

Age for Developing Manual Skills in Children Important

There is more to learning than the academic subjects. The individual who is "handy around the house" has many skills. These special abilities are valuable and should be developed.

Many schools have included the development of manual skills in their total program. However, there is limited emphasis on these areas before the junior and senior high schools. Even at these upper grade levels, there is little or no attention given to these subjects for girls and boys enrolled in regular academic courses. There are, of course, vocational type high schools, but these are only for those choosing the highly specialized programs. Generally, in the elementary school, the extent of these types of subjects depends upon the interest and ability of individual teachers and the limits of available equipment.

Large Responsibility

Therefore, parents have a large responsibility. There are many opportunities for teaching these techniques to children. Judgment as to the age for introducing particular skills is important. As in all areas, individual children vary in growth areas. You can show a six year old how to hold a hammer, while you would consider it dangerous to have him working with

Estes Attorneys Seek Postponement

Tyler, Tex.—UPI—Denied a motion to ban news cameras from the courtroom, Billie Sol Estes' attorneys said today they will demand that the bankrupt financier's trial for theft and swindling be postponed again.

Judge Otis T. Dunagan agreed to hear arguments on the motion for another delay this afternoon.

Attorneys John D. and Hume Cofer seek the postponement. They charged that Estes has already been convicted by public opinion.

Dunagan would not ban television and still camera coverage of preliminary motions, but hope the day never comes when this country is shut off from the news," Dunagan said.

Chief Prosecutor R. B. McGowan of Monahans, Tex., said the state was ready to go to trial.

The four indictments against Estes stem from his financial manipulating of chattel mortgages on anhydrous ammonia tanks.
