Grants Pass Will Elect Mayor and Four Councilmen

Grants Pass — Grants Pass voters tomorrow will elect a mayor and four councilmen and will also decide the fate of two proposed ten-year levies, one for drainage purposes and one for parks and recreation.

Running for reelection is incumbent mayor Charles B. Gill, Jr. (D). His opponent is D. W. Gillespie (R).

Contests have developed for

all but one of four seats to be filled on the City Council. Running unopposed in ward 2 is William V. Wrightson (Non-partisan). Candidates in other wards are as follows: Ward 1 — Roland Stearns (R) and Larry Greene (D); Ward 3 — Hugh Gould (Non-P) and E. Bobby Pruitt (R); Ward 4 — H. L. Rollins (N-P) and Chester L. Wilde (D).

Both proposed levies would replace similar ones which have expired.

The drainage levy asks for an amount not to exceed \$50,000 per year to make continued improvement in the city's storm sewer system and to solve new drainage problems arising as the city grows.

The recreation levy asks an amount not exceeding \$25,000 per year for capital improvements in the city's park and recreation program.

O. W. Newland Says 'Don't Vote for Me'

Gold Hill — O. W. "Ozzie" Newland wishes to inform voters in Gold Hill that even though some of his friends and neighbors in Gold Hill are advocating that his name be written in for mayor of Gold Hill on the city ballot, he is not a candidate for mayor and will not accept the position even if elected.

He said, "I wish to express my thanks to those who show such confidence in me by proposing my name as mayor, but, since I will not accept the position, it would only contribute to confusion should I be elected."

Newland's term on the city council will expire in January. He previously and for several months has, he said, tried to make it clear that he was not a candidate. He would be seeking reelection to the council or run for mayor.

Regional Roundup

The mayor's race in Jacksonville between Incumbent E. O. Graham and William C. Dobbyn has an issue. The issue involves, it would appear to us, an interpretation of the term "work and labor."

Dobbyn is critical of the present mayor and council, because they did not entertain bids when it came time to line up a firm to do the engineering work on the city's soon to be installed sewer system.

The challenger emphasizes that he is not opposed to the installation of a sewer system, only to the way the project has been handled to date. "No one on the council has done anything wrong," he commented to us the other day. "They've just been ill advised."

To substantiate his criticism of the way the selection of an engineering firm was made, Dobbyn points to Jacksonville's ordinance No. 2, which provides that if the estimated cost of "work and labor" or "work, labor and materials" exceeds \$5,000, the work, labor or what-have-you must be put up for bid.

Mayor Graham's explanation of why the council did not ask for bids on the engineering work is that he and the councilmen were advised by their city attorney that engineering services are NOT "work and labor," but rather are professional services.

If you had a pain in your arm, you wouldn't walk from doctor's office to doctor's office trying to locate the physician with the cheapest fee, Graham reasoned when we chatted with him about a month ago.

That \$2 Charge Again

Another criticism Dobbyn has of the present administration concerns a \$2 charge it placed on city water bills in order to raise funds to pay initial costs connected with the sewer project.

The councilmen levied the \$2 charge in order to avoid having to sell bonds immediately to cover initial project expenses, thereby believing they would save the city's taxpayers money in the long run. The council said it wanted to apply the monthly charge against front footage assessments, but was advised that such a procedure would be illegal.

Dobbyn, on the other hand, contends that the \$2 charge could have been applied against the forthcoming sewer connection fees. He told us he had been informed that it would not have been illegal to adopt that procedure.

California Woman Trying To Locate Her Birthplace in Gold Hill

Gold Hill — Mrs. Wilfred Brown, North Hollywood, Calif., recently visited a home on Sixth ave. which she believes to be her birthplace.

Mrs. Brown, the former Elinor Henry, was born in 1911 at Gold Hill, the daughter of the late David C. Henry and Mabel Henry. At the time of Mrs. Brown's birth, her father was rural school supervisor for Jackson County.

Prior to her visit in Gold Hill last week end she had attended her father's funeral at Eugene. Her mother died in 1944.

Mrs. Brown said she is interested in locating the owner of the home that she thinks is her birthplace, and would like to hear from long time residents of Gold Hill who knew her parents when they were residents of this community.

According to information obtained by Mrs. Brown, Richard Spalinger is the owner of the home she is interested in. If anyone has information as to where this man can be located, she would like them to write her at Box 3005 VCA, North Hollywood, Calif.

She and her husband are co-editors and publishers of the Archer magazine. Her husband is a radio news editor for the American Broadcasting company in Los Angeles, she said. Mrs. Brown is a graduate of University of Oregon at Eugene where the Henry family resided for many years. At the present time she is a writer and takes an active part in civic affairs, she said.
