'Peace and Order' Reported Enforced

Washington—(UPI)—Louisiana State Atty. Gen. Jack P. F. Gremillion told the Supreme Court Tuesday his state was enforcing "peace and order," not racial segregation, when sit-in demonstrators were convicted in 1960 in New Orleans.

Gremillion's statement was part of the second day of argument before the court on sit-in cases which may produce the most significant race decisions since the school segregation cases of 1954.

Attorney John P. Nelson, representing the sit-in demonstrators at New Orleans, concluded his argument that the demonstrators were denied their constitutional rights when they were convicted of trespass.

Bulgarian Communist Boss May Get Post

Vienna—(UPI)—Communist affairs experts said Tuesday that Bulgarian Communist boss Todor Zhivkov may grab the premiership for himself, replacing "stalinist" Anton Yugov who was purged Monday with apparent Soviet approval.

The experts said Zhivkov appears to be following in the footsteps of Nikita Khrushchev, who fired Premier Nikolai Bulganin and took his job on the pretext that Bulganin was a member of an "anti-party group."

Oregon Employment In September Higher

Eugene—(UPI)—The Oregon Business Review said Tuesday employment in Oregon in September of this year was higher than in any other September in the state's history. Employment during that month reached 726,100, which was 21,400 more than the previous September, the publication said.
