Travel Study Group Host To Speakers

Mrs. Fred Rankin was guest speaker for Travel Study club, of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs October 30 in the Girls Community club. She greeted the group with "relax, we are going out on a freighter for three or four months."

The speaker then told of a trip she made on an American freighter with 14 passengers on board, leaving San Francisco in March, 1954 and returning the next August. She explained that she often traveled alone and many times hers was the only white face in a group. Mrs. Rankin described a five-day storm at sea and also described Vietnam and Siam. She displayed items from the various countries which she visited.

Preceding Mrs. Rankin's talk, Mrs. Edith Swartsley, chairman of Home Life, spoke briefly on the constructive ability of the youth of today. She told the group she preferred to tell them some of the good deeds they do, and said that delinquency often begins in the home.

Scouting Explained

Larry Schade, district chairman of Scouting, spoke on Scouting, explaining this district is composed of boys eight to 16 years of age, from Cub Scouts to Explorer Scouts. He stated that 3,157 boys are eligible in this district though only 1059 are members. More volunteers are needed to assist with the Scout program, the speaker stated.

Founding Marked By Alpha Chis

Alpha Chi Omega Alumnae of the Rogue Valley met October 29 at the home of Mrs. Frank Perl, 1009 East Main street to celebrate Founders' day. Mrs. W. E. Isaacs assisted the hostess.

The sorority was founded October 15, 1885, at the School of Medicine, De Pauw university, Green Castle, Ind., by Professor James H. Howe, dean of the school.

Dean Howe selected seven young women from the liberal arts department as charter members. Not being a fraternity man, Dean Howe asked James G. Campbell, a member of Beta Theta Pi and librarian for the school of music, to assist the newly formed group. He helped in the choosing of the Greek name — "Alpha Chi Omega" — and offered sketches of a lyre, which provided the pattern for the sorority's badge. The badges and guards were worn at the collar and were somewhat larger than the present day badge.

The color of the autumn maple leaves suggested the originally selected bronze, green, and scarlet sorority colors, which were later changed to olive green and carnation red.

The sorority today has 99 chapters, with the latest chapter being installed this year at the University of Pacific, Stockton, Calif.

Following the business meeting a silent auction was held. Each member furnished a white elephant item for the auction. Proceeds are to be presented to the School of Hope in Medford.

State President Of Honor Group Session Speaker

Change is not necessarily progress and not necessarily always good, according to Miss Belva June Mayor, Portland, Oregon state president of Delta Kappa Gamma sorority who spoke for the fall luncheon of Epsilon chapter held recently in Grants Pass. Delta Kappa Gamma is an honor society for women in education.

Miss Mayor said that rapid changes had come to the United States, and to education, but that education has not made as many gains as it should have. She spoke of the severe criticism of teachers due to our American system of education which is subjected to continuous evaluation and which uses comparison as a measuring guide, a wrong measuring standard, she believes. Success of education should be the aim for all, Miss Mayor said.

Trends of changes in society that she mentioned were that truth is becoming "modified," honesty is "if" it pays to be honest; the increase in mental disturbance; less refined living and lowering of tastes; lack of keen judgment; and the letting down of high quality living that once was the solid tie of society. She stated that standards need open channels of communication.

In her talk Miss Mayor placed emphasis on higher ideals of women, and said, "Work is the key to happiness. Welcome the task that makes us go beyond ourselves. Command the wide fields but cultivate the small ones."

In the business meeting members were urged to read the voters pamphlet and to vote on the reorganization bill which would do away with school organization which has taken years to build.

Business Women To Hold Dinner

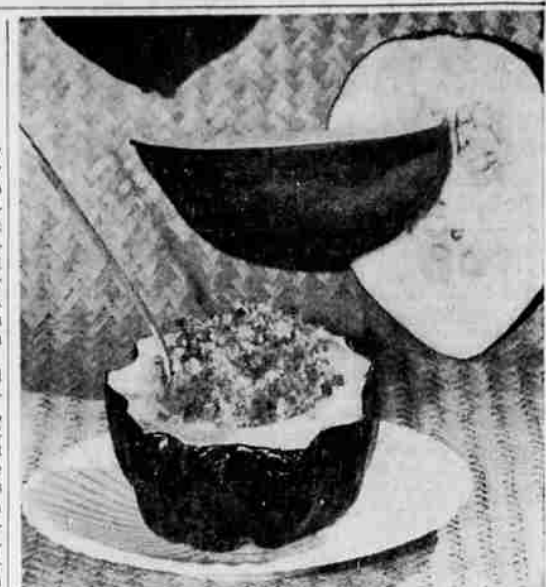
A potluck dinner will precede a meeting of Medford Business and Professional Women's club November 15 at 6:30 p.m. at the Girls' Community club.

Sausage Stuffed Squash Make Delicious Variation

This is the season for squash lovers and time to discover new ways to prepare this delicious vegetable with its nut-like flavor.

One appetizing main dish idea that is a delectable combination of flavors is sausage stuffed squash.

The zesty meat stuffing is an easily prepared combination of sausage, seasonings, pickle relish and evaporated milk. Creamy evaporated milk binds the stuffing mixture and gives it a just-right moistness. Spooned into the halved squash and baked together, the meat mixture and squash flavors cook deliciously into each other.

Now that winter squash is on the market again, sausage stuffed squash can be served anytime.

STUFFED SQUASH

Three medium size acorn squash, halved and seeded; one pound pork sausage, cooked and well drained; one-half cup evaporated milk; one-half teaspoon salt; one-fourth teaspoon pepper; one-fourth teaspoon dry mustard; one-fourth cup pickle relish, drained; one-half cup fine bread crumbs.

Turn on the oven and set at 425 (very hot). Place squash, cut-side down, in a 13x9-inch pan. Pour water into pan to one-fourth inch and bake for 30 minutes.

Remove from oven and reduce temperature to 350 (moderate). Combine remaining ingredients in a two-quart bowl.
