

THE WEEK IN CALIFORNIA

Cuban Situation Touches Off Buying; Politics Tops News

 Californians responded to the "Cuban situation" in a number of ways last week—emotionally, physically and politically.

One person immediately affected when President Kennedy announced his naval "quarantine" of Cuba was Gov. Edmund G. Brown. Kennedy had planned to appear in California during the week

was immediately cancelled. So was a trip to California by U. S. Ambassador Adlai Stevenson. Two days later, Brown also shelved all but a few of his remaining scheduled campaign appearances and flew to Washington, D.C. for a governor's conference on the Cuban crisis.

Meanwhile, Los Angeles shoppers jammed markets in a wild buying spree, coaxing by local civil defense officials' remarks that citizens should maintain a two-week supply of food.

Brown called a meeting with his cabinet and high state officials to review California's civil defense preparedness. Afterward he said he found it "in good shape."

Some other situations that developed from the crisis:
Nixon—Republican gubernatorial candidate Richard M. Nixon said he backed Kennedy's stand. He also said he would not alter his campaign because of the Cuban situation. He noted he did not hold a public office and therefore was not invited to Washington.

Martin—Joseph Martin Jr., Republican National commit-tee man from California, said he believed the Cuban crisis would increase Nixon's "past position on the Cuban issue has proved correct," Martin said.

Meeting—A state department representative met with western congressmen in San Francisco for a briefing on the crisis.

Demonstrations—There were the expected pro and con demonstrations regarding Cuba, primarily by college and university students in the state's large population centers.

Elsewhere, there were these developments:
Endorsements—There were two major political endorsements. Harold J. (Butch) Powers, former Republican lieutenant governor, endorsed Democrat Gov. Edmund G. Brown for re-election. He accused Republican nominee Richard M. Nixon of falling to "come up with a single, solitary program beneficial to California."

In the other endorsement, Roy E. Simpson, retiring state superintendent of public instruction, backed the candidacy of Dr. Ralph Richardson for that post over Dr. Max Rafferty.

Steinbeck: Novelist John Steinbeck, who was born in Salinas, Calif., and wrote some of his best novels about that region, was named winner of the 1962 Nobel Prize for literature. He was cited for his "realistic and imaginative" writings.

Steinbeck, now 60, rose to fame in the 1930s with novels and short stories that reflected the "common people" and the depressed economic conditions of the age. Steinbeck incorporated his home town of Salinas and the California countryside into his fiction. "Tortilla Flat" was the first of his successes. It was the story of Mexican and other foreign laborers in California. Later came such novels as "In Dubious Battle," a portrait of background Communist movements in a strike of California fruit pickers; "Of Mice and Men," the story of two itinerant farm hands, and "The Grapes of Wrath," a story of migrant farm workers in California.

In a week of frightening news and political speculations, "The River Nile" tonight at 10 p.m. on KMED-TV should be an interesting change of pace. The program pictures the 4,000 mile long course of the river that touches its banks.

Starting on a high plateau in the Watusi country of East Africa, a 3-man news crew spent 84 days following the Nile. By truck, motor launch, canoe, train, plane, foot and a sailing boat, the film team moved north along the Nile, photographing the animals and peoples of strange civilizations and the remnants of past cultures.

The viewer will see Murchison Falls, Lake Victoria, Sudd, the great swamp, the Valley of Kings, the Pyramids, the Sphinx.

Although many animals were photographed—the white rhino, impala, hippo, elephant, lion and giraffe—the only wildlife to become excited were 25,000 or so flamingos feeding in shallow Nile waters.

James Mason will be narrator for the program written by Lou Hazan, who also wrote the award-winning show "Vincent Van Gogh."

Station KRVC To Hold Rally For Anniversary

Ashland—Radio Station KRVC in Ashland will celebrate its second anniversary with a radio rally at the Faith Tabernacle at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

According to the Rev. Leo C. Wine, pastor, speakers and musical talent from more than 13 valley churches will participate in the service.

The 1,000-watt radio station, operating daytime on 1350 kilocycles, is one of three stations in Oregon that carry all religious programs.

Mr. Wine is station manager; Charlie McFarlan, news editor and chief announcer; Virgil Jackson, advertising manager, and Mrs. Jackson is the station's secretary. Announcers include Carlton Abbott and Richard Anderson.
