

Space Age Kite Tested In Wind Tunnel

Minneapolis - UPI - A local toymaking company claims it has developed a revolutionary "space age" kite which - shaped like a rocket and built with two curved delta wings - has been tested and flown to more than 4,000 feet.

Called the Aero Kite, it is made of inflatable plastic and is over four feet long. A booklet with each kite explains in simple language and detailed drawings "the aerodynamic principles of lift, secondary lift, drag and angle of attack."
