

NCAA Hopes To End AAU Dispute

New York—UPI—The National Collegiate Athletic Association NCAA expects a peaceful settlement of its struggle for control of amateur athletics in the United States before the 1964 Olympics in Tokyo.

"Right will triumph," said executive director Walter Byers in a report on his group's fight with the national Amateur Athletic Union AAU, which now controls American participation in international events covering track and field, basketball and gymnastics.

The policy-making council of the NCAA, in the second day of a three-day fall session in New York, was scheduled today for further discussion of the NCAA's annual convention at Los Angeles, Jan. 7-9.

But while Byers was predicting an early settlement, the NCAA Monday released a bulletin to member colleges urging they withdraw from the AAU until that group indicates a more "cooperative attitude" toward members of NCAA federations in matters of track and field, basketball and gymnastics.

"We are asking the AAU either to join our federations in these sports or join in dual sanctioning of members so there can be a complete use of our personnel and facilities in putting together our international teams," said Byers.

Cepeda, Mays Will Undergo Doctors' Tests

San Francisco—UPI—"Sick call" was in order today for two of the most prominent San Francisco Giants—Orlando Cepeda and Willie Mays—who headed toward the doctor's office and hospital for tests.

Cepeda expected to get the word on whether or not he has a cataract in his right eye. Mays scheduled a series of tests at Mount Zion Hospital after feeling run down late in the season.

Fears arose shortly after the World Series that Cepeda might have a cataract when he failed to pass an eye examination while applying for a driver's license.

President Horace Stoneham of the Giants sent him to the offices of Dr. George Campion for today's examination after Cepeda had said that he might have a cataract.

According to William Hunter of the State Department of Motor Vehicles, Cepeda had a "lazy" right eye which caused him to fail one portion of the routine physical exam. But he passed the test with combined vision and received a license.

Cepeda's batting went into a sharp skid this season after he was hitting as high as .352 in May. He finished with a .306 average, hitting 35 home runs and driving in 114 tallies for 162 games. His World Series average was only .158.

Last season, the big Puerto Rican led the National league in both home runs and runs batted in with 46 and 142 respectively.

Mays, who underwent a checkup several years ago at Harkness Pavilion in New York, collapsed on Sept. 12 in Cincinnati and stayed out of the lineup for three days.

May's physician, who has asked to remain anonymous, said that the results of the tests would be announced this Friday or Saturday.

Bill Rigney Voted Pilot Of Year

New York—UPI—Bill Rigney of the Los Angeles Angels—a teacher as well as a manager—was named the American League's Manager of the Year today by the United Press International.

The gray-haired, high-strung former Giant infielder and manager, was selected by 21 of the 24 baseball writers who formed the UPI's 1962 board of baseball experts. Sam Mele of the Minnesota Twins received the other three votes.

The Angels, playing only their second season, surprised the sports world by remaining in the AL pennant race until mid-September and finally finished third, 10 games behind the pennant-winning New York Yankees.

Their rise from an infant franchise in 1961 to a flag threat in 1962 constitutes the most amazing development of its kind in major league history.

Some experts say it wasn't until Rigney took over the Angels that he really learned to be a manager. With the Angels, he only had moderate talent available, compared to the players at his disposal when he managed the Giants.

Realizing that he was faced with a new and entirely different problem, Rigney coaxed and wangled the most out of each player on the squad.

The players showed a tremendous respect for Rigney. He had their confidence both on and off the field. They trusted him—and they accepted his all-for-one, one-for-all approach to the team.

Earlier, Fred Haney of the Angels—the man who hired Rigney and then worked to provide him with the best players he could—was named the major league Executive Manager of the Year by the UPI.

Farrell Out For 2-3 Weeks

Corvallis—UPI—Linebacker end John Farrell was sidelined Monday for two or three weeks as the Oregon State Beavers got ready to meet Washington State Saturday at Pullman.

Farrell received a dislocated elbow in last week's Beaver victory over West Virginia.

Senior end Fred Jones also was injured. He suffered a severe hip pointer in the opening kickoff against West Virginia. It was uncertain whether he would be able to play Saturday.

Northwestern Tops Football Ratings; Oregon Ranked 16

New York—UPI—Northwestern, which has ridden the arm of sophomore quarterback Tom Myers to five straight victories, took over the No. 1 spot in the United Press International college football ratings today.

Alabama (6-0) advanced to second place and Southern California (5-0) to third as Texas, the top-ranked team for the past three weeks, dropped to fifth place following its 14-14 tie with Rice Saturday night.

Arkansas and Nebraska joined the top 10 group in 9th and 10th places. Wisconsin and Auburn dropped out of the select group.

Nineteen members of the 35-man UPI Board of Coaches picked Northwestern the national leader after its 35-6 weekend victory over Notre Dame. The Wildcats have scored 169 points in their five wins.

