

Tittle Stars as New York Giants Jar Washington Back To Reality

Y. A. Tittle of the New York Giants shares a record pedestal with Sid Luckman today, the Washington Redskins have been jarred back to the harsh realities of life in the National Football League and the Green Bay Packers remain in a class by themselves.

Tittle, 35-year-old "hald eagle" who appears to improve with each season, tied the league record of seven touchdowns passes Sunday and became the second NFL player ever to throw for more than 500 yards in one game as the Giants handed the Redskins their first defeat, 49-34. The champion Packers, meanwhile, scored their seventh straight victory by beating the Baltimore Colts, 17-0, and unless some team stops them soon, they'll go through the first undefeated NFL season in 20 years.

Lions Lone Challenger

The Detroit Lions emerged the lone serious challenger to the Packers in the Western Division when they defeated the Chicago Bears, 11-3, in a game devoid of a single touchdown.

There were two big Sunday upsets, the Los Angeles Rams scoring their first victory of the season by beating the San Francisco Forty Niners, 28-14, and the St. Louis Cardinals putting a damper on the Dallas Cowboys' confidence in a 24-24 tie.

In other games, the Cleveland Browns clobbered the Pittsburgh Steelers, 41-14, and the Minnesota Vikings made it two in a row with a 31-21 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles.

To get back to Tittle, the man of the day...

"Yat" completed 27 of 39 passes for a total of 505 yards in a remarkable demonstration of aerial artistry that enabled him to tie the 7-touchdown record set by Luckman with the Bears in 1943 and matched by Adrian Burk of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1954.

The only NFL player who ever passed for greater yardage was Norm Van Brocklin, who gained 554 yards for the Los Angeles Rams in a game in 1951.

Joe Walton caught three of Tittle's TD passes, Joe Morrison grabbed two and Del Shofner and Frank Gifford one each before a crowd of 62,844 at Yankee Stadium.

Shofner was Tittle's most effective target, however, catching 11 passes that gained 269 yards.

Rebels First Place

The Skins, who retained first place in the Eastern Division despite the defeat, scored the first touchdown of the game and twice pulled to within one point of the Giants at 14-13 and 21-20.

As for the Packers...

They struggled at close quarters with the Colts for three periods of a rough game before Jim Taylor's 36-yard touchdown run gave them a 10-0 lead at 13:30 in the second quarter.

Quarterback Bart Starr put Green Bay ahead by firing a 25-yard TD pass to Bob Kramer. Dick Bielecki returned the Packers' lead to 17-0.

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"Bass is a great halfback," said Waterfield. "I've always said he was. And he has been great in every game this year, even while we were losing."

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But with all his fine work, if it hadn't been for the leak-proof defense the game could have been lost. Led by linebackers Mike Henry, Bill Johnson and Jack Pardee, the defense stopped the Forty Niners time and again when they were in Ram territory and needed only a foot or two for a first down.

In addition, the defense scored the first touchdown when Lindon Crow intercepted one of John Brodie's passes and romped 65 yards for a touchdown.

Seaside topped the A-2 list followed by Brndon, Central, Yamhill - Carlton, Vale, St. Mary's, Elmira, Gold Beach, and Plomath and Phoenix tied for ninth.
