Kraft Will Expand Plant at Albany

Albany — UPI — A \$3.8 million expansion of Western Kraft Corporation's plant at Albany has been announced by company officials.

The additional facilities will increase production 50 per cent to 375 tons of Kraft liner board and paper per day. The expansion will require an additional 25 employees and a payroll increase of \$150,000 a year, officials estimate.

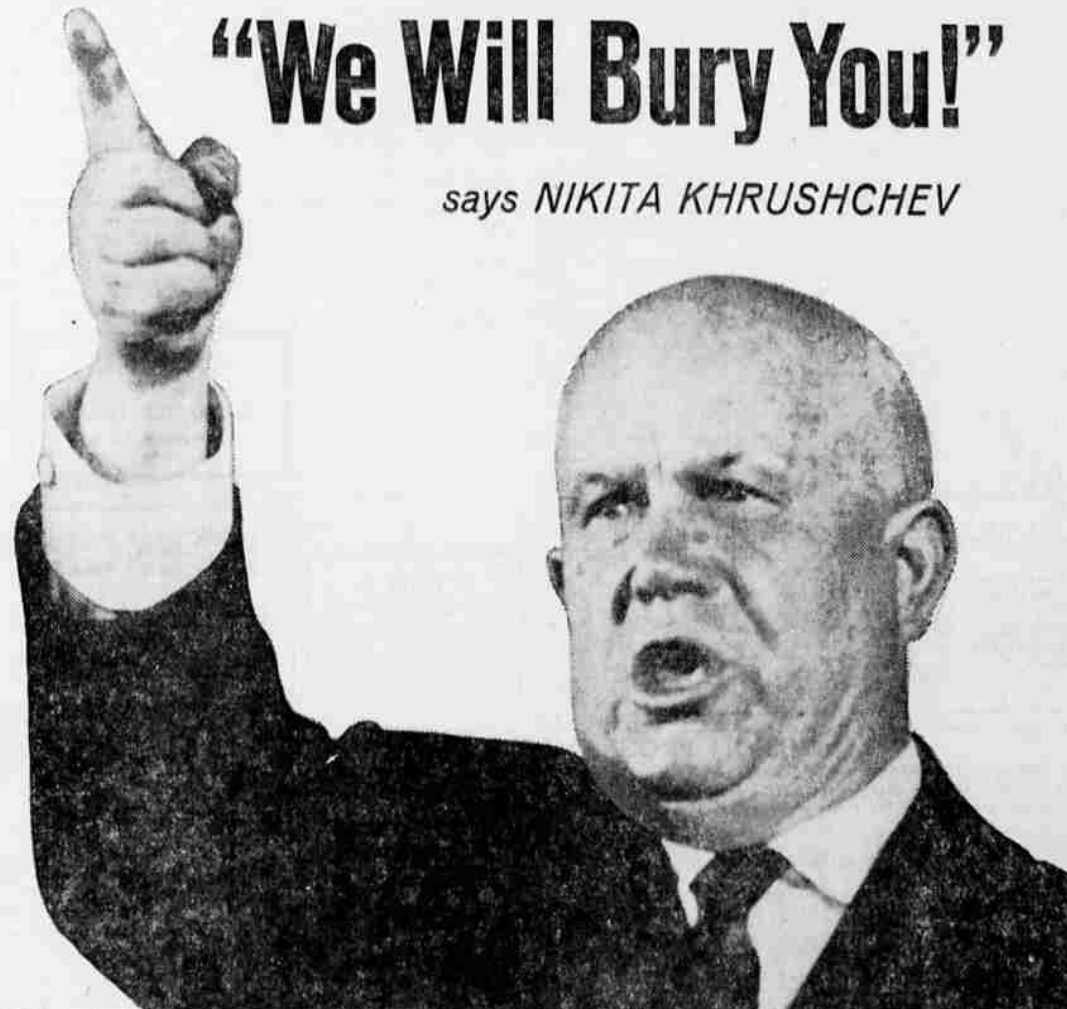