Alabama, 35-6 victor over Tulsa, was the first-place choice of 12 coaches; two voted for Southern California and one each for fourth-ranked Mississippi (5-0) and

seventh-ranked Michigan State (4-1).

The other spots in the top 10 group were filled by Louisiana State, in sixth place, and Washington, in eighth.

Auburn headed the second 10 group, followed by Ohio State, which led the major colleges the first week of this season. Wisconsin dropped all the way from fourth place to 13th after losing to Ohio State.

Missouri ranked 14th, followed in order by Purdue, Oregon and Duke. Georgia Tech and Minnesota were tied for 18th place and Penn State was 20th. Miami (Fla.) and Army were the only two other teams that received votes this week.

Minneapolis-St. Paul—UPI—The Minnesota Vikings loaned rookie quarterback John Furman to the Cleveland Browns Monday in the latest of a long series of trades, loans and transfers between the two National Football league teams.

Furman, a lanky left-hander, was dispatched to Cleveland in response to an "urgent appeal" from Browns owner Paul Brown, who needed someone to bolster his squad in the absence of injured quarterback Jim Ninkowski.

Ninkowski suffered a shoulder separation and a fractured collar bone in last Sunday's winning decision over Pittsburgh and will be out of action the remainder of the season.

Furman, who will play behind Frank Ryan, is expected to stay at Cleveland during the balance of the season. He has signed a 1963 contract with the Vikings, however, and will return to Minneapolis next year.

St. Mary's high of Medford, undefeated and untied in seven football games this fall, must forfeit its first four games because of the scholastic ineligibility of a player.

That was the ruling yesterday of the Oregon School Activities association board of control. St. Mary's sought the ruling.

The board, meeting by conference telephone call, reviewed the facts of the case as presented by St. Mary's. A Oden Hawes, executive secretary-treasurer of the OSAA, said that the decision was unanimous.

"The boy is just not eligible under our rules," said Hawes. It is an unfortunate thing. But, the games are going to have to be forfeited."

The case concerns a sophomore who transferred from Grants Pass where he had attended junior high. It involves an OSAA regulation which requires a player to have met certain grade standards during the previous semester. It also involves a misunderstanding on grades and concerns a faulty transcript which did not arrive at St. Mary's until after school was underway.

Blew The Whistle

St. Mary's Coach Bill McKibbin noted the apparent ineligibility and the school decided that the thing to do was to "blow the whistle" on itself. The OSAA office in Portland was advised of the case, the school investigated the matter and various circumstances involved and the facts were placed before the OSAA board yesterday morning.

Rickey Joins Cardinals Club

St. Louis—UPI—Branch Rickey, baseball's elder statesman, joined the St. Louis Cardinals baseball club Monday as "consultant on player personnel," and said his first thought was "to win a pennant at the earliest possible date."

The Cardinals' president, August A. Busch Jr., announced Rickey's willingness to return to baseball and help in a pennant-winning drive.

Rickey, in answer to a question regarding his age, said, "I'm as old as I feel, sometimes I feel pretty good, sometimes I feel 80."

Then, Rickey said, "Sometimes I feel 40 and this morning I feel 40."

NCAA Policy Council Meets

New York—UPI—The policy-directing council of the National Collegiate Athletic Association opens a three-day meeting today with a list of seven items on the agenda.

NCAA executive director Walter Byers said special emphasis will be placed on the newly-organized sports federations.

Also on the agenda are legislation for presentation to the 57th annual NCAA convention, Jan. 7-9; reports of special committees on accelerated academic programs, recommendations of the NCAA legislation, a report of the association's committee on infractions and a report on program of district vice presidents to obtain adequate anti-bribery legislation in states where it does not exist.

District vice presidents are Frank Thomas of Williams, Everett Barnes of Colgate, Alfred Scott of Georgia, Robert Ray of Iowa State, James Sours of Wichita, Delbert Swartz of Arkansas, Arthur Reynolds of Colorado State, Glenn Holcomb of Oregon State and James Loveless of Depauw.

Deer Rules Clarified

Inquiries concerning the controlled deer hunt in the Rogue Valley area Nov. 10-25 and the archery deer hunt in the Green Springs area have resulted in explanation and clarification from state police.

Permit tags issued to hunters for the Rogue Valley hunt will allow the taking of one deer of either sex. These hunters also were issued a yellow permit which will allow killing of another deer to be tagged with the general deer tag.

Police pointed out that, if the hunter has already used his general tag, the yellow permit is of no value to him. Another way of saying it is that the yellow permit is of no use if the hunter has killed

For the archery season in the Green Springs unit, still open and extending through Nov. 25, the general deer season tag must be used. When that is gone, that is the end of hunting.

FORMER BOXER DIES
