Prospect Women Attend Session

Prospect — Attending the semi-annual district meeting of Oregon Federation of Garden clubs in Central Point last week from Prospect were Mrs. Halaver Garden, Mrs. Albert Esten, Mrs. Earl Millard and Mrs. Everett Shafer. They displayed a plaque which the Prospect club had been presented at this year's state convention of the federated clubs.

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The reason for his unusual appearance was that he had just arrived from Sicily where he had been on location filming "The Leopard." Now he will be here several months. He plays the title role of Don Fabrizio — Prince of Salino. It is said that he accepted the role, a difficult one, because of the director, Luciano Visconti. Lancaster considers him the best director he has ever worked under, and it would seem the admiration must be mutual as Visconti has incorporated many of Lancaster's script suggestions, including whole scenes from the novel which the actor has read some 11 times.

The novel is a remarkable one, and the play promises to be also. Visconti admits that he viewed the choice of an American actor just as a concession to the box office. He had serious doubts that any American could play a Sicilian prince of a hundred years ago. He is quoted as saying now, that no one in the world could handle the role as Lancaster does. Surely Burt Lancaster has come a long way since the circus acrobat association.

To prepare for "The Leopard" Lancaster met many of the Sicilian aristocrats, some of whom are counterparts of the characters of the novel. He had long sessions with Principessa Alessandra di Lampedusa, the widow of the author. He visited the Lampedusa home, read their books. He has become good friends with the Duke of Palma, the author's adopted son (who is the model for Tancredi in the novel). He went to museums, toured the island, studied the background of the Risorgimento against which the film is set.

Personally, because I like the book so much, I hope this harmonious and creative relationship between a "hard" American star and the great Italian directors will result in a great epic. Too, they might go on to produce "Hippolyta," another, to me, literary masterpiece.

Things are reversing themselves. Whereas Hollywood would without question the king of the moving picture world, it would now appear that Italy is threatening it. Italian movies are growing in number so as to have turned out almost as many films as the United States in the past two years. And Italians are importing American actors for their films. "Barabbas" and "Sodom and Gomorrah" have all the appearance of being American. They have foreign actors, directors and sound tracks, but the label is "Made in Italy." There is a new 30 million dollar studio just south of Rome.
