Medford's Black Tornado is "polishing everything up, both offense and defense," as it primes for showdown battle with Grants Pass high this Friday night at Grants Pass.

"We're working on our regular stuff," said Medford Coach Fred Spiegelberg this morning.

The Southern Oregon conference and District 6 A-1 football championship is the prize at stake along with a berth in the state title playoffs.

Medford, already certain of at least a tie for the league diadem, will gain a clear cut crown with a victory or tie. Grants Pass must win to gain a co-championship and will represent the district in the playoffs if it does.

Players Injured
Spiegelberg reported stellar linebacker Gary Griffin and fullback and punter Tim Murray ailing as the result of injury in the Ashland game last Friday. Tackle Mike Mayfield joined the hobbled yesterday afternoon.

Griffin has a bruised shoulder. Murray reinjured an ankle. On the last play of yesterday's dummy drill, Mayfield turned his ankle. Goal line work was part of yesterday's practice field activity.

The usual jam-packed crowd is expected Friday for the big encounter. Blocks of tickets sent to Medford for the tussle were bought up in short order Monday. Extra bleacher seats are being moved to the GP field, according to a report from the Climate city.

San Francisco—Latest Big Six statistics today showed George Reed of Washington State leading the loop's rushers, but the figures are misleading.

The Washington State fullback has pounded the line for 357 yards in seven contests, but second place Willie Brown of USC with 352 yards has performed in only six games. Then there's UCLA's Kermit Alexander in sixth place with 238 yards. The Bruins have only played five games so far.

Dave Mathieson of Washington State is the loop's leading passer with 59 completions for 836 yards, while Hugh Campbell, Mathieson's favorite target, leads the hot race among pass catchers with 35 receptions for 480 yards. Cal's Bill Turner, 28 for 342, and USC's Ha Bedsole, 20 for 547, are also having great years.

USC's Ernie Jones is the leading punter with a 40.3 average on 39 kicks.

DELAWARE LEADS

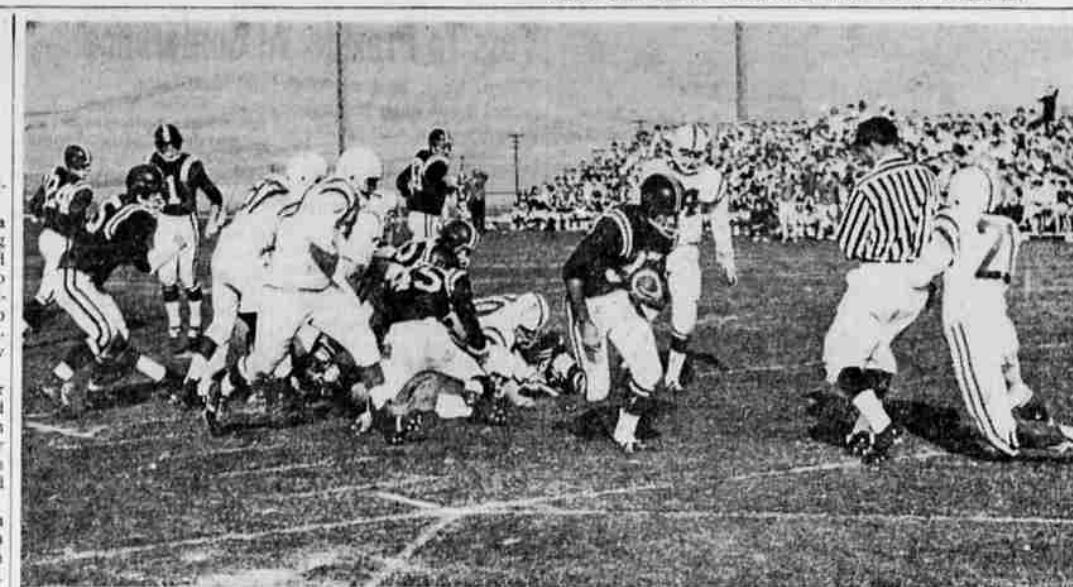
New York—The Delaware victory by virtue of its 20-3 victory over Temple last Saturday, regained sole possession of the No. 1 spot in this week's voting for the Lambert Cup, emblematic of Eastern Small College football supremacy. McKay Chosen Coach of Week For USC Win Over Washington

Los Angeles—The coach, known for his defensive strength in a maneuver designed to give his own team a psychological advantage he called for an end run on the first play of the game—and it worked.

Fleet Willie Brown sped by Washington players for six yards. Fullback Ben Wilson made two on the next play and Southern California unleashed a surprising ground attack to defeat the Huskies, 14-0, Saturday.

