

Candidates Statements

Editor's note: As in past year's, the Mail Tribune is offering space in its news columns for statements from candidates seeking office.

This year because of the interest in the non-partisan Medford city elections, this offer has been extended to candidates for Medford mayor and city councilman.

The first in the series starts today with statements from candidates for state senator. Other statements are from candidates for state representatives, county judge, county commissioner, county sheriff, county clerk, county assessor and the city office candidates.

Republican



Lynn Newbry

Sen. Lynn Newbry has served the people of Jackson county since Dec. 27, 1960, when he was appointed to fulfill the unexpired term of Edwin R. Durno.

Senator Newbry was born in Jackson county. He is 39 years of age. He was educated in Jackson county schools, Oregon State college and Pomona college. He was an infantry corporal in the armed forces from February, 1943, to November, 1945.

He is married to the former Charlotte Short, and has a son, Ronald, age 13. He and family reside at Talent.

During the last session of the Legislature, his outstanding work and ability resulted in his appointment to five standing committees in the Senate: (1) agriculture, (2) local government, (3) military affairs, (4) state and federal affairs, and (5) labor and industry (vice chairman).

At the present time, Senator Newbry is a member of two interim committees: (1) natural resources and (2) small business.

Member of Committee

As a member of committee on natural resources, Senator Newbry has traveled to nearly every section of the state where hearings have been held to determine the best use of state-owned property. The committee also has been concerned with the timber and range land management problems which are affecting Oregon's lumber and cattle industries.

The small business committee is making a very thorough investigation into the growing problems facing every small businessman in Jackson county and the state of Oregon. In the next session of the Legislature, this committee will present its report and make many recommendations designed to aid the position of small business.

In the last Legislative session, Senator Newbry worked diligently in the field of labor management relations. He supported labor legislation which would have brought the Oregon labor laws into conformity with the Federal labor laws. He worked especially hard to bring about much-needed improvements in Oregon's Workman's Compensation laws.

Sponsored Labor Bill

Senator Newbry sponsored and was successful in getting passed a Farm Labor law protecting farmers and farm workers from unscrupulous organizational activities by unions.

Senator Newbry secured passage of a new Milk Audit law and the Emergency Milk Marketing act, both of which were extremely important to the dairy men of Jackson county.

As a member of the committee on local government, Senator Newbry had a very active part in the re-writing of the Water and Air Pollution laws which are so important to the health and welfare of the people of this area.

Senator Newbry was co-sponsor of a bill reversing tax stands which permitted the Rogue Valley Manor to become the successful asset to Jackson county which it is today.

Active in Civic Affairs

Senator Newbry has been active in civic affairs, fraternal orders and public service. He is member of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, and was an Exalted Ruler. He is a Mason, a Royal Arch Mason, a Knight Templar and a Hillah Temple Shriner. He is a past president of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce, a director of the Ashland-Talent United

Henry F. Padgham

Henry Padgham, Democrat, running for the position of State Senator, believes that it is the duty of every person to devote part of his time and efforts for the public good.

In keeping with this concept of public responsibility, Padgham served eight consecutive terms on the Lone Pine and Jackson county rural school boards and 2 1/2 additional years on the budget committee of the rural board. He also directed various 4-H club activities when his four children were of school age.

A native Oregonian, Padgham attended Portland public schools and Reed college. He has resided in Jackson county for 34 years and since 1933 has been the managing-owner of one of the largest millwork manufacturing operations in this state. In addition to his business and past school board responsibilities, he has also been active in the affairs of the Medford Congregational

church and of the Oregon United Nations association.

Grossly Neglected

Believing that education of the pre-schoolers has been grossly neglected in this state, Padgham desires to emphasize the importance of establishing kindergartens in all public schools with part of the cost of operation being shared by State basic school funds.

Further, in the field of education, improved junior college planning and development would receive his favorable consideration. Implemented by an improved two-year college program and assisted by augmented guidance facilities at the high school level, greater emphasis should be given in the field of vocational education.

To "catch up" with existing demands and also to expand further our college facilities, Padgham urges adoption of the "build now - pay later" plan, utilizing the favorable bonding position of this state for the source of funds.

Satisfactory medical aid to our needy senior citizens has not been achieved by our present state law. Padgham believes proper amendments to the Oregon Medical Assistance law should provide additional aid to many deserving people.

Improved Statutes

Revised and improved Industrial Accident statutes doubtless will be presented early on the agenda for the next Senate session. Previous attempts to enact the so-called "Three Way" bill failed because of the divergent interests of various segments of industry as well as by the opposition by many labor groups. An acceptable Industrial Law patterned around the recent recommendations of the Governor's committee should receive favorable action and become law next year.

Oregon Gets Record Tourist Revenue

Salem—(UPI)—State Highway Engineer Forrest Cooper said Tuesday that out-of-state visitors spent a record \$217 million in Oregon this year.

Oregon counted a 27 per cent increase in out-of-state cars, and a 31 per cent increase in tourism over the previous record year of 1961. The number of visitors who came by bus, plane and train was up sharply.

Cars carried 9,255,378 tourists into Oregon this year, an increase of more than two million over 1961. Cooper credited the Seattle World's Fair with providing 20 per cent of the increase.

Surveys at 17 points on state highways showed that 61 per cent of all out-of-state travelers were en route to or from the World's Fair.

Georgia-Pacific Tells Increase in Net Sales

New York—(UPI)—Georgia-Pacific Corp. today reported net sales for the nine-month period ending Sept. 30 totaled \$226,334,715, an increase of 33.8 per cent over the same period in 1961.

Net income was \$14,048,787 as against \$11,384,893 for the same 1961 period.

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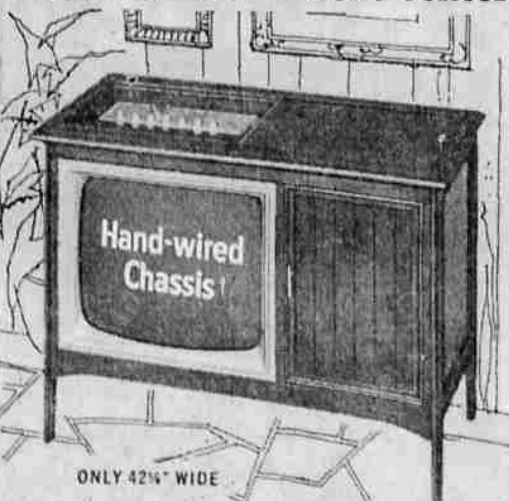
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
