

Higher Learning Institutions Plan Massive Programs

New York—(AP)—About a generation ago, a political figure was credited with having said his party operated on the theory of spend and spend, tax and tax, elect and elect.

A recent survey of college and university future construction needs, made by a Philadelphia architectural firm, could give rise to the feeling that by the end of the decade, the presidents of institutions of higher learning are going to be saying something similar: Spend and spend, build and build, enroll and enroll.

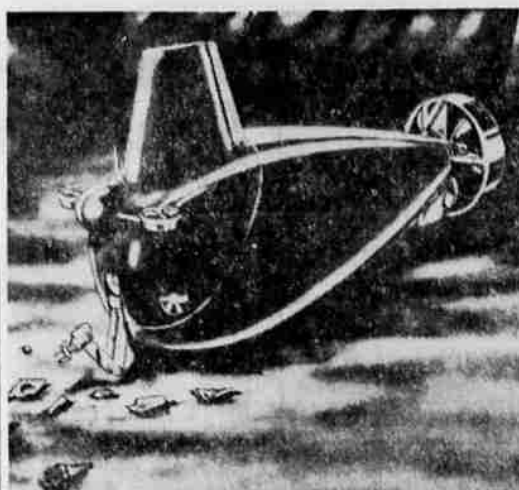
The firm of Nolen-Swinburne and Associates, which has been working with Temple University on development of a master plan for the end of the century, made the study.

Bill of \$12 Billion

It sent questionnaires to a fourth of the presidents of 2,028 institutions of higher learning. From this and from other sources, it came up with figures, projected on the basis of anticipated growth of the college student population, that by 1970 the year's construction bill might be close to \$12 billion.

In 1960, the cost of needed campus construction came to about \$1 billion, or about twice as much as the annual expenditure in 1955. If the present rush to colleges continues, the college population by 1970 should have grown from the present 3.7 million to more than 6 million, the firm said.

To a question asking building plans for the next 10 years, Nolen-Swinburne got answers from 122 presidents who showed plans for construction totaling \$1.5 billion by 1972. The survey covered a wide range of institutions, including municipal, state, church and privately administered.

Supply of Beef Up 8 Per Cent Over Last Year

Washington—(AP)—The supply of beef is up and is going higher.

On Oct. 1 there were 6,133,000 head of cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in the 28 major feeding states, according to the Crop Reporting Board. This was 8 per cent more than the 5,673,000 head on feed in these states a year earlier, and slightly higher than the 6,103,000 head on feed July 1.

Destined for Counters

The cattle on feed for slaughter consist of animals destined for the retail food counter.

Marketing of fed cattle for slaughter during the July-September period amounted to 3,569,000 head, 3 per cent more than for the same period in 1961.

The board said a check of marketing intentions showed that of the cattle and calves on feed Oct. 1, some 3,346,000 head would be sold for slaughter during October, November, and December.

2 Per Cent Greater

If these intentions are carried out, marketings from the Oct. 1 inventory during the fourth quarter will be 2 per cent greater than the comparable period last year.

The marketings will be distributed evenly, according to the board. Marketing intentions show that 34 per cent will be marketed in October, 31 per cent in November, and 35 per cent in December.

There were 3,634,000 head of cattle and calves on feed Oct. 1 for slaughter market in the North Central states, up 1 per cent from a year ago. Increases in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, and Kansas more than offset decreases in Wisconsin, Iowa, Missouri, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Nebraska.

radio, 11 per cent; and Arizona, 30 per cent.

Numbers on feed in Texas on Oct. 1 were up 48 per cent from a year ago.

Numbers Higher

There were 1,996,000 head on feed for slaughter in the 11 Western states—19 per cent more than a year ago. Numbers in the three leading states were all significantly higher than a year earlier—California, 26 per cent; Colorado, 11 per cent; and Arizona, 30 per cent.

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
