

Family Rehabilitation With Disabled Fathers Is Discussed By Council Panel

Many of the aspects of rehabilitation of families when the father is disabled were presented by a panel of four members at the recent meeting to the Jackson County Inter-Community Council.

As pointed out by Dr. Andrew Foley, psychologist at the Veterans Administration Hospital, the desired situation is to allow a family to function as nearly as possible as they did before the father became disabled.

"This must be adapted to the socio-economic structure of each individual family," he stated. There are always some adjustment problems. New responsibilities may be developed in the children as they assist their parents in a new role.

At times, deep emotional problems may result from the change in a son's image of his father from a strong man to one of helplessness of whom to be apologetic.

Dr. Foley stressed the point of vast differences in people and families in their abilities to adjust. He suggested that with more people working together for the welfare of the individual who is disabled, the more successful is that person's rehabilitation.

Working Together
Some of this "working together" was brought out in the report of the other three panelists on the services available from their agencies.

Len Martensen, speaking for the state industrial commission, stated his company is primarily an insurance company and covers occupational accidents. Along with the accident coverage program, state industrial also carries on a preventive accident program. Personnel of this firm assist individuals and families in establishing a claim, and compensation starts with the day of the injury. An injured man is paid according to his family responsibilities, he noted.

Mrs. Marjorie Haley, environmental caseload worker of the public welfare commission, prefaced her report by stating, "Rehabilitation to self-support or self-care has always been the goal of public welfare agencies. A trend in laws have confirmed the national trend in social welfare thinking which has been moving towards rehabilitative services to a larger portion of persons on public assistance."

She reported that in Oregon, Jackson County is one of two districts selected for an pilot program in this new endeavor. Their first procedure is to carefully evaluate the needs and potential of all their people. Selection is then made of persons who have problems which inhibit, but do not prevent, their function as self-sufficient persons. Case-workers then work intensively with such persons.

In certain cases the father may be so bitterly frustrated he is too emotionally unstable to meet the standards of such an agency as the blind commission for retraining. By working closely with one such accidentally blinded man they have effected a change in attitude so that he is now considered suitable for retraining.

Rehabilitation Service

Donald Hansen, a counselor with the Oregon state vocational rehabilitation service, outlined a few of the many services supplies in this field. Persons eligible for service from this department are those suffering with medical impairment, either emotional, physical or mental (as in the retarded individual).

There must be a reasonable expectation from this individual.

Freak Storm Hits Newport

Newport, Ore. — (UPI) — A freak, cyclone-type windstorm sawed through the north edge of town shortly after 11 a.m. Monday.

Workers at radio station KNPT said the whirlwind "exploded" the roof from a small shed in back of the station which had withstood the Oct. 12 typhoon that made western Oregon a disaster area.

The wind lasted only for a few minutes and reached velocity of 65 miles per hour, the Coast Guard station at Yaquina bay said.

The roof of the shed split and half of it landed in the topmost branches of a fir tree. The other part landed in the street, KNPT said.

A panel truck parked on a lot was spun around. A German shepherd dog, trotting down the highway, was overhauled over and over through a patch of rosebushes.

At about the same time, a power outage was reported in the Ocean Lake area.

ual. Diagnostic services are given through a medical examination. Counseling and guidance services provided through this agency often aid in formulating a goal.

The services of vocational rehabilitation may also include surgical aid as in a heart condition, an orthopedic problem or provide braces and physical therapy. These services are purchased in the community, Hansen noted.

Loans for Retraining
In the question and answer period, it was stated the Medford Business and Professional Women's club and the Altrusa club each have loan and grant funds for retraining or educating mothers for family income responsibilities.

Dr. Alvin Fellers presided at the meeting which was held in the Red Cross building. Because those facilities will not be available on the regular meeting date of the Inter-Community Council, it was agreed to have the next meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 13.
