

26 Whooping Cranes Nest At Texas Bird Refuge; Remaining 12 Overdue

Austwell, Tex.—(UPI)—Twenty-six whooping cranes are nesting today at their winter home at the Aransas Wildlife Refuge but bird lovers can only hope the remaining 12 whoopers are minding the kids.

Officials said Sunday that no baby cranes were sighted in the 26-bird flock, now at Aransas Refuge on the South Texas coast. The remaining dozen of the nearly-extinct birds are en route from the summer home near the Great Slave Lake in Northwest Canada, officials said.

The remainder of the flock may be bringing the baby cranes, Refuge Manager Jim Johnson said.

The Aransas flock is the only one left in the world. Seven cranes are in captivity.

Last autumn, the flock increased as five baby cranes made the trip to Texas from Canada.

In 1941, only 15 of the majestic birds with seven-foot wing spans were known to exist.

The flock increased by nine in 1958 and two in 1959, and by six in 1960.

The Aransas Refuge was established in 1937 as a shelter for ducks and geese. The cranes quickly adopted it as a winter home.

'Lost' Man Said Playing Hide-Seek

Corvallis—(UPI)—An elderly man who was thought to be lost for three days south of Corvallis has admitted he was "playing hide and seek" with searchers, Benton county chief sheriff's deputy Ed Ream said Saturday.

Daniel L. Farmer, 78, was found by bloodhounds Friday. Ream said the man admitted hiding out to prove he was "still just as good a woodsman as ever." Ream said he was warmly dressed and "never missed a meal."

When found, however, he was draped unconscious over a log. He was confined to a Corvallis hospital while he regained his strength.

During the search three skindivers probed a nearby slough, half a dozen police officers spent most of their time in the area, and bloodhounds were brought in from Portland twice.

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Your Money's Worth

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SAVE ON TAXES NOW — I PLANNING FOR 1963 TAX CUT

You have 56 days left in which to cut the federal taxes you'll owe on your 1962 income, and the odds are overwhelming that this year you can save money if you know what to do and when to do it.

Next spring all you will do is fill out your tax return and try to make sure you pay no more than the minimum you owe in taxes. In these weeks before the deadline Dec. 31, 1962, though, you can by wise before-the-year-end tax planning cut that minimum. And this fall the opportunities to achieve tax savings are the best in years—because of the outlook for tax rate reductions, because of the two major tax laws passed in 1962, because of the stock market's crash, because of significant new rulings by the Treasury and the tax courts.

In this series of nine columns beginning today, you'll find facts and guides which I know can be of major tax-saving value to millions of you.

To begin with, this is the first year in a long time in which the prospect that tax rates will be lower next year should be a key consideration in your year-end tax planning moves.

The President is on record with a pledge that he'll ask Congress to cut both individual and corporation tax rates across-the-board and from top to bottom in 1963. Of course there is no certainty that the tax reductions will occur in view of the critical international situation and the big deficit in the budget, but since some assumptions must be made, a reasonable assumption is that tax cuts are on the way. If the reductions are voted, another reasonable assumption is that rates in each of the lower and middle income brackets would be cut by three to four points.

To illustrate, if you are a married man with a taxable income between \$8,000 and \$12,000, your present top tax rate of 26 per cent would drop to 22 or 23 per cent.

What does this mean to you? It means that you should generally try to shift some income from 1962 into 1963 and to move ahead into 1962 deductible expenditures which you might otherwise hold off until 1963. These steps will cut your 1962 taxable income and raise your 1963 income, and if the 1963 rates are lower they will give you an over-all tax saving.

If you can shift \$1,000 of income which you ordinarily would receive in 1962 into 1963, for instance, and your tax rate is cut by four points, you would save \$40 in taxes just by making this shift. In addition, you would benefit by having the use of tax money for an extra year. If you receive \$1,000 in 1962, the tax on it must be paid by April 1963. But if you postpone \$1,000 of income which you normally would receive in December 1962 to January 1963, you would not have to pay the tax on that \$1,000—say \$260—until April 1964.

Don't go overboard on shifting income, though. By not considering your income bracket or by doing too much shifting, you might wind up paying more tax than you otherwise would. For example, if you, a married man, would ordinarily have \$12,000 of taxable income in 1962 and \$12,000 in 1963, it would not be wise for you to shift \$1,000 from 1962 into 1963, assuming you could manage this. The shift of \$1,000 to 1963 would raise your income in 1963 to \$13,000, and that would move you into the next rate bracket of \$12,000 to \$16,000—a bracket taxed at 30 per cent, or four points more than the 26 per cent rate in the \$8,000-\$12,000 bracket. If the tax cut doesn't go through, the shift would cost you four percentage points more, or if the tax cut is only three points, it would cost you one percentage point more.

And, as always there are exceptions to general rules. Despite the prospect for tax cuts in 1963, you might want to push 1963 income into 1962 if you expect to be divorced next year or to lose your present status as head of a household or if you anticipate a substantial pay raise in 1963 or if you are a widow or widower whose spouse died in 1960 and your income splitting privileges run out this year.

A companion, Clifford Ray Derrick of Cloverdale, said the two had driven from McMinnville to Dayton to attend a dance. Derrick said Feehan

had two guns and was shooting at highway signs during the drive.

Derrick said Feehan was demonstrating what he called "faith in his gun" by putting a gun to his head and firing on what he thought was an empty cartridge chamber when the gun discharged.

Officers said Feehan had parents in Pleasant Hill, Iowa. He was discharged from the Air Force in May.

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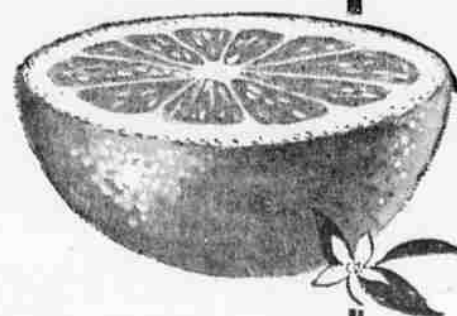
