Dedication, Opening Of New Knights of Columbus Hall Set

Ceremonies formally opening the new Knights of Columbus hall, 772 Black Oak dr., will be held at 3 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 20.

Dedication rites and blessing of the building will be conducted by the Rev. Carl Mai, chaplain of the third degree Rogue River council, and of the fourth degree, the Rev. Francis W. Black, general assembly, Knights of Columbus.

During the afternoon ceremonies the formal presentation of the key to the hall will be made to Jerome L. Krueger, grand knight of the third degree council, by John L. Hochstatter, president of Knico, Inc., the K of C membership's legal organization responsible for the construction and maintenance of the hall.

Refreshments Planned

Refreshments will be served following the dedication. Invitations to opening ceremonies have been extended to local civic leaders, to state Knights of Columbus officers and members and their friends as well as to other fraternal and civic groups and the public.

In the evening, the grand opening party will be held with a dance starting at 8:30 p.m. and a buffet supper be-

ing served at 11:30 p.m. Music for dancing will be furnished by a five-piece dance band with Rick Schuchard as master of ceremonies.

Tickets for the party may be obtained from Krueger, 772-6492, or Alex Austin, 773-2328. While reservations are not necessary, they would be appreciated.

Expected at Opening

Among those expected to be present at the opening are the Rev. Joseph E. Grady, SJ, Portland, state K of C chaplain; Joseph Ford, Oswego, state deputy; Edward Bell, Stayton, state secretary; Oscar Brolin, Grants Pass, state warden; T. W. Dugan, Medford, state advocate; Robert Herbage, Roseburg, district deputy; Otto Smith, Klamath Falls, a state activity chairman; and Fred Jeddoloh, Grants Pass, faithful navigator of the fourth degree assembly.

Out of town guests will be entertained at dinner in the homes of local Knights of Columbus.

According to Rogue River council officials, the reality of a hall of their own is the culmination of a 50-year dream. The dream began to materialize in 1957 when the first donations to a building fund were set aside. In 1959

Knico, Inc., a non-profit corporation composed of council members, acting through an elected board, was organized.

Late in 1961 the membership voted to proceed with building plans and in April of this year actual construction started.

The building, valued at \$35,000, is of contemporary design with laminated beam and wood construction. In addition to a main hall it includes a kitchen, office, foyer, storage room, two furnace rooms and a deck-type porch which can be used as an extension of the main hall.

Designed for easy expansion in the future, the hall is located on Black Oak dr. adjacent to the new St. Mary High school. Ample off-street parking has been planned as grounds are developed. The building will be available to groups on a rental basis, according to present plans.

Work Volunteered

While heavy and specialized labor for the building was contracted, the major portion of the work has been volunteered by council members and other interested persons. All materials were obtained locally, some by donation.

F. Jerome Hunter, local architect, designed the hall and Jack Batzer has acted as supervisor of construction. Both are members of the Knico board.

Other board members are, in addition to Hunter, Batzer and President Hochstatter, Dr. N. J. Wilson, vice president and finance chairman and past president; Douglas Pickell, treasurer; Leonard Kuckelmann, secretary; George Holzinger, chairman of materials and labor procurement; Krueger, grand knight of the council; Tony Manno, rules and regulations committee chairman; and C. D. Dugan, honorary member.

Others who have served on the board are Gordon Borer, Lee Meeker, T. W. Dugan, Hal Krueger and John Mansfield.

In charge of arrangements for the grand opening of the hall are Knights J. Krueger, Austin, Dugan and Holzinger.

The Family Council

Mr. H. F. — Just because we're footing the bill, they don't have to invite an army.

Mr. A. R. — Our children aren't married yet, and we're all arguing already. Let's behave.

Mr. H. F. — Our daughter is engaged to marry Mr. and Mrs. R's son. In looking ahead to the wedding, we asked the R's to draw up a list of the people they'd like us to invite. Maybe it's just a practical joke but they mailed us 200 names. The list looks like a page out of the telephone book.

Just because the etiquette books say the bride's family pays for the wedding, the groom's family needn't behave like hogs and pay off all their social obligations at my expense. The etiquette books don't cover that angle. We like our prospective son-in-law very much and we'd like to be friends with his family, too. All we ask is that they be considerate. If Mr. R. were paying, how many of those 100 couples would be invite at \$20 a couple?

