

Concerted Drive On Water Project Laws Proposed

Portland - (UPI) - National reclamation leaders were urged here Wednesday to make a concerted drive for the overhaul of water project laws, including more attention to the water needs of cities.

Ralph M. Brody, chairman of the California Water commission, discussed trends in managing water resources at the 31st annual convention of the National Reclamation association.

Other opening day speakers included Oregon Gov. Mark Hatfield and Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.).

Brody criticized what he called a "hit and miss" approach to irrigation and flood control projects throughout the West.

19th Century Policies
"We seem to be operating with 19th century policies and legislation to solve 20th century problems," he said. He noted the basic reclamation law was enacted at the turn of the century when most of the West was rural.

Brody said California has blazed new paths in federal-state-local cooperation on water projects. But he said lack of an over-all modern policy still left development piecemeal and "catch as catch can."

Brody said one outmoded section of the reclamation law is the part that gives irrigation priority over home, urban and industrial water needs. He said since the basic reclamation law was enacted the West has become predominantly urban and manufacture has boomed.

Should Be Reevaluated
"One must take heed of the fact that our metropolitan areas and their water needs just cannot be considered of lesser importance to irrigation," he said. "The concepts under which reclamation law were based should be reevaluated."

Brody suggested that water development projects for urban and industrial use be placed on an equal status with irrigation and rural use.

Barnett Decision Believed Due Soon

New Orleans - (UPI) - Court observers today predicted a decision in the contempt case against Gov. Ross Barnett would not be handed down until the end of the week or early next week.

Seven judges of the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals continued consideration of what action they would take against the governor.

One source noted that the judges, who were sitting in separate courtrooms across the south, did not receive briefs in the case until at least Tuesday. The briefs were filed Monday and mailed to the judges.

One filed by Mississippi attorneys was 89 pages long. Barnett, if found still in contempt of the appeals court for obstructing the admission of Negro James Meredith to the University of Mississippi, could face a \$100,000 fine and an additional fine of \$10,000 per day until he purged himself. That was the punishment recommended by the U.S. Justice Department in its final brief.

Japan Protests Russian Rockets

Tokyo - (UPI) - The Japanese government has protested the firing of Soviet rockets into the Pacific and has demanded that Japan be notified 96 hours in advance of each launching. The Foreign Office announced today.

The office said the protest note was delivered to the Soviet Foreign Ministry in Moscow Wednesday by Ambassador Hisanari Yamada. Japan told the Russians that the Soviet tests "will cover a long period over closed areas over which Japan Air Lines is routing regular service."

It said Japan reserves the right to demand indemnities for any damage or losses as a result of the tests.

HOLDING HIS OWN

Hollywood - (UPI) - Actor Charles Laughton was reported in "fair condition" today at Cedars of Lebanon hospital where he is recuperating from major surgery for cancer of the spine performed nearly three months ago. Doctors said the 63-year-old entertainer was holding his own, but his condition still remained the subject of much concern.
