New York — (UPI) — Middleweight Rubin (Hurricane) Carter scored a first-round knockout Saturday night over contender Florentino Fernandez of Cuba. Ringside physicians feared Fernandez may have suffered a mild brain hemorrhage.

The state boxing commission physician, Dr. Alexander Schiff, advised Fernandez to go to a polyclinic hospital for 24 hours of observation. Fernandez started toward the hospital, but turned back and refused to go.

Fernandez' personal physician, Dr. Ferdie Pacheco of Miami, Fla., also urged the fighter to go. But he refused and signed a paper absolving the physicians, the commission and Madison Square Garden of any blame in case of any unfortunate after-effects of the two knockdowns he suffered before being counted out.

For Carter, of Paterson, N.J., it was a sensational main event debut at Madison Square Garden. Fernandez was counted out at 1:09 of the first round.

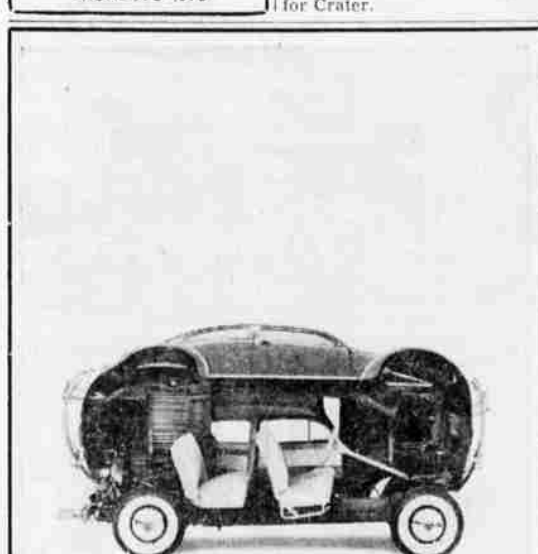
Brumback Gets Individual Honors in District 6 A-1 Cross Country Meet

Led by passing whiz Tom Myers, Northwestern scored its fifth triumph by trouncing Notre Dame, Alabama, with a stout defense and Cotton Clark's running, topped Tulsa for its sixth success.

Fifth-ranked California, ninth-ranked Michigan State and 10th-ranked Auburn also won Saturday while Wisconsin, rated No. 4, became the only member of the top 10 to lose, suffering its first setback to Ohio State, 14-7.

Northwestern, surprise team of the Big Ten, held Notre Dame to 34 yards rushing while Myers and Paul Flatley combined to rout the Irish. Myers, a 19-year-old sophomore, clicked on 11 of 18 passes for 168 yards. Flatley caught six passes from Myers, two for touchdowns.

Clark scored on runs of two and 91 yards in pacing the Crimson Tide. Tulsa scored its only touchdown with about two minutes left to play.

Twice-beaten Ohio State upended Wisconsin when John Mummey climaxed a 57-yard drive in the fourth quarter by plunging over from within the one-yard line. A 73-yard run by Willie Brown and a 72-yard pass play from Pete Beathard to Hal Bedsole sparked Southern California to its

fourth victory, 28-16, over Illinois. Seventh-ranked Washington played a 21-21 tie with Oregon, which came from behind on the wings of Bob Berry's passing.

Fullback George Salinas tallied three times to pace Michigan State over Indiana, 26-8, and Woody Woodall's field goal gave Auburn a 17-14 victory over Clemson.

In other leading games, Duane Blaska tossed two touchdown passes in directing Minnesota over Michigan, 17-0; Navy crushed Pittsburgh, 32-9, behind the passing and running of Roger Staubach; Duke scored in the last 90 seconds of play to trip North Carolina State, 21-14.

Purdue capitalized on Iowa fumbles and errant passes to rout the Hawkeyes, 26-3; Missouri defeated Iowa State, 21-6, as Johnny Roland and Paul Underhill did the ball-carrying; Billy Lottredie's all-around play led Georgia Tech over Tulane, 42-12.

Gary Wood passed for three touchdowns and scored two as Cornell edged Princeton, 35-34; Lee Marsh's diving catch on a two-point conversion earned Yale a 14-14 tie with Colgate; Maryland nipped South Carolina, 13-11, on John Hannigan's field goal; Dartmouth gave up its first touchdown of the season but downed Harvard, 24-6; Wally Mahle sparked Syracuse over Holy Cross, 30-20; Georgia pitched Miami (Fla.) over the Air Force, 21-3; Stanford's defenders intercepted five passes in a 17-7 win over UCLA, and Penn State nipped California, 23-21.

In the closing session Terry Isabell tabulated from one-yard out on a surge that began on the Comet 31. It took six plays with a 22-yard pass covering the rest of the ground. Jack Turk thumped the bonus try.

In the starting quarter Crater marched from its own 20-yard line to the Grants Pass 20 where the ball was lost on downs.

Grants Pass, which Johnson described as a "real offensive machine," outnetted Crater from scrimmage 325 yards to 129. Penalties were more damaging to Crater, they were charged six for 56 yards and GP two for 30.

Johnson said that Dave Twedell and Paul Branson did a tremendous job on defense. Twedell recorded 16 tackles and Branson 13. Joe McCalvey did a real good job on offense, said the mentor. So did Swanson. Gary Wald, hobbled by an Achilles tendon injury, tried to go but couldn't. The Comets lost lineman Denny Ryerson on a hip pointer injury early in the game.

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Baker Hits for 3 TD's Beavers Maul West Virginia

Portland, Ore. — (UPI) — Sensational Terry Baker passed for three touchdowns in the first half to ignite Oregon State to a 51-22 victory over previously unbeaten and untied West Virginia Saturday.

The southpaw-throwing senior quarterback, who was second in the nation to total offense going into the game, hit star end Vern Burke for two scores and halfback LeRoy Whittle for another. The Beavers ran up a 37-8 halftime lead.

Burke scored on touchdown aerials of 3 and 47 yards and Whittle tallied on a 24-yard pass.

Power-running fullback Bruce Williams collected three of the Oregon State scores on two runs of one yard each and one of four yards.

Baker and Burke, who went into the contest second in the nation in pass receiving, were just too much for the Mountaineers to handle. Baker accounted for 216 yards. He hit 11 of 19 passes for 177 yards and Burke caught eight of them for 131 yards. The 6'4" end now has caught 45 for the season.

It was the Beavers' fourth victory in six games. West Virginia suffered its first loss in six starts.

The Mountaineers threw a brief scare into Oregon State with two touchdowns in the second half, bringing the score to 37-22. The Beavers, however, came back with two second-half touchdowns of their own on Williams' plunges.

West Virginia's third touchdown was a 92-yard pass play from quarterback Jerry Yost to end Gene Heeter. It broke the Beavers' 37-8 lead.

Of the OS total 307 yards were on passes. Olson completed 10 of 17 for 235 yards and Bill Bailey four of 11 for 72.

The Raiders collected 18 first downs and Oregon Tech one.
