

Geren, Burns on UO Duckling Club Which Opposes Rooks Here

Two athletes from the Rogue valley are on the squad of the University of Oregon freshman football team which opposes the Oregon State university Rooks on Saturday night, Oct. 27, at the Medford high stadium.

The two are Steve Geren and Dave Burns. Geren was a tailback at Eagle Point and was voted the outstanding player in the East-West Shrine game last August. The 180-pound, 5-11 pre-law student is listed at quarterback on the Duckling roster.

Burns, ex-Crater high guard and tackle, is designated a center on the Frosh club. He is listed at 6-2 and 200 pounds. Burns is in liberal arts.

The Rook-Frosh game is being brought to Medford by the Kiwanis club, Kiwanis dental clinic and the Medford high athletic fund will benefit from net proceeds. The high school share will go toward construction of dressing rooms under the new grandstand.

19 From Oregon

Of the 41 players listed on the Duckling roster, 19 are from Oregon high schools and 17 from California.

The Frosh have two players from Kailua, Hawaii. They are Wayne Williams, a halfback, and Barry Klein an end. From the most distant point in the Continental U.S. is Roy Fowles, 235-pound 6-4 tackle from Oak Park, Ill. He is the heaviest player on the squad. From Lakewood, Colo., is Pat Matson, a 227-pound guard.

Klein and Fowles are listed as possible starters. Fowles was an all-Chicago tackle two years in a row and Klein is reported tough on defense and a fair pass receiver.

Two players from Roseburg's state championship starters. They are Ray Palm, end, and Mike Flury. Palm caught six passes as the Frosh beat the Washington State Cougars last week end. He played defense well. Flury is regarded as an excellent blocker.

Tickets are on sale at Hubbard Brothers hardware, Barker's men's store, First National bank, Drew's Manstore and Big Y market in Medford and Central Point pharmacy.

Tickets are on a general admission basis with one exception. Persons who hold five-year season tickets to Medford high games can arrange to sit in their own seats. These people may buy tickets from the other locations and exchange them at Lamport's Sporting Goods store by 5 p.m. Thursday evening.

Individual Kiwanis members also have tickets.

Bids Rejected for Chiloquin Station

Klamath Falls - Word has been received from the regional forester that all bids for construction of buildings at the Chiloquin Ranger station have been rejected. Bids were opened in Portland, Oct. 17.

Bids were rejected because of technicalities in bidding. The apparent low bidder failed to provide the bond, and other bids exceeded the building limitations on the residence structures.

According to Supervisor Alex Smith, new bids will be called for immediately so that a contract may still be awarded before the end of the year. Buildings planned include four residences, an office, warehouse, barracks and gas and oil house.

Terry Baker Ranks Second in Offense

New York - (UPI) - Oregon State's Terry Baker ranks second in the nation in total offense with 1,053 yards in 156 plays, NCAA statistics showed today.

Baker is second to Eldon Fortie of Brigham Young who has 1,224 yards in 184 plays.

Portland Agreement Renewed

Portland, Ore. - (UPI) - The Portland Beavers have a team for the Pacific Coast League season next year, but no place to play, according to club president Arch Kingsley.

He announced Tuesday that the Kansas City Athletics of the American league had renewed their working agreement with the Beavers.

But he said there is no possibility of working out an agreement to play in 25,000-seat Multnomah Stadium, home of the Beavers since 1956.

Kingsley says that the stadium is not feasible because of the high rent there. The league has given Portland until Nov. 20 to decide where it will play. Kingsley said his first move will be to try to talk city fathers into building a new stadium.

League President Dewey Soriano said several cities have shown interest in obtaining the Portland franchise if it becomes available.

NY Titans Promote Pair of Gridders

New York - (UPI) - The New York Titans have promoted offensive end Karl Kainer and defensive lineman John Kenerson from their "taxi" squad and have asked waivers on veteran quarterback Ed (Butch) Songin.

Kainer is a rookie from Boston University while Kenerson, a 260-pounder from Kentucky State, played two years with the Los Angeles Rams of the National Football League.

The Titans of the American League also announced that defensive tackle Dick Guesman has been lost for the remainder of the season because of a broken arm suffered in last Sunday's game at Dallas. Songin, a 38-year-old former member of the Boston Patriots, became expendable after Johnny Green's fine showing at quarterback against the Texans.

Bank Debits in Area Increase in Month

Bank debits for the southwestern Oregon area including Curry, Jackson and Josephine counties, increased during September, compared to one year ago, according to the University of Oregon's bureau of business research reports.

Debits for September totaled \$102,892,928, up from \$98,552,845 in September, 1961. Throughout the state, with 251 banks reporting, there was a decrease in bank debits of 12.8 per cent compared to August, 1962, and an increase of 2.4 per cent compared to September, 1961.

Eagle Point Primes for St. Mary's

Eagle Point - Eagle Point high school football team this week is "trying hard to get its offense going."

The Eagles, who sport a 3-1 record, take on unbeaten St. Mary's this Friday in a Rogue league football game here.

EP Coach Vern Steward characterizes the game as one matching a defense team against a good all-around one. "If our offense materializes, I'm sure we'll give them some problems," the mentor said.

Steward brought out that he and his Eagles have a lot of respect for St. Mary's quarterback Jim Calhoun, for pass catchers Pete Naumes and Ron Roberts and ball packers Marv McGee, Jim Webb and Tom Darlax and figures to have its problems, too.

Pomeroy May Miss

The coach said that Charles Pomeroy, captain, end and fullback and best blocker on the club, may be missing because of a knee injury. Bill Hoeft, tackle and end, definitely is still sidelined by illness. Dale Chamberlain, the club's leading tackler has a shoulder pointer, is in the "doubtful" category. Ed Hanscom, lineman, who has been ailing, will be on hand but may not see only limited action.

