Dayton University Placed On Probation for 2 Years

Dayton, Ohio — The University of Dayton says it will accept the two-year probation handed it Wednesday by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) without seeking a review.

The University was accused of violating rules on aid to athletes and of allowing the 1960-61 freshman basketball team to play an excessive number of games.

Dayton, which last year won the National Invitation tournament (NIT) championship and has three starters from that team returning this season, will be prohibited from competing in the NCAA basketball championships during the probation period.

The ban also extends to other invitational basketball events cooperating with the NCAA unless prior contracts already have been signed.

Accepts Penalty

"We accept the penalty imposed by the NCAA committee on infractions," the Very Rev. Raymond A. Roesch, university president, said in a statement.

"Since there has never been any question in the past about the game played by our freshman teams, we were not aware that we were violating the code," he said.

Fr. Roesch said that even before being advised by the committee, the university student welfare council recommended more than a year ago that the freshman schedule be shortened and no post-season play be scheduled. The 1962-63 schedule was shortened considerably, he added.

The committee also charged that the university on three occasions during the college year of 1960-61 provided free transportation to a freshman basketball player so he could return home for personal reasons and paid transportation costs from his home to the

campus in order for him to enroll. Fr. Roesch said the athletic department was motivated in this matter "by what it judged to be a hardship case and felt that they were justified."

"The incident referred to is that of Roger Brown returning to New York for appearance in a traffic court," he said.

Brown, a member of the Flyers' freshman team which played in the AAU tournament at Denver in 1961 and lost in the second game, was involved in a point-shave scandal which broke in May involving New York men.

Brown was dropped from school after the investigation began into point-shaving. The probation means the Flyers will not get the opportunity to defend their NIT title, but is not expected to keep them from playing in the Holiday Festival at New York City for which they had contracted already.

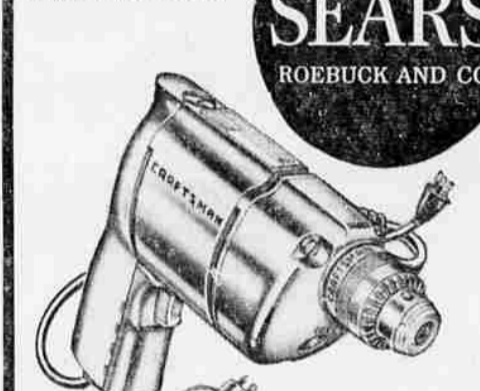

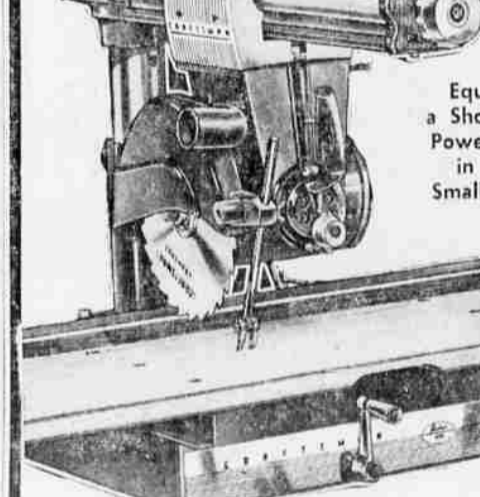

Roger Maris Tabbed Flop of 1962 Season

New York — Only one short year after he was the toast of baseball, New York Yankee slugger Roger Maris was tabbed the flop of the year today by the United Press International.

A UPI board of 24 baseball experts singled out Maris as the season's No. 1 disappointment in a close vote with the Detroit Tigers and the St. Louis Cardinals.

Six of the 24 experts selected Maris, five picked the Tigers and four chose the Cardinals. The failures of individual stars Norm Cash, Don Schwall and Jim Piersall and the team failures of the Baltimore Orioles, New York Mets and Chicago White Sox also were noted.

The figures tell the story of the difference between the Maris of 1961 and the Maris of 1962.

In 1961, Maris established a new home run record of 61 in a season despite the enormous pressure of chasing "the ghost" of Babe Ruth and learning to live in a goldfish-bowl atmosphere.

That performance plus a league leading total of 142 runs batted in enabled Maris to win a second straight American league most valuable player award. He rose into the \$70,000 class as a

salaried player and stood alongside Mickey Mantle as a Yankee super star.

The only hitch was his .269 batting average—an average which caused some baseball experts to sneer at his 61-homer feat and to predict that he would never again come close to that total.

Maris' 61 home runs made him a marked man in 1962.

Sir Roger did not take kindly to the situation. He believed his 61 homers spoke for themselves as an achievement and he resented any criticism. He frequently engaged in arguments with newsmen during spring training and definitely wore a chip on his shoulder at the start of the season.

It developed that American League pitchers were only too happy to knock it off Maris' batting average dipped to .236 in 1962, his runs batted in total fell to 100 and his home run total—the key to the entire image of Roger Maris—spiraled downward from 61 to 23.

Actually, Maris put in a good season of work for the Yankees. Despite his uneven home run hitting, he delivered frequently in the clutch, drove hard day after day and played an impeccable right field. In emergencies, he also filled in for the injured Mantle in center field and he did a good job there, too.