It possibly was USC's biggest victory in the past five years, keeping the Trojans undefeated after six games and all but clinching the treasured Rose Bowl bid of the Big Six championship USC also retained third place in the college poll. And for that victory—and the strategic moves that made the win possible—John McKay of USC today was named

Big 10 Tiff Regarded As Toss-up

New York—The odds-makers have listed Saturday's titanic Big Ten conference game between top-ranked Wisconsin as a toss-up.

Northwestern struggled to a 26-21 victory over Indiana last Saturday to run its season record to 6-0 while Wisconsin routed Michigan, 34-12, for its fifth victory in six games.

Alabama, Southern California, Mississippi and Texas—Northwestern's closest challengers—are listed as solid favorites for their week end engagements.

Second-ranked Alabama is a 13 point choice to score its 19th consecutive victory at the expense of Miami (Fla.) Third-ranked Southern California is a 14-point favorite over Stanford, Mississippi No. 4 is a prohibitive pick over Chattanooga, and Texas No. 5 is an 8-point choice over Baylor.

Riddle Carries Sparkling Record Against Phoenix

Riddle High school's Irish will carry impressive record into their District 6 A-2 runoff football game with the Phoenix Pirates.

The Irish, who entertain the Pirates at 8 p.m. on Friday, go into the skirmish with a record of 22-3 over the past three seasons. They've dropped only one tilt per fall over the last three years and will go against the Bucs with

a 7-1 status for 1962.

This is the first of the three seasons that Riddle has gained Umpqua Valley league gridiron laurels. The Irish were 6-0 in the loop. They defeated Glide 27 to 0 last Friday to clinch the diadem. Only Riddle loss this season was to Gold Beach 19 to 12 in a non-league brush.

Bill Markham, a halfback has paced the Riddle scorers this fall. His brother, Mike Markham, is a fine passer, who also can run with the ball. Main receivers for Mike have been his brother, Bill, Gary Paetz, Gary Frahm, Art Fisher and Keith Hanson. Paetz is called a "remarkable receiver."

Other capable backs of Coach Bill Baxter's club include Larry Ruckel, John Brown and Tom Morrison.

There seems to be a big task at Phoenix of building up enthusiasm for the contest. Pirate fervor has been somewhat softened by the fact that forfeit by St. Mary's boosted the Phoenix club into the district title game. The Medford parochial school handed Phoenix its only setback this fall. But, the Buccaneers have come far since that tussle and there are a good number of gridiron followers who feel that Phoenix has the stronger team and best representative of the league.

On the dark side of the ledger for the Pirates, nevertheless are injuries to quarterback Ron Williams and halfback Jim Construk. Williams suffered a knee injury against Sacred Heart last Friday and has not worked out this week. Construk has a charley horse.

They might play against Riddle and they might not, said Woodward.

Injury to Williams in particular is upsetting to Pirate plans. For, even if he does play, the Pirates don't have him during practice. Williams is a defensive cog as well and could be missed if not available against the Irish aerial game.

Buenos Aires — Slammin' Sam Snead, admitting that "I must be coming apart at the seams now that I'm 50," promised today he will ignore a painful right foot and compete in the International trophy and Canada cup golf matches starting on Thursday.

"After all, this might be my last shot at this one so some pain isn't going to keep me from playing," Snead said. "There is not a chance in the world that I will withdraw."

Snead has a pinched nerve between the second and third toes on his right foot. He has it tightly bandaged.

"It hurts when I walk, but not when I am shooting," Snead explained. "So long as it stays that way, I'll be all right."

So far it certainly hasn't affected his game in practice rounds for the big International tourney, which will see two-man teams from 33 nations competing for the individual and team trophies.

The U. S. team of Snead and Arnold Palmer is favored.

OCC Back Honor Goes To Bennett

Portland — Southern Oregon halfback Kerm Bennett and Portland State end Jim Hollingsworth today were named Oregon Collegiate conference football back and lineman of the week.

Bennett ran for three touchdowns and Hollingsworth caught two scoring passes as the Red Raiders defeated the Vikings 41-26 last week end at Ashland to clinch a tie for the conference championship.

Bennett took over the conference scoring lead from Portland State halfback Billy (Bye-Bye) White with two games remaining this season for each player. Bennett has scored 54 points on nine touchdowns to 49 points for White.

White held onto the rushing lead with 573 yards and Southern Oregon quarterback Doug Olsen kept his wide margin for the passing lead with 1,245 yards.
