

Albert Nussbaum, Wanted for Bank Robbery, Captured

Buffalo, N.Y. — (AP) — Albert F. Nussbaum, 28, the "brains" of a vicious bank robbery gang, was armed with a loaded rifle and two live hand grenades when the FBI closed in on him.

But instead of shooting it out, Nussbaum decided on suicide and gulped a lethal dose of drugs. A stomach pump quickly nullified his attempt to take his own life.

Nussbaum, one of the FBI's ten most wanted men, was cornered Sunday by federal agents after a high-speed chase through Buffalo's streets.

The expert gunsmith whose mail-order munitions business led to bank robberies carried off like military maneuvers, was to be arraigned today on charges involving four bank robberies in Buffalo, Brooklyn and Washington D.C. that netted \$150,000.

In the Brooklyn robbery a bank guard was machine gunned to death.

Started in December

The search for Nussbaum began in Brooklyn last December shortly after the \$34,000 hold up of Brooklyn's LaFayette National Bank in which guard Henry Kraus, 52, was killed.

It ended in his home town 11 months later when FBI agents spotted him and reportedly set a trap using Nussbaum's wife, Alice, 25, as a decoy. Mrs. Nussbaum feared her husband might go off on a new job with his pal, one-eyed Rendell Wilcoxson, 33, Delray Beach, Fla.

An authoritative source told the Buffalo Courier-Express that Nussbaum's mother-in-law, Mrs. Sylvester Majchowski, was the person who notified FBI agents that the fugitive was in the Buffalo area.

Wilcoxson, the alleged machine gun killer of Kraus, is wanted by the FBI along with his girl friend, Jacqueline Rose, 18.

Mrs. Nussbaum said Wilcoxson is "evil and it's dangerous to be with him."

Convicted in 1957

Described by the FBI as the "highly intelligent" brains of a vicious gang of bank robbers, Nussbaum was convicted on a charge of possessing a machine gun in 1957. He served three years at the Chillicothe, Ohio, Federal Prison, where he met Wilcoxson.

Both his wife and Robert Ward, a business associate, said Nussbaum built his gun-collecting pastime into a profitable private arsenal.

One of those who received weapons, Mrs. Nussbaum and Ward believe, was Fidel Castro's revolutionary band.

According to Ward, who had made Nussbaum a partner in his wrought iron shop in 1960, Nussbaum would collect small batches of weapons, assemble large shipments and send them to California for transfer to Mexico and other destinations.

There's no substitute for real talent. Ed Sullivan's television salute to composer Richard Rodgers Sunday night demonstrated that.

In the concert hall setting of Carnegie hall, some melodic voices and Rodgers' tuneful compositions brought a rare hour of pleasure into our homes.

Elaborate sets were unnecessary. These are TV tricks to bolster indifferent talents. Accomplished performers and good music can stand alone.

Roberta Peters, from the Metropolitan Opera company, was particularly outstanding. She has the same magnetism or stage presence as the late Ezio Pinza, that is felt even before a note is sung.

Peter Nero's dazzling piano interpretation of "Slaughter on Tenth Avenue" was another high spot.

Gordon MacRae, Diann Carroll, Nancy Dussault and Cesare Siepi were excellent singing songs obviously selected carefully for the quality of voice.

Peggy Lee's performance was the only weak part of the show. She sings in a breathless style anyway, but the breathlessness and huskiness seemed excessive to me. Perhaps she had a cold.

The camera work was tastefully and simply handled in keeping with the entire show. The final shot apparently taken from the top row of the horseshoe was breathtaking. One had the sensation of being at least one light year away from the stage.

Sullivan's salute to Richard Rodgers was worthy of 25 guns at least.

Powers Takes Test Job With Lockheed

Burbank, Calif. — (AP) — Francis Gary Powers, the U2 pilot shot down over Russia in 1960, has resigned from the Central Intelligence Agency and taken a "routine test pilot job" with Lockheed Aircraft.

Powers' resignation was announced Saturday in Washington. A Lockheed spokesman here said the 33-year-old test pilot started work for the company shortly after his resignation from the CIA.

"It's strictly a routine test pilot job — only with U2s," said the Lockheed spokesman.

Christians Urged To Enter Politics

Legislative candidate Ed Branchfield Sunday night urged greater participation by Christians in political life.

"Christians should be encouraged to enter politics in order to apply the principles of Christianity to the operation of government," he told members of the Ashland Methodist church Wesleyan Youth group.

Branchfield, who is a trustee of Medford's First Methodist church, observed that practically all U.S. presidents were regular church attendants. He cited Gov. Mark Hatfield and Michigan gubernatorial Candidate George Romney, as outstanding examples of Christians who take an active interest in government service.
