.

As soon as the storm subsides a helicopter will be brought in to estimate extent of damage. With time permitting emergency sales will be put up to salvage losses.

Work crews lost several days time because of high winds.

Telephone communications were wiped out to look-outs and guard stations. Work will be scheduled next spring to completely rebuild the communication system.

A tentative report on recreation areas and facilities shows little damage as of this date.

300 Attend Dinner In Morse's Honor

Grants Pass — The dinner given in honor of Sen. Wayne Morse here Friday was attended by approximately 300 persons. Another 100 were unable to attend because of trees across their homes and power outages.

Sen. Morse himself was unable to attend because of the rivers and harbors bill that tied up Congress through Friday.

Attorney Bill Deatherage of Medford spoke for Morse, emphasizing what he called the advantage of having Morse on important committees which would not be available to a new senator.

Robert Duncan, Democratic candidate for congress from the fourth district, also spoke.

The dinner was served by ladies of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Cliff Driscoll was master of ceremonies.

Delinquent Eagle Point Water Bills Will Be Subject to Extra Charge

Eagle Point — All Eagle Point residents using city water will be required to pay their bills by the 10th of the month following the billing date, or else a 50 cent delinquent charge will be added.

A provision to allow the immediate disconnecting of all water if the bill is 60 days delinquent was added before it can again be turned on was also made at the Oct. 2 city council meeting.

This decision was made following receipt of a letter from the Medford water commission in which it notified the city that an additional charge was once again being made to all water users.

This estimated raise in the price of water would be approximately 40 or 50 cents per water user per month but the Eagle Point council noted that this raise for Eagle Point could be avoided at the present time if all present users paid their bills on time.

The council discussed several possible methods of providing an independent water supply for the city of Eagle Point in the future in the hopes of keeping the price of



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
