Ashland Chamber Hears Candidates

Ashland—The Ashland Chamber of Commerce concluded its series of political programs Tuesday by hearing from the two candidates for state senator from Jackson county. Incumbent Republican Lynn Newby and Democrat Henry Padgham.

The candidates' respective talks overlapped on one issue, the community colleges—and they disagreed on it.

Newby said he could go along with the establishment of community colleges at Bend, Astoria and Coos Bay, areas not located near four-year state colleges.

But he said he did not approve of the idea of putting two-year colleges "in the backyard of practically every community." He called such a plan "too costly" and predicted that the state legislature would not go along with it.

Padgham, on the other hand, favored continued expansion of the community college program. "States like Washington and California have found two-year colleges of great benefit," he asserted.

He added, however, that he would like to see that such colleges are not built like "marble palaces" but rather with merely "adequate" facilities.

SOC Gets \$122,000 From Emergency Budget Allocation

La Grande—The State Board of Higher Education convened here Tuesday to study committee reports ranging from storm damage to salary increases for teachers.

Board members Monday were told that storm damage to schools in the higher education system amounted to \$181,000. Worst hit were Campbell Hall at Oregon College of Education and forests belonging to Oregon State University. Insurance was expected to cover \$55,000 of the loss.

The board's finance committee approved a proposal to spend \$5.5 million in the next biennium to increase faculty pay. The proposal will go to the governor and the legislature.

The finance committee also approved a \$301,000 emergency budget addition for unexpected enrollments. The current enrollment was cited as 31,861—690 students more than estimated.

Prospect High School