Steward indicated that it was pretty certain that the Eagles would have to bring some freshmen up to the squad this week.

The Eagles likely will utilize their quick-kicking threat. Bob Henderson is the booter.

Three Scientists To Speak at OSU Dedication Events

Corvallis - Three of America's top scientists will be speakers this week end at Oregon State university during the dedication program for OSU's new \$5,000,000 science building.

Public tours of the new building are scheduled Friday from 6:30 to 9:30 a.m. and the public is invited to the series of science talks planned Friday and Saturday.

Two of the guest speakers are Nobel prize winners. They are Dr. Edwin M. McMillan, nuclear physicist, who was honored in 1951 for his work on the element, plutonium, and Dr. Willard F. Libby, who received the Nobel prize in 1960 for his discovery of carbon 14, or radiocarbon, which makes it possible to determine the age of prehistoric plant and animal remains.

McMillan is now director of the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory and professor of physics at University of California, Berkeley, and Libby is professor of chemistry at the University of California in Los Angeles.

The third guest speaker will be Dr. Homer Newell, director of space sciences for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and author of the book "High Altitude Rocket Research."

Newell will speak at 10:30 a.m. Friday on "Opportunities for Universities in the Field of Space Science." Libby, at 2:30 p.m., on "Impact of Chemistry on Society," and McMillan, at 9:30 a.m. Saturday on "Elementary Particles."

The talks are all scheduled in the Home Economics auditorium.

The dedication program will be at 9:30 a.m. Friday in an auditorium of the new building. President James H. Jensen will preside. Speakers will include J. W. Forrester Jr., Pendleton, chairman of the building committee for the state board of higher education; Dr. Roy E. Lieuwallen, chancellor; and Dr. F. A. Gilfillan, dean emeritus of the OSU school of science.

New Equipment or Legislation Asked by Grid Rules Chairman To Cut Head, Neck Injuries

New York - (UPI) - The chairman of the NCAA Football Rules Committee has called for new equipment or new legislation to reduce the increasing number of head and neck injuries in college and high school games.

"Anything we can't cover by the use of new protective equipment may have to be covered by new legislation," said athletic director Herbert O. (Fritz) Crisler of the University of Michigan.

Crisler spoke Tuesday at a news conference called by the Brunswick Corp., sponsors of a survey on high school football fatalities conducted by a research team from the Armour Foundation of the Illinois Institute of Technology.

Back Philburn Brown suffered an ankle injury from being clipped in the fray last week. Johnson said that it is doubtful that he'll play Friday.

Parseghian Receives UPI Honor

Chicago - (UPI) - His enthusiasm permeates his team. His confidence carries through to ignite his squad. He saw so much ability in a freshman quarterback, on film, that he junked his offense to make the best of the youngster's ability.

He built his team on the ability of his players, and not on their adaptability to his patterns.

That's Ara Parseghian, tutor of the unbeaten Northwestern Wildcats and United Press International's "Coach of the Week."

Parseghian won the honor because his team, though the underdog, beat Ohio State Saturday, 18-14, coming from behind with a last-period touchdown to overcome a 14-0 lead amassed by the potent Buckeyes in the first 12 minutes.

"We did nothing special on morale for the game," Parseghian said. "We just had the natural inclinations of a group of boys who were aware of the prominence of Ohio State, the team that won the Big Ten championship last year and was touted as national champion."

Natural Morale

"Along with the fact that we had roughly 22 Ohioans on the squad and a few coaching staff members from Ohio to give us natural morale," Parseghian, himself, is from Ohio, Akron, to be exact, and he played college football at Miami of Ohio. His college coach was Woodrow W. Hayes, now the coach of the Ohio State Buckeyes.

Parseghian, because of his Ohio background, competes with Hayes annually to get the best of his home state high school players for the Wildcats. That's how he happened to come up with his young quarterback, Tom Myers of Troy, Ohio.

"I didn't have any trepidation about changing our offense because of Myers," Parseghian said. "I was quite aware of his passing ability, and we changed our offense to use his best skill. We did not try to force any particular formation, but allowed our personnel to align itself and used what they were best suited for."

FOUR YEARS SOONEST

Portland - (UPI) - Harry Glickman, general manager of the Portland hockey team, said Tuesday the soonest the Western Hockey league could become a major league was in four years. Glickman said the chances that the league would gain major status were somewhat less than 50-50. But, he added, two years ago when the WHL first went on record as wanting major league status chances were 100 to 1 against it. He spoke to sports writers and sportscasters.

Washington Given Edge Over UO; OSU Favored

New York - (UPI) - Texas, Northwestern and Alabama, the nation's top three college football teams, were favored by two touchdowns or more to remain on the unbeaten list this weekend.

Fourth-ranked Wisconsin, however, was a 3-point underdog to two-time loser Ohio State in the leading Big Ten game. Wisconsin has a 4-0 record while the Buckeyes have dropped games to UCLA and Northwestern.

Texas, ranked No. 1, was a 12-point choice to make Rice its sixth victim of the season in a Southwest Conference night game. Northwestern, which moved into the second-ranked spot by downing Ohio State, 18-14, last Saturday, was a 20-point favorite to defeat Notre Dame for its fifth victory.

Third-ranked Alabama carries a 16-game winning streak against Tulsa and was such a top-heavy choice that no odds were given. Fifth-ranked Southern California was picked by 20 points over Illinois and sixth-ranked Mississippi was a prohibitive selection over Vanderbilt.

Washington, rated No. 7, gets the nod by 3 points over Oregon; eighth-ranked Louisiana and 10th ranked Auburn over Florida; ninth-ranked Michigan State 15 over Indiana and 10th ranked Auburn 8 over Clemson.
