

Citizens Urged To Aid UN Halloween Project

Mayor John Snider today urged Jackson county residents to cooperate with the annual UNICEF Halloween project of the Jackson County chapter, Oregon United Nations associations.

In a statement issued yesterday the mayor said:

"We urge all of our fellow citizens to listen to the doorbell and the familiar chant 'Trick or Treat for UNICEF!' on Halloween. Your help will provide treatment and nourishment for children less fortunate than our own."

Several years ago the idea was conceived of having children gather small coins for UNICEF while out on the annual Halloween "Trick or Treat" calls. The money is used by UNICEF - the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund, to buy food and medicine for children in the underdeveloped countries. The idea spread nationwide and now thousands of children and adults in the United States take part each Halloween.

In Jackson county the project is carried on through Sunday schools. The children prepare small cartons with UNICEF stickers, and these are carried by the children while on their neighborhood jaunts. They will return the filled cartons to their Sunday schools the following Sunday.

Mrs. Marris Gibbons, working with Mrs. C. Reese Bralley, UNICEF chairman, states that the following Sunday schools are cooperating: First Church of the Nazarene, First Christian church, Ascension, Zion and St. Peter's Lutheran churches; Eastwood Baptist, Church of God, Westminster and First Presbyterian churches; St. Mark's Episcopal, First Methodist and St. Luke's Methodist churches, and the Friends church.

Also aiding the project are St. Mary's school, the Unitarian fellowship, and the Ashland Methodist Youth fellowship, which is sponsoring the collection in that city. The Talent Methodist Youth fellowship has made plans to collect for UNICEF on Sunday, October 28.

The YMCA will have a supply of cartons to give to children on Halloween, October 31, from 4 to 7 p.m. and these cartons are to be returned to the Y that night.

Last fall American children raised \$2 million for UNICEF.

Hamburger Stew Is Nourishing

Cooler weather calls for hearty meat dishes and many homemakers depend upon economical, nourishing casseroles or skillet dinners.

Here is a favorite ground beef recipe that any family would enjoy.

HAMBURGER STEW
One pound ground beef, one tablespoon fat, one onion, sliced; one and one-half teaspoons salt; one-fourth teaspoon pepper; two tablespoons steak sauce; one can (19 oz.) tomatoes; three potatoes, sliced; three carrots, sliced; two stalks celery, sliced; chopped parsley.

Brown beef lightly in fat, stirring with fork to break up meat. Add onion and cook a few minutes longer. Add remaining ingredients, except parsley. Cover and simmer 30 minutes or until vegetables are tender.

Serve on hot biscuits and sprinkle with parsley. Makes four servings.