Mr. A. R. — As an already "broken-in" in-law, I'm in a position to offer Mr. F. one basic tip: In-laws must be friends. Nothing's worth get-

ting mad about. Everything can be worked out.

We did exactly what we did when our other son became engaged; that is we drew up a list. But naturally it's a maximum list and can be pared down, depending upon what sort of a wedding the bride's family is planning. The other wedding party was held outdoors in a large garden. There was plenty of space and plenty of beer for the 300 people who turned out.

Just let them calm down. Whatever they wish, we can cooperate. But Mr. F. acts as though just because we'll be in-laws, we'll be enemies.

The Council: In our culture we haven't yet gotten around to working on the butting-up of the parents of the affianced, in the interest of family solidarity. We don't even have a word in the English language to designate the future relationship of Mr. F. to Mr. R. We're told that such a term does exist in Spanish and in Yiddish — a word denoting "related by marriage." And since it's a necessarily close bond, one in which these two men will share the same grandchildren, we trust that they'll see themselves on the same side rather than opposite

ones, of the family fence.

Perhaps it's fortunate that each dad has been able to speak his mind so early in the deal. At this point the parents of the couple are still merely "symbols," figures in the family background. As they emerge through the years and shape up as rounded human beings, they can become friends to each other in their own right.

As Mr. R. says, the matter of the invitation list can be adjusted. He isn't adamant and considers himself misjudged, whereas Mr. F. feels himself "put upon" as the fall guy in the marriage.

Since we're certain that this particular grievance will be settled pleasantly, now that it's honestly aired, we'd like to use our space to describe a

wedding we've heard about. It may give these people a clear view of what they can mean to each other.

After the prescribed ritual, the officiant said, "This husband and wife and their parents desire to give visible expression of their purpose to support and sustain each other." He then asked that all six principals join hands as a pledge, and he recited, "I now pronounce you a new family. Your unity will be established as you show each other forbearance and understanding, and offer appreciation and so-lace in good times and bad."

This innovation was described by the bride's father, Dr. Lester A. Kirkendall, Professor of Family Life at Oregon State University.

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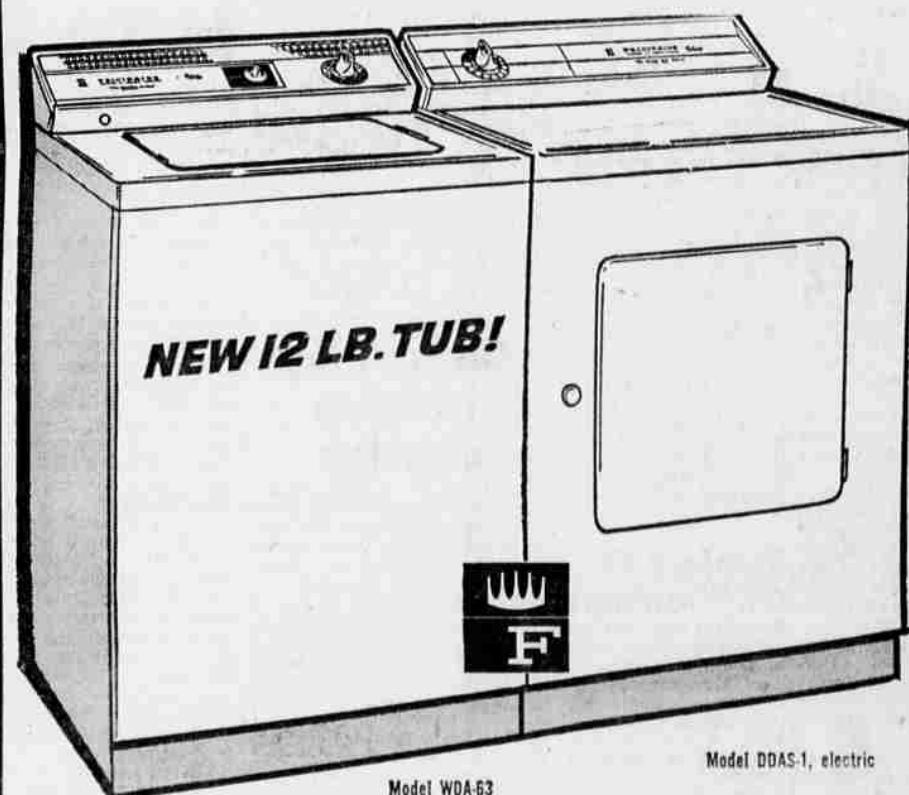
