Senate Committee's 'Muzzling' Inquiry Says All in Order

Washington—(UPI)—A special Senate committee said today that nothing in the censorship of military speeches reflected a no-fight, no-win policy by the government.

In a 203-page report on its widely publicized "muzzling" inquiry, the committee headed by Sen. John C. Stennis (D-Miss.) said reviews of speeches dealing with policy matters were "altogether proper and desirable."

The committee said that some of the speech changes made by State and Defense Department censors "simply defy logical explanation." But it disagreed with Sen. Strom Thurmond (D-S.C.) who had charged that the censorship practices demonstrated there was a "no-win" foreign policy.

No Lack of Devotion

The committee said its investigation did not establish "in any way that there is, or has been, any lack of devotion to American principles, any absence of a will to fight, if necessary, and to win, if compelled to fight, any intentional compromise of the nation's security or best interests, or any tendency to sacrifice our national interest by appeasement of the potential enemy."

The report also dealt with the civil-military relationship, troop information and education, and military participation in cold war seminars.

It devoted only three paragraphs to former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker, noting that he had testified without limitation or restriction in the inquiry.

The committee said there was a "popular misconception" that Walker had been disciplined because of his "pro-blue" troop indoctrination program. It said the Army found this program was "basically sound."

Removed From Command
Walker was removed from command of the 24th Division in Germany because of his participation in "controversial activities."

The Army said later that these included attempts to influence the votes of his troops in favor of ultra-conservative candidates.

The report also included a separate section on the controversial film "Operation Abolition" which showed scenes of riots in San Francisco during hearings held by the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

The Senate groups strongly urged the Defense Department to permit and encourage the use of the film in troop information and training programs.

No Evidence To Protest Will of Marilyn Monroe

New York—(UPI)—A special guardian for Marilyn Monroe's mother said Wednesday he has found no evidence to support charges that the late actress' will was drawn up while she was under "undue influence."

In a report filed at Surrogate Court, Arthur N. Field, the special guardian to Mrs. Gladys Baker, recommended probate of the will.

Field said he had been advised to file objections on the grounds that the will was prepared under the undue influence of Lee Strasberg, Miss Monroe's drama coach, or Dr. Marianne Kris, her psychiatrist.

"I have found nothing in the over-all picture to justify the filing of objections to the probate," Field said.

Allen Stein, representative of the California conservator of Mrs. Baker's interests, had advised Field to file the objections.

"No supporting facts or evidence were furnished me," Field said.

Miss Monroe died from an overdose of barbiturates Aug. 5. Her will was drawn up in January, 1961.

Geography Council To Meet on SOC Campus

Ashland—Members of the Oregon Geography Council, Oregon branch of the National Council of Geography Teachers, will meet at Southern Oregon college Nov. 10. Dr. Roy W. McNeal of the Southern Oregon college geography department has announced.

Theme for the conference is "Conservation Problems Around the World." Five illustrated lectures will be presented by five university geographers, each of whom has travelled and conducted research in the areas which they will be discussing.

"One is tempted," said author Thelma Veness, "to think that for these girls the wedding is what matters. The husband is not wanted as a partner for old age."

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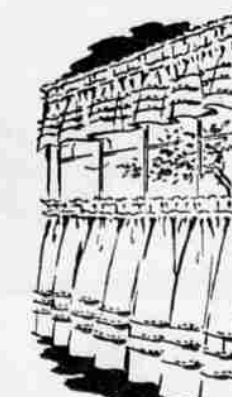
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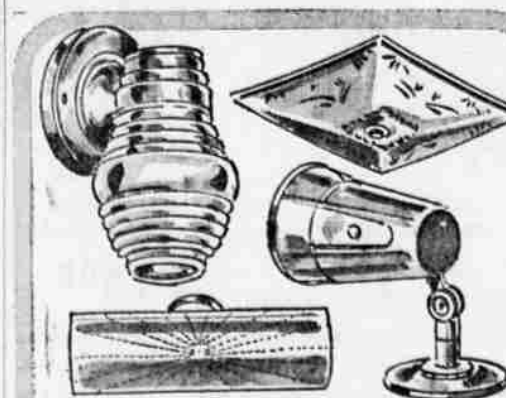
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
