Recipes Given For Halloween Refreshments

With a quick glance in the crystal ball, we predict that this will be the brightest and spookiest of Halloween celebrations. The gypsies tell us the Tarot cards will foretell brilliant futures for everyone. And the refreshments—sweet and sensational Chocolate Doughnuts served with mugs of steaming Spicy Joe—are certain to cheer a crowd of teenage party-goers.

The hostess can give mother a helping hand with the doughnuts, well ahead of the scheduled holiday festivities. But the hot, hearty Spicy Joe, a combination of spicy coffee and hot milk, is prepared just before it is poured into mugs for serving. Flavored with cloves, allspice berries, and cinnamon, the coffee is a tempting treat for one of the most bewitching nights of the year.

CHOCOLATE DOUGHNUTS

One cup sugar; two eggs, beaten; one cup milk; one-third cup melted shortening; two squares chocolate, melted; four cups sifted all-purpose flour (about); four teaspoons baking powder; one-fourth teaspoon cinnamon; one-half teaspoon salt.

Add sugar to beaten eggs, beating constantly. Stir in milk. Add melted shortening and melted chocolate. Mix well. Mix and sift three and two-thirds cup flour, baking powder, cinnamon and salt. Stir in. (Add remaining flour if dough seems too soft.) Chill until dough is easy to handle. Roll out one-fourth inch thick. Cut with doughnut cutter (reserve small rounds of dough from holes). Fry doughnuts and balls in shallow fat (2 inches deep) heated to 370 degrees, turning once. Drain on absorbent paper. Toss small balls in Orange-Flavored Sugar. Makes two dozen doughnuts and the same number of balls.

Orange-Flavored Sugar
Add one tablespoon finely grated orange peel to one-half cup sugar. Mix well with fingers.

SPICY JOE
Brew six servings of coffee according to your favorite method. As soon as the coffee is brewed add four two-inch sticks of cinnamon, 12 whole cloves and 12 allspice berries. Hold at serving temperature 15 minutes. Do not allow to boil. Strain into pitcher. Add four cups hot milk. Mix well. Sweeten to taste. Makes eight generous servings.

Works by Husband-Wife Displayed at Gallery

The works of a husband and wife team of artists, Richard and Beverly Hackett, Nevada City, Calif., are on display at the Rogue gallery, 220 West Main street. The Hacketts have been described as prolific and versatile artists.

The exhibition contains oil paintings, collages (bits of torn paper, graphics and paint arranged in pleasing compositions) and drawings.

The Hacketts have worked side by side since 1936, when they graduated from the California School of Fine Arts. Mrs. Hackett worked for seven years as a commercial artist in San Francisco. Mr. Hackett was associated with the San Francisco Museum of Art. In 1949, the couple bought property on the outskirts of Nevada City, convinced they were ready to make their way as full-time

independent artists. They built an attractive hill-side home and since that time have been totally immersed in the nostalgia and folk-lore of the Mother Lode gold-mining area.

In the first years, Richard Hackett was still forced to depart from his painting from time to time. He worked as a logger, with a survey team for the Forest Service, as a hard-rock miner, carpenter and art teacher. Wherever he has worked, he has carried with him sketching materials and has at one time or another managed to record much of what is left of the vast gold rush country.

Now the Hacketts are painting almost exclusively again, entering many exhibitions and competitions, selling most of their work and always receiving awards or at least honorable mentions. In a joint statement of

their thoughts about art, the Hacketts declare: "All of modern art has enlarged and freed the range of expression for all artists. It has deepened appreciation of the sensuous values of paint and the mere craft of creating."
